APPROVING AND APPROPRIATING THE 2015-2016
COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF ROCHESTER

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER, AS FOLLOWS:

I. That the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester, by adoption of this Resolution, hereby adopt the one-year 2015-2016 “Action Plan for the Community Development Division for the City of Rochester, N.H.,” as prepared and presented to the Mayor and City Council by the City of Rochester Office of Economic and Community Development, in connection with the City’s Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, including the goals, objectives, and concepts set forth therein;

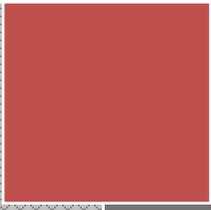
II. Further, that a twelve (12) month Community Development Block Grant budget for the Department of Planning and Development for the City of Rochester in the total amount of Two Hundred Twenty-Seven Thousand and Sixty-Two Dollars (\$227,062.00) be, and hereby is, approved and appropriated for fiscal year 2015-2016. Included in said approval and appropriate are expenditures set forth in the one-year action plan of the Office of Economic & Community Development for the City of Rochester for the Community Development Block Grant program, in the following categories and amounts:

Administration and Planning	\$ 45,412.00
Public Service Agencies	\$ 34,059.00
Economic Development	\$ 12,000.00
Housing	\$ 50,000.00
Public Facilities/Infrastructure	\$ <u>85,591.00</u>
Total	\$227,062.00

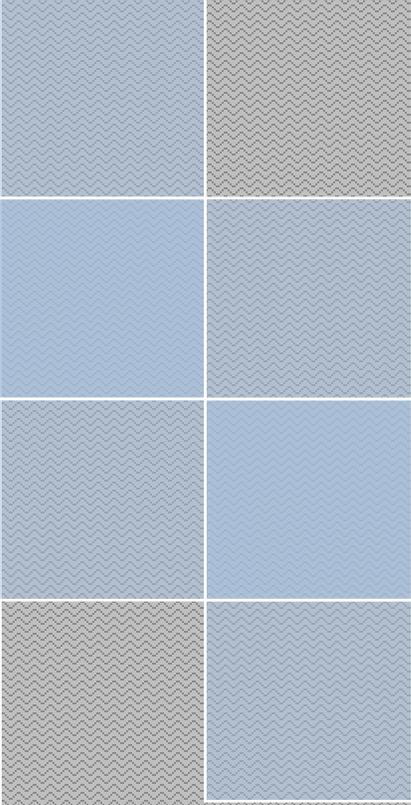
This budget and the one-year action plan for 2015-2016 may be reconsidered if federal funding is changed or if it is inconsistent with the total 2015-2016 budget adopted for the Office of Economic & Community Development.

The sums necessary to fund the above appropriate in the amount of Two Hundred Twenty-Seven Thousand and Sixty-Two Dollars (\$227,062.00) shall be drawn in their entirety from the above-mentioned 2015-2016 fiscal year Community Development Block Grant from the federal government to the City of Rochester. The Finance Director is hereby authorized to create such line item accounts as shall be necessary to implement this Resolution.

Furthermore, in the event that federal funding for the above Community Development Block Grant budget is less than the total appropriation amount provided for in this Resolution, then, and in such event, the City Manager, or his designee in the Office of Economic & Community Development, is authorized to proportionately reduce the amounts for the budgetary categories stated above, as well as for any planned grants and/or other expenditures made from within such budgetary categories. **CC FY 15 AB 127**


In our presentation, we will have exact wording, and the rational in supporting it.

- The NH Department of Revenue Administration has completed its review of Rochester's 2014 Assessing Manual for USPAP compliance. Two separate reports from the DRA have concluded that the 2014 appraisal of the City complies with all requirements set forth in Standard 6 of USPAP and all applicable laws and regulations. Additionally, the Assessing Department and the Board of Assessors received the following commendation: "We commend the Rochester Assessing Department and the Board of Assessors for taking a proactive approach in addressing the need to keep values current and to provide equity within the City. It is our belief that from the evidence provided, the 2014 valuation update was performed with defensible analysis to ensure that all values generated from the sales analysis will be accurate and proportionate."
- Completion of the building permits is delayed due to both the extraordinary amount of snowfall and the slow melting of the snow. The field staff is diligently working to accomplish the goal of completing the building permits as soon as possible.
- As we approach the numerous statutory deadlines in April, the staff continues to verify income and assets of those with exemptions, accept new applications from veterans, review the status of religious, charitable and educational properties, close out building permits and perform daily duties.
- The field staff continues to conduct home visits to elderly or disabled exemption applicants that are unable to come in to the office to apply.




Vital Statistics

Code Compliance Deficiencies

There are up to four steps of actions being used to deal with complaints/ violations: The first being verbal contact. The next method is a written notice of violation. This consists of a notice that is mailed first class as well as certified mail giving the property owner or violator a detailed description of the deficiencies and a date to make the appropriate corrections. The requested date depends on the time that is considered reasonable for the requested action that needs corrected, for instance, a minor repair to a fence may warrant a couple of days, while replacing an entire fence may require a few weeks. If there has been no contact made by the recipient of the notice, a follow up inspection is then made. If the violation(s) still exist, a second notice of violation is mailed with a new correction date on it. This process is then followed through again with a final notice. If the violation has still not been corrected after these notices, the paper work is turned over to Attorney O'Rourke for legal/court action to be taken. If the violation was a time sensitive issue, such as trash piling up, we would skip the second notice and go straight to a final notice to help expedite the process.

Economic Development Specialist ***Workforce Development Strategy***

Jenn is working closely with the Richard W. Creteau Regional Technology Center to kick off the newest Career Assistance Workshop. The focus of the event is to provide students and parents with the fundamentals in job/life skills including preparing for interviews, dressing for success, establishing credit, and future planning such as retirement.

In addition, Jenn is collaborating with Dean Graziano, Spaulding High School Extended Learning Coordinator, connecting local companies to place students with summer jobs, internships and job shadows. Companies from across sectors, including hospitality, administration, construction and manufacturing, (Severino and Waterstone Retail to name a few), are very receptive about creating employment pathways for Rochester's qualified and educated students.

Technical Review Group

With the summer season nearing, the TRG group is working on the approval process for new events that will be held at the fairgrounds. TRG will be working closely with the Fairgrounds Board of Directors to create an SOP for special events in the future. A total of 7 large, (5 of those with FestEvents), now have all the approvals necessary. "The Biggest Yard Sale Ever" is obtaining their second hand dealers license.

Farmer's Market Initiative

A committee formed to spearhead an initiative to attract a larger Farmers Market to be set up on the Commons for 2016. Jenn is coordinating with Main Street and the Recreation Department, to secure insurance coverage and the schedule to present to the Zoning Board. The committee will be applying for a variance as Farmers Markets are not allowed in R2 zones. Once the variance is approved, the committee will move forward to recruit farmers. Once the market is established and operational, it will be run directly by 2-3 local farmers, with aspirations to grown to include local artisans and crafts.

- Hanson Pines Pavilion: The Community Development Coordinator has met with the Department of Public Works to coordinate on this project. This project should go out to bid in early April. The project is planned to begin construction in May and to finish in June.
- Public Library HVAC System: The Community Development Coordinator has submitted the final environmental review paperwork to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and does not anticipate issues in receiving approval for the project. The Community Development Coordinator has also met with the Department of Public Works to coordinate on this project. This project should go out to bid in early April. The project is planned to begin construction in May and to finish in June.
- ***Potential Future Projects***
 - Bicycle Racks: The City Manager has confirmed that there are pre-existing bicycle racks located at City Hall and the Rochester Public Library. These pre-existing racks might be considered for placement in more easily visible locations during the bicycle racks project implementation.
 - Handicap-Accessible Elevator Lift at Spaulding High School: School Department Buildings & Grounds director Richard Bickford has stated that, if automatic door openers are installed in the area of the elevator lift, the total cost would be an additional \$9,000. (There are three doors that would need openers, and the cost is \$3,000 per door.)
 - River Walk Project: The Planning Department has contacted the Community Development Coordinator to discuss the possibility of partial CDBG funding for a project extending the Cocheco River river walk downtown. (The 2004 design charrette for downtown development, including river walk plans, can be found at <http://www.rochesternh.net/sites/rochesternh/files/file/file/rochestercharrettebook.pdf>.)

DEMOGRAPHICS SHAPE NEW ENGLAND'S ECONOMY

AT THE MOMENT, CONSUMERS ARE DRIVING THE NATION'S ECONOMIC BUS.

➤➤ When it comes to the nation's economic performance, 2015 is shaping up to be a better year than 2014. And 2015 will potentially be a better year than 2016, says Ken Goldstein, an economist for The Conference Board, based in New York City.

A review of business investment and trade activities finds these areas will remain weak for most of the year. And while consumers will continue as the driving force in the economy throughout most of the year, it will not continue,

tapering off late in the year or in early 2016.

Behind the positive economic outlook is the fact that job growth wasn't just good in 2014 — it was very good. The nation was well above the 200,000 new job rate per month in 2014, and the numbers are expected to remain the same in 2015. What's more, the economic forecast calls for the growth to continue in 2016.

In addition to healthy job creation numbers, 2015 will usher in small increases in wages, as well as contin-

ued breaks in terms of gasoline prices.

"Based on the results of our consumer confidence survey, we see the job market, and even wages, moving up from a 2 percent rate of growth to a 3 percent rate of growth by the end of the year," Goldstein says.

Below, we learn that New England's economy will fare well in 2015; however, its economic picture looks different than the rest of the nation. Goldstein discusses the region's decline in population, the shifts in its economy and main industries, and what these features point to in 2015.

Rachel Duran: The Conference Board's "Employment Trends Index" for January came in at 127.86, up from 127.17 in December, and a 7.6 percent increase from a year ago. What does all this mean for the economy, and in particular, New England?

Ken Goldstein: I think New England is not terribly different from the rest of the country. One big feature, and it is not necessarily an economic feature, is the region's demographics.

In New England, baby boomers are retiring — not slowly — there are massive numbers of folks who are leaving the workforce. In fact, if you look at the country as a whole, the civilian labor force increased by nearly 1 percent over the last 12 months. New England's civilian labor force declined by nearly 0.7 percent.

New England's population is declining. Now, maybe some of that is due to folks who want to get away from the weather up there. I think it is more about the workforce. In the Northeast Corridor, which we define

MY FRIEND'S PLACE 2013-14 ANNUAL REPORT

During this past fiscal year we were able to provide emergency shelter for 199 individuals. We have a vacancy in our transitional housing unit, 3 are occupied. We had 4 families move from transitional housing this year. We expect funding from the Department of Housing and Urban Development to remain in the transitional program through August 2016.

The shelter provided 6334 bed nights during this year 7/1/13 – 6/30/14 while serving 199 people (123 total adults, and 32 children who were in 17 families). Average stay at the shelter is 38 days. We served 39 Rochester residents who stayed a total of 1223 days for an average 31 days. The total cost of shelter and services to these individuals was \$51,366. Our cost per day is \$42.00 though because of our fundraising our bills to cities and towns for service is approximately \$10 per day. Cost to the City of Rochester would have been \$12,000.

Individuals staying at the shelter included 25% with mental health issues currently being treated with medication and/or therapy. We still see a high number of clients with drug/alcohol related issues that have contributed to their being homeless. In addition to a weekly meeting on site, residents are required to attend daily AA meetings or participate in a therapy program.

We held numerous fund raising events this year including 10 events of charitable gaming netting \$7,400, a weekly bingo game, and the annual Hike for the Homeless which netted \$2,000, and our annual direct solicitation bringing in approximately \$13,000. This direct mail was sent out in November and returns are coming in for this year. Our bingo game generated \$63,772 for the past 12 months (through Nov 30, 2014). Projections for FY2014 are lower due to a reduced number of players – we can expect \$50,000 through July 2015.

We also participated in the 21st annual WHEB lend a helping can drive sponsored by the morning buzz at WHEB. We expect to receive \$6,500 in January 2015 from this event. These funds are used to support the needs of clients by providing paper products, food, cleaning supplies, and other needed items. This year we participated in the letter carriers food drive and the Rollinsford Police department food drive.

Our funding sources include the State of New Hampshire emergency shelter grant and the State of New Hampshire McKinny Grant. (Total \$86,948). We will be applying for funding through the state of NH for continuation of the shelter grants. These grant applications are due in January 2015. We received funds from the community Development Block Grant programs in Dover and Rochester. Rochester provided \$6,000 for program operations, while Dover provided \$9,000 for operations. We received a \$40,000 grant for repairs for the shelter and transitional programs from Dover community Development Block Grants. The repairs included a new roof for the shelter, exterior painting and new storm windows for 25 East Concord

Starting his own business was a big leap, says Godbout. "It was) nerve-wracking at first, but I have no regrets and I am optimistic about the company's future."

As with many new companies today, success is dependent on talent, owing much to the dedication of the team, the human capital. Brian appreciates his employees and their contributions.

Godbout said he will never forget the first time he handed out paychecks. "It was a great feeling," he said. "The guys stepped up and worked hard, and I was very grateful. Pay day was more than just giving them a check, it was my opportunity to bring honor to them and the future of the company."



The success of the Granite Ridge Development District along with the increasing demand for hotel and meeting space, has led to the consideration of doing a feasibility study for a hotel and conference center that would serve the Seacoast Region and the many businesses that are in need of professional meeting and conference space. The Holiday Inn Express is reporting excellent bookings to capacity again for the summer of 2015, and are unable to meet the demand for meeting space.

The Rochester Economic Development Commission gave a unanimous endorsement to proceed on February 12. Doing feasibility studies and planning for development is specifically included in the REDC responsibilities. Unfortunately I was ill on February 26 when the Community Development Committee met last, but I am seeking an endorsement from the committee on March 26th to be able to continue forward.

DISCOVERING THE NEW
AND REVISITING THE CLASSIC
BY SUSAN LAUGHLIN

The stretch of highway between Epping and Rochester is both scenic with rolling farmlands and newly developed with contemporary strip malls. In between are historic buildings, landmark restaurants and enterprising individuals.

I headed up Rte. 125 with breakfast in Rochester as my first goal. With a little online research, an array of dining options had been winnowed down to a select three. Along the way I noticed other stop-worthy spots, but as I had learned from previous trips, pressing on was the right thing to do. Maybe there would be time on the way back. That's the good thing about returning on the same roads.

Arriving in Rochester, I immediately got lost. This city must have been designed by a drunken spider. The web of roads involves several center points and deflects out from there on one-way streets. The town obviously has French-Canadian roots. I twice passed a private club called, what else but, "Le Club." Of course, I think in my best Pink Panther imitation. Eventually, I found South Main Street east of North Main Street, or so it seemed. My destination was just as described on all the foodie sites — a breakfast mecca for locals set in a congested parking lot.

I had chosen Benedict's Grill because eggs Benedict is the ultimate breakfast — and a good harbinger of morning happiness, if done right. The place was packed on a Saturday morning and obviously with locals. They knew, right off, the thing to do was sign in on the clipboard mounted near the door. Owner Alicia Frye was continually helping people get seated. The vibe was very much mom-and-pop breakfast joint with friendly chatter, a good splay of windows for light, plus homey décor with table and counter seating.

A crowded parking lot can be a good sign, plus in this case, if you find a spot your wait will not be too long. In about 10 minutes I was shown a seat at the counter. The service is quick — had the coffee and menu in no time. I noticed about eight or so Benedicts on the menu, but most seemed like typical offerings with spinach, asparagus or guacamole. The blackboard specials were very appealing and I chose the tandoori chicken Benedict with hummus and a curried Hollandaise sauce. Turned out it was very flavorful. The Hollandaise sauce was not my favorite rendition, as it was more cheesy than lemony, but with the curry spices it worked.

Other popular blackboard specials that are often repeated are the taco scramble and strawberry cheesecake French toast. While dining, I saw some beautiful pot pies go out the door and a batch of freshly fried cake donuts being taken across the street to sell at a local Saturday market. "Alicia

» makes them by special request," said a server. Maybe she should put them on the menu too.

Alicia and her husband Ron, the chef, have been in the restaurant business for more than 30 years, opening Benedict's about 12 years ago. Some of their clientele have been following them for years, says Alicia, adding, "I have seen families grow up through the years." It's that kind of business — family to family. But, even if you are a first-timer, you'll soon feel the love. Total strangers helped me with my camera, my dropped glove and overlooked my annoying stares at their food.

Following North Main Street around those infernal three-block roundabouts, I located a relatively new gastropub. Revolution Taproom & Grill, opened last October in the location of the former Fat Tony's in the heart of downtown. Rochester's Main Street is a step back in time. Fortunately, there aren't many vacancies, though the nearby Publick House recently closed. But retail options on the block are an odd assortment of formal wear, vintage video games at Collec-tiques, historic vinyl at Skele-Tone Records and old comics at Jetpack. Certainly it's a hot destination for those living in an alternative, but nostalgic, universe. All right, all right, I confess to picking up some "Star Wars" figures.

But step into Revolution and Rochester looks like it won the war. At least owner Mark Marchionni had the confidence to put money into a rundown site and give people a reason to come to town. He had been told Rochester was a little rough around the edges, but he says, "I'm from Philadelphia, where there are areas you just should not walk through. This town has only small problems in comparison."

Marchionni had experience owning

and running brewpubs and wanted to make beer the focus of this enterprise. Now he has a great choice of 40 beers on tap, with a few local and the other top choices including Lagunitas Brewing Company, Victory Brewing Company and Brooklyn Brewery. The back of the bar also sports a nice selection of whiskeys and bourbons. It's always good to have a nice brew in hand, but the food and the ambiance are the real stars.

The space is nicely arranged with no area so large it seems impersonal. A perfect blend of brick, barn board and metal give the rooms a very pleasant feel. Upstairs, a new game room offers darts, pool tables and a Wii. For some reason I just wanted to sit and stay the entire afternoon under the gaze of the George Washington portrait. I guess the General is there to free diners from the tyranny of boring meals.

The inspired and somewhat revolutionary menu is under the direction of Executive Chef Dale Raymond, formerly of the Eagle Mountain House in Jackson. He has something for all appetites, from pub snacks to entrées and salads in two sizes, plus the requisite burgers and fries, here labeled frites. Their veggie burger is made with roasted beets and beans. How's that for a coup?

Other creative takes on pub dining include cauliflower "wings," a gnoc-chi mac and cheese, kale fried rice and bourbon-glazed drumsticks. Creative salads include baby arugula with confit red and golden beets dressed with a blood-orange basil vinaigrette. The frites are twice-fried Green Thumb potatoes served with truffle oil and Asiago cheese. Or offered plain, but who would order that?

With snow on the horizon, I pried myself from the bar stool and headed out of town. I was going south, but it seemed

like west. Somehow that town has its own rules for global positioning.

For a diversion I stopped at Calef's Country Store in Barrington. They are the perfect Disneyland version of a New Hampshire country store. It's really prettier than it should be. They have all manner of jarred and packaged foods and candies, some of it locally sourced, including the breads. Their sandwich shop is an option for a to-go lunch. Their own cheeses are in the deli case and a beautiful pile of fresh, nicely rendered bacon was ready to layer between two slices of Jessica's bread.

A half block south on Rte. 125 is Dante's Pasta & Vino, or as it is also called, Dante's Bistro Bar and Grill. Oh, and Adagio, a salon and spa extraordinaire, is part of the operation. This is another mom-and-pop shop of sorts where Dante D'Antilio, from Italy, runs the restaurant and his wife Jules operates the spa.

Dante's restaurant has been there for almost 25 years, but he continues to improve the menu and space. As an old farmhouse, the dining space is tucked in tiny rooms, and the bar area is also welcoming. Somehow the bricks and old wood and assorted ephemera that line the walls create a nice womb-like space to spend time in idle chatter with a nice glass of wine.

Red wines are the perfect accompaniment to many of the menu items. Dante likes to offer good value, and many are just \$7 a glass and range from \$22 a bottle. One of my favorite menu items is the pizza crudo a mano. Dante had just returned from Rome in 2006 and brought back this simple concept of grilled Italian bread with prosciutto di Parma, fresh mozzarella, basil leaves, sliced tomatoes, cherry peppers and olive oil. It's like an uncooked pizza, but a sublime experience (\$10). Many of his dishes are inspired by the Spaghetti House of Montereale in Italy. Outsourcing is often local; in summer, the backyard garden.

Dante was headed back to Italy for another extended trip soon and, alas, the snow was getting heavier. I needed to head home too. Along Rte. 125, many more roadside eateries, friendly folks and interesting stories were beckoning.

There's always a reason to head up Rte. 125. Here's one. May 8-17 is the Lilac Festival — it seems Rochester is the Lilac City and a good place to get a beer. **NH**

Delish Deli

INSPIRED BY THE CUISINE OF CAMPANIA
BY BARBARA LAUTERBACH

In Italian, the word "piccolo" means small, but there is nothing small about the variety of delicacies available at the new delicatessen, Piccolo Market, on Rte. 25 in Moultonborough. Chef/owner Bill Bennett opened his deli with a small café in late December and has been adding delicious items to his menu ever since. Bennett, originally from Fairfield County, Conn., has been in the restaurant business all his life. After graduating from Connecticut Culinary Institute, he interned at La Provence in Norwalk, Conn. He previously owned Maestro's in North Conway before opening Piccolo Market. His mother, a native of Savignano in the region of Campania, inspired Bennett to pursue the cuisine of her native land.

You may eat in or take the food to go. There are daily specials such as cabbage leaves stuffed with risotto and Bennett's own house-made sausage or eggplant rollatini, braciolo or a calamari salad.

A recent addition is a fall-off-the-bone pork osso buco.

The deli specializes in all manner of Italian meats, including prosciutto, soppressata and mortadella. Mozzarella is made in-house, and a variety of Italian cheeses — pecorino, Parmesan and fontina — are ready for slicing.

The rustic sandwich bread comes from the Terra Nova Bakery in New York, and the sandwiches range from the Genovese (grilled eggplant, basil pesto, tomato, Piccolo mozzarella for \$7.85) to the turkey all'aglio (Piccolo roasted turkey, homemade garlic-sage mayo, tomato, pancetta, fontina for \$7.85).

House-made soups change daily.

Pizzas are made to order, and fresh salads such as the Calabrese (greens, tomato, roasted peppers, Crotonese cheese, assorted Italian olives and soppressata for \$7.85) are also featured.

A catering menu is also available with lasagna, antipasti, braciolo, sausage and peppers and more.

A market shelf in the deli section of the café offers pastas, olive oils, flavored vinegars as well as Italian specialty crackers.

Take note of the beautiful photos of Savignano and the Italian countryside that are tastefully displayed — all were photographed by Bennett.

A visit to Piccolo is a visit to Italy, right in Moultonborough.

MONTHLY REPORT
MARCH 2015

On behalf of the Fire Department, I am pleased to provide you with the following report. It serves as a summary of the activities, projects and programs underway within the department.

DEPARTMENT INFORMATION:

March was extremely busy. If not in the number of calls, the severities of the fires were significant. During the month of March the Department responded to 217 calls for service. Of those calls this month, 4 were multi-alarm working structure fires, and 1 first alarm structure fire. Two of these fires occurred in two consecutive days and two others occurred within three days of each other. 5 additional calls were for minor fires including vehicle fires, dumpster fires and boiler malfunctions.

Firefighters also responded to 107 calls for vehicle accidents, and medical calls as well as 5 calls for mutual aid assistance. The remaining calls included everything from alarm activations, good intent calls, and public service calls, as well as a multitude of various other type calls.

Call volume is down from February with 22 fewer runs this month; however, in comparison, March of 2014 there were 153 calls which indicate a 41.8% increase this March over the same period last year.

ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF:

The Police Chief and myself conducted dispatch interviews for one open position.

I attended the monthly cost containment meeting.

Staff met with Fire Tech and Safety, our air pak vendor, to put all the new air paks in service.

I conducted employee evaluations with three staff members.

Staff attended a meeting with all the shift officers.

FIRE PREVENTION:

This past month was a very busy month at the Fire Department. One fire in particular highlights the need to share a reminder: Never leave your cooking unattended, even for a moment. It can have disastrous results. The fire department responded to a serious house fire where, just for a moment, a mother left her food unattended on the stove, and answered the door. Thankfully her smoke detectors worked and alerted her of the fire, and she was able to rescue 3 small children from the house before the fire injured them, but it was a close call.

DUTY SHIFT:

There were 19 training sessions for the month. All Rochester firefighters spent the month training on the new SCBA purchased by the department and on the new tracking equipment for the SCBA. Each shift also completed the required monthly medical training to maintain their certifications.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT:

I met with Julia Chase from NH Emergency Management to discuss the Grant for the Emergency Operations Center Project.

Mike Bezanson and I met with Julia Chase from NH Emergency Management to discuss the spring thaw and the effect on the Salmon Falls River and the Cocheco River.

I met with Julia Chase from NH Emergency Management to work on the FY16 Seabrook Power Plant reception center budget.



MONTHLY REPORT

March 2015

There were a total of 20,776 items circulated with 11,915 people visiting the library in the month of March. Three hundred eight patrons used the library's Internet computers for 1,602 hours. Visitors to the library's web site numbered 8,998. Current number of patron registrations is 34,745. Interlibrary loan activity included 81 materials borrowed from other libraries and 343 loaned to other libraries.

Spring Story Times began in the month of March with 265 children attending 21 Story Times. On March 7th the children's room staff had thirty-seven enthusiastic children creating treasure pouches to bring home during a successful "Make-It and Take-It" program.


Wednesday, March 4th the Library was pleased to present "Seed Starting" a UNH Cooperative Extension program. This presentation discussed the basic principles for successfully starting garden seeds in your home. Participants learned how to grow good quality transplants from seed through setting them out in the garden.

Wednesday, March 11th the UNH Cooperative Extension was back to present a beginner's course in vegetable gardening. This presentation covered basic considerations for the beginning home gardener when planning a vegetable garden. Topics included vegetable types and families, soil testing and amendments, soil preparation, timing, production techniques and tools, harvest, storage and addressing common vegetable gardening problems.



PLANNING DEPARTMENT MONTHLY REPORT FOR MARCH 2015

The Planning Board, Conservation Commission, Historic District Commission, and the Arts & Culture Commission all met in the month of March. The Planning Board reviewed three applications in March and those are listed below. They approved two of the applications and the third was a preliminary application so while they held a discussion on the project, no action was taken on that application. The Planning Board also held a discussion with the City Engineer, Jen Hale, on the possibility of a surety release and were also introduced to, and held a discussion with, Jen Marsh from the Economic Development Department. The Conservation Commission activity and the Historic District Commission activity are also listed below. The Arts and Culture Commission discussion is also listed below.

The Planning Staff attended various meetings and workshops throughout the month of March. One of those meetings was on developing a "workflow" for the new permitting software that describes the responsibilities and work done by the Department. This will be an important part of the new software. Staff also attended the Codes and Ordinance Committee meeting to discuss the draft sign ordinance and attended the TRG meeting for applications that will be going to the Planning Board. Staff also met with representatives from the Rochester Fairgrounds, met with representatives from Waterstone Development on the Granite Ridge Development, and various other meetings with developers and citizens of Rochester. The staff also kept working on changes to the ordinance including the proposed updated Sign Ordinance and proposed updated Aquifer protection Ordinance. The Director also attended a Continuity of Operations (COOP) meeting to help create a plan for emergency situations that the City may be faced with in the future. He also attended a quarterly meeting of the New Hampshire Economic Development Association.





RE: Monthly Report – March 2015

OPERATIONS: There was only one ward meeting this period in Ward six. Areas of discussion included Bridging the Gaps, Drug Court, National Night Out, and ward-specific information from the compstat report. Comm. Lindsay encouraged people to attend the upcoming NH Listens event. Ward officers have been working to solve several burglaries that have occurred in Gonic in the Stillwater neighborhood. They have been conducting extra patrols, handing out informational pamphlets and doing park and walks in the neighborhoods speaking with residents.

There were 30 cases sent up from patrol to the investigations bureau for review and or investigation. Currently there are 40 cases assigned for investigation. Detectives are investigating a day time burglary involving two suspects that assaulted a resident. The theft investigation at the Gafney Home has been concluded and an arrest has been made. We logged 303 pieces of evidence and returned 78 pieces to owners. The crimes against person's detectives completed three compliance checks of sex offenders.

COMP STAT: Patrol continues to work on the strategy of heavy self-initiated activity in areas that have identified drug issues. In spite of significant snow fall throughout the winter traffic stops remain high. There were 1108 traffic stops this period. Property crime continues an overall downward trend year to date.

COMMUNICATIONS: There is still one vacancy in the Communications Center. We have been notified that we will have a State NCIC audit in May and a Federal NCIC audit in June. The dispatch team leaders are working with Sgt. Deluca on this

process. The dispatchers and records clerk are working on the master name files on missing identifiers and potential duplicate names.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT OFFICER: This was formerly our POP report. Officer Hayes continues to work with our citizens through social media. It is overall a positive tool for the Department. Planning is underway for the annual Wings and Wheels event at Skyhaven Airport

K9: There were three tracks and five drug searches in Rochester. The team also participated in a search of the high school.

HONOR GUARD: We had a member of the honor guard at the funeral services for former City Manager and Police Commissioner Gary Stenhouse. He was a valued resource in municipal government and a friend to many city staff.

DIVERSION: Teen Night on March 7 had 265 participants. We have had very generous donations to the program, and costs for the rest of the year have been covered by Holy Rosary Credit Union, the American Legion and Rochester Rotary.

ADMINISTRATIVE: the Police Department is set to present our budget to the City Council on May 12, 2015.

Our FY 15 budget continues to show we will end the fiscal year with a surplus. Savings will be realized in salary and benefit lines.

We are in the process of renewing maintenance bids and purchasing for the next two year period. We will seek bids for uniforms and equipment, preventive vehicle maintenance, vehicle repairs, vehicle equipment maintenance, dry cleaning, radio and communication service and repairs and car washes.

We recorded 100 hours of training this period. The majority was for simunitions training as well as for child seat safety course. We are working on hosting an evidence collection training course.

Officer Marvin was released to solo patrol this period. We will have three officers graduate from the Academy on April 10, 2015. We will fill our final open police officer position on April 13, 2015 with our newest officer Jennifer Arrajj. She will be sworn in at a special meeting of the Police Commission scheduled for April 23, 2015.

The Department has been at the forefront of the work being done to bring Naloxone (Narcan) an opiate inhibitor to the hands of first responders. This could

be critical in opiate overdose situations. That work has paid off as the NH Department of Safety through the Division of Fire Standards and Training and Emergency Medical Services has developed training criteria for law enforcement. We will be working with Frisbie Hospital on becoming affiliated with their EMS unit.

There were no Taser displays or deploys this period.





Proactive by Shift March 2015




Proactive By Shift YTD





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ROCHESTER DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS MONTHLY REPORT FOR MARCH 2015

NOTE FROM THE INTERIM DIRECTOR: During the month of March, Jennifer Hale was hired as Assistant City Engineer. Jennifer serves as the liaison to Planning and Economic Development, the City's Storm Water Engineer, and the Department's Permit/License Officer, along with her other engineering duties.

HIGHWAY AND UTILITIES

Highway Division responded to average number (93) service calls which were either completed or scheduled for repair. Our service calls for the month included a variety of request including sign repair, pothole repair, and dead animal removal. The staff went out to plow, treat and to remove snow on several winter events. A total of 7,608 tons snow removed in the downtown areas. Three storm basins were repaired at City Hall, Old Dover Rd. and Woodman St. Maintenance for the month involved patching holes and broken pavement, adding gravel to dirt roads, and there were several traffic light repairs. In addition to working on minor vehicle maintenance, the Fleet Maintenance Division finished all state inspections. They also installed a new transmission cooler on a ten wheel truck (#9), and they are working to get the sweeper up and going for spring.

The Utilities Division performed typical maintenance on the water and sewer systems. We have been cleaning catch basins and culverts that are full of debris. Staff continues to blow out water gates in the city, and continues with manhole inspections. With the warmer weather upon us, we have had two sewer cleaning crews out almost every day cleaning the sewer manholes and sewer lines though out the City. Staff continues to work with the roads division on winter maintenance on plowing and treating roads. The water division has had a couple of water service repairs and water main breaks this month. Frozen services at homes and businesses continued to be an issue through all of March. Staff continues to assist with thawing of pipes and we estimate 30 to 35 services freeze ups this year. The water division has been fixing and replacing fire hydrants that have frozen and that have been hit by vehicles during the winter months. New reflective hydrant markers have been installed where necessary.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

The Buildings and Grounds Department responded to a total of 64 service requests in the month of March. Staff finished painting the City Clerk's office which included removing the old carpet, adding a subfloor, and putting the furniture back in place after the new carpet was installed. We painted the walls and removed old carpet in one of the offices at D.P.W. The Gonic Fire station kept staff busy this month. We plumbed in a new drain and new supply lines for their new washer and dryer. New England Roofing was called to fix a couple of roof panels that had slid down during the winter. The vent pipe needed to be repaired as a result of the roof panels sliding. Honeywell installed a new ductless split heater and A/C in the Code Enforcement office. The staff also assisted in the set up of the new City Attorney's office. All building inspections of air filters, emergency lights and exit signs were completed. J&D Power Equipment completed the semiannual on generators at the DPW, Gonic Fire, Police Dept. and City Hall. Honeywell came into Department of Health and Human Services to balance the heating and A/C air flow. Seacoast Door replaced a door opener for the garage door at Gonic

station and another at Central Station. Now that the snow is finally melting, we are starting to pick up branches and trash as it is revealed from the melting snow.

WATER TREATMENT PLANT

Treated water volume for the month of March 2015 was approximately 47.7 million gallons from the surface water treatment plant and 7.0 million gallons from groundwater.


All water quality testing and monitoring was completed in accordance with NHDES requirements. We are pleased to report that the City of Rochester again met and exceeded all State and Federal standards for drinking water. Equipment and grounds maintenance was performed at the WTF, well, and tanks/stations, and inspections conducted within the watershed and structures. Reservoir monitoring shows increased meltwater flow and elevated iron and dissolved CO₂. Staff inspected Round Pound, Tufts Pond, and transmission mains for spring watershed management. Maintenance at the well included bicarbonate feed system cleaning and analyzer calibration. Maintenance at the WTF included sedimentation basin trough cleaning; carbon filter dewatering/rinsing (for valve replacement and determining media stability); replacement of online turbidimeters; inspection and PM for all standby generators; relocation of chlorine feed pump and replacement of injection line; and installation of a new peristaltic feed pump for the oxidized caustic line. The TOC analyzer was serviced and will require additional repairs. Filter upgrade work to date includes replacement of mud, drain, and influent valves in the filter room; installation of rolling overhead doors; delivery of chemical bulk and day tanks; temporary chemical feed line and manifold installation; and containment wall construction. The water system emergency response plan was updated and submitted electronically to NHDES. Staff attended training seminars on the revised total coliform rule, sourcewater protection, intake structure inspection, fluoridation analysis, and valve and hydrant maintenance.

WASTEWATER TREATMENT FACILITY


Items that were completed during the month of March: We continue to work with the coalition of communities on related wastewater and Great Bay Estuary issues. Radiator repair for Salmon Falls Road pump station generator completed. Semi-annual generator service completed on all sewer department generators. Construction activity has started for the New 125 pump station upgrade. Staff replaced interface on control panel for disk filter #3 and completed a chemical cleaning on disk filter #3. The City of Gardner toured the headwork's facility as they are in the design stage for replacement of their mechanical bar screen unit. Staff and our consultant attended the New 125 pump station upgrade construction meeting. City of Concord came on site to tour pump station installations as they are in the process of evaluating pump station manufacturers. We have been working with industries on our industrial pretreatment related issues. Flow Assessment Company was on site to perform quarterly maintenance to our two in-line flow meters. We are currently in the process of reviewing bid specs. Staff attended State sponsored training classes. Repairs were made to the UV disinfection system. Staff performed preventative and corrective maintenance on equipment, machinery and instrumentation. All required testing for the EPA and State has been completed and submitted. Average effluent flow for the month = 3.074 Million Gallons per Day (MGD). Percent of design flow = 61.1%. Percent of design flow for 2015 = 57.0%. Precipitation = 2.04".

- **Chesley Hill Road Reconstruction:** Construction Bid was awarded to J.H. Lyman & Sons, Inc. Construction.
- **Granite Ridge Public Outlay:** Construction contract has been signed with Severino Trucking Co. Inc. Construction in 2015.
- **Water Storage Tank Rehabilitation:** Construction contract has been signed with Utility Service Co., Inc. Construction in 2015.
- **Surface Water Treatment Plant Upgrades:** Construction is continuing and is scheduled to be completed in late summer/fall 2015.
- **Rte. 125 Pump Station:** On-site work has started. Progress of contractor is slow.
- **Rochester Reservoir West End Spillway Modifications:** Design complete. Pursuing a wetlands permit. Construction in 2015.
- **Salmon Falls Road/Milton Road Water and Sewer (EDA Project):** Design continues. Anticipate construction start in summer 2015.
- **Howard Brook Culverts Replacement:** Finalizing design. Anticipate construction in 2015.
- **Franklin St.-Western Ave.-Adams Ave. Road and Utility Reconstruction:** Design is progressing. Anticipate construction start in summer 2015. Western Ave./First St. Pump Station Replacement has been rolled into this project. This project is recommended to be split into a base contract which would rebuild the Western Ave sewer pump station and rebuild Franklin St. and an alternate to rebuild the roadway and utilities in 1st-5th Streets, Western and Adams Avenues. Additional funding requested for FY16.
- **Salmon Falls Rd. HSIP Curve Softening Project:** Working with property owners to obtain necessary temporary and permanent construction easements. Future of this project uncertain due to challenges with obtaining easements.
- **Strafford Square Roundabout:** Federal funding not available until Federal Fiscal Year 2016 (Oct 2015). Design is underway. Obtaining costs from utility companies associated with placing above-ground utilities underground. Construction funds requested for FY16.
- **Wakefield Street Reconstruction:** Preliminary design completed. 30% design plans to be completed by April. Final Design/Construction funding requested for FY16.
- **Colonial Pines Sewer / Wastewater Interceptor Upgrades:** Design underway. Construction funds to be sought in FY16-18 budgets.
- **Milton Road Corridor Analysis:** Final report to be presented to Planning Board on 4/20/15.
- **NPDES Permit - Wastewater/MS4 Permit - Stormwater:** Rochester recently agreed to certain conditions with EPA in exchange for additional time before a new NPDES permit is issued. The terms of the conditions include such activities as sampling, conducting studies, and development of plans related to nutrient reduction.


Partnering With Other Providers/Special Population Programs


Marketing/Branding Efforts
