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AMENDMENTS TO CHAPTER 42 OF THE GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER THE AQUIFER PROTECTION OVERLAY DISTRICT (APOD)

THE CITY OF ROCHESTER ORDAINS:

That subsections 42.10 of Chapter 42 of the General Ordinances of the City of Rochester regarding the Aquifer Protection Overlay District (APOD) and currently before the Rochester City Council, be amended as follows:

That subsection 42.10, presently before the Rochester City Council, be amended by deleting subsection 42.10 in its entirety, and by substituting in its stead, the following provisions, to be known as subsection 42.10 of the General Ordinances of the City of Rochester, to wit:

42.10 Aquifer Protection Overlay District [APOD]

- a. <u>Authority</u>. The City of Rochester hereby adopts this ordinance pursuant to the authority granted under RSA 674:16, in particular RSA 674:16, II relative to innovative land use controls.
- b. <u>Purpose</u>. The purpose of this ordinance is to preserve, maintain, and protect from contamination existing and potential groundwater supply areas that may be available for use as a current or future source of supply for Rochester's municipal water system. The ordinance serves as a public education tool to provide residents and small businesses awareness on typically unrecognized hazards.

c. Definitions.

- 1. Aquifer: for the purposes of this ordinance, a geologic formation composed of rock, sand, or gravel that contains significant amounts of potentially recoverable water. [NHDES Model Groundwater Protection Ordinance, Chapter 2.5 Protection of Groundwater and Surface Water Resources, Innovative Land Use Planning Techniques]
- 2. Fuel storage: see Chapter 42.2 of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Rochester, New Hampshire.
- 3. Gasoline station: see Chapter 42.2 of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Rochester, New Hampshire.
- 4. Groundwater: subsurface water that occurs beneath the water table in soils and geologic formations. [RSA 485-C (VIII), the Groundwater Protection Act]

- 5. Household hazardous waste collection project: any location that accumulates, collects, transfers, or otherwise manages household hazardous waste [Env-Hw 103.66, NH Code of Administrative Rules]
- 6. Impervious surface: a surface through which regulated substances cannot pass when spilled. The term includes concrete and asphalt unless unsealed cracks or holes are present, but does not include earthen, wooden, or gravel surfaces or other surfaces that could react with or dissolve when in contact with the substances stored on them. [*Env-Wq* 401.03(c), NH Code of Administrative Rules]
- 7. Junkyard: see Chapter 42.2 of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Rochester, New Hampshire.
- 8. Regulated container: any device in which a regulated substance is stored, transported, treated, disposed of, or otherwise handled, with a capacity of greater than or equal to five gallons. [Env-Wq 401.03(g), NH Code of Administrative Rules]
- 9. Regulated substance: any of the following, with the exclusion of all substances used for the treatment of drinking water or wastewater at department-approved facilities¹ [*Env-Wq 401.03(h), NH Code of Administrative Rules*]:
 - A. Petroleum products and their by-products of any kind, and in any form including, but not limited to, petroleum, fuel, sludge, crude, oil refuse or oil mixed with wastes and all other liquid hydrocarbons regardless of specific gravity and which are used as motor fuel, lubricating oil, or any oil used for heating or processing. Shall not include natural gas, liquefied petroleum gas or synthetic natural gas regardless of derivation or source. [RSA 146-A:2(III), Oil Discharge or Spillage in Surface Water or Groundwater]; or
 - B. Any substance that contains a regulated contaminant for which an ambient groundwater quality standard has been established pursuant to RSA 485-C:6; or
 - C. Any hazardous substance as listed in the 40 CFR Part 302, Table 302.4². Reportable quantity (RQ): the reportable quantities of hazardous substances as listed in 40 CFR Part 302, Table 302.4 under column heading final RQ pounds (Kg).
- 10. Rochester municipal water system: the public treatment and distribution system, which consists of water treatment plants, water main pipes, storage tanks, booster stations, and

- service connections that convey potable water for domestic, fire protection, and other community uses.
- 11. Sanitary protective radius: areas around a public water supply well which must be maintained in its natural state as required by Env-Dw 301.06 (small community wells); Env-Dw 302.06 (large community wells).
- 12. Seasonal high water table: the depth from the mineral soil surface to the upper most soil horizon that contains 2% or more distinct or prominent redoximorphic features that increase in percentage with increasing depth as determined by a licensed Hydrogeologist, Soils Scientist, Wetlands Scientist, Engineer or other qualified professional approved by the Planning Board or the shallowest depth measured from ground surface to free water that stands in an unlined or screened borehole for a period of one week or more³. [Env-Wq 1502.49, NHDES Alteration of Terrain]
- 13. Snow dump: for the purposes of this ordinance, a location where snow is placed for disposal from any off-site location (i.e. cleared from roadways, and/or motor vehicle parking areas). [NHDES Model Groundwater Protection Ordinance, Chapter 2.5 Protection of Groundwater and Surface Water Resources, Innovative Land Use Planning Techniques]
- 14. Stratified-drift aquifer: a geologic formation of predominately well-sorted sediment deposited by or in bodies of glacial meltwater, including gravel, silt, or clay, which contains sufficient saturated permeable material to yield significant quantities of water to wells. [RSA 485-C (XIV), the Groundwater Protection Act]
- 15. Wellhead protection areas the surface and subsurface area surrounding a water well or wellfield supplying a community public water system, through which contaminants are reasonably likely to move toward and reach such water well or wellfield. [RSA 485-C (XVIII), the Groundwater Protection Act]
- d. Aquifer Protection Overlay District Boundaries. The Aquifer Protection Overlay District (APOD) is an overlay district that is superimposed over the existing zoning. The APOD shall impose additional requirements and restrictions beyond the base zoning. Boundaries of the APOD shall be referenced by the latest edition of the map entitled "City of Rochester Aquifer Protection Overlay District." The District shall include:
 - 1. All delineated wellhead protection areas around existing and potential municipal production water wells, including a protective radial distance of 1,000ft⁴ around those wells (see definition for "wellhead protection area" in provision c).

- e. <u>Applicability</u>. This ordinance applies to all uses in the Aquifer Protection Overlay District, except for those uses exempt under this ordinance (see provision k).
- f. <u>Performance Standards</u>. The following Performance Standards apply to all uses in the Aquifer Protection Overlay District unless exempt under this ordinance (see provision k).
 - 1. For any use that will render impervious more than 20 percent⁵ of any lot or 5,000 square feet of land disturbance of any lot, whichever is greater, a stormwater management and erosion control plan, approved by the Planning Board and prepared in accordance with Chapter 50: Stormwater Management and Erosion Control shall be provided.
 - 2. Animal manures, fertilizers, and compost must be stored in accordance with the <u>Manual of Best Management Practices (BMPs) for Agriculture in New Hampshire</u>⁶ "New Hampshire Department of Agriculture, Markets, and Food," revised June 2011, and any subsequent revisions.
 - 3. All regulated substances within regulated containers or hazardous substances listed under 40 CFR 302.4 with a capacity equal to or greater than the reportable quantity must be used and stored in accordance with Env-Wq 401, <u>Best Management Practices for Groundwater Protections</u>⁷.
 - 4. All activities related to rock blasting must adhere to NHDES WD-10-12, <u>Best Management Practices for Blasting</u>⁸ "Rock Blasting and Water Quality Measures That Can be Taken to Protect Water Quality and Mitigate Impacts," prepared 2010, and any subsequent revisions.
- g. <u>Permitted Uses</u>. All uses permitted by right or allowed by special exception in the underlying district are permitted unless they are Prohibited Uses or Conditional Uses in the Aquifer Protection Overlay District. All uses must comply with the Performance Standards unless specifically exempt under this ordinance (see provision k).
- h. <u>Prohibited Uses</u>. The following uses are prohibited in the Aquifer Protection Overlay District:
 - 1. Development or operation of a solid waste facility.
 - 2. Outdoor storage of road salt or other deicing chemicals in bulk.
 - 3. Development or operation of a junkyard.
 - 4. Development or operation of a snow dump.
 - 5. Development or operation of a wastewater or septage lagoon.
 - 6. Development or operation of a petroleum bulk plant or terminal.
 - 7. Development or operation of gasoline stations.

- 8. Use of powdered ammonium nitrate fuel oil and explosives that contain perchlorate during blasting activities
- i. <u>Conditional Uses</u>. The Planning Board may vary the provisions herein by granting a conditional use permit in accordance with RSA 674:21 (II) to allow for a use which is otherwise permitted in the underlying district. The following conditions shall apply to all uses in the Aquifer Protection Overlay District:
 - 1. Storage, handling, and use of regulated substances in quantities exceeding 55 gallons per container or 660 pounds per container⁹ at any one time provided that an adequate regulated materials response plan has been submitted. This plan must address:
 - A. Description of the physical layout and a facility diagram, including all surrounding surface waters and wellhead protection areas.
 - B. Contact list and phone numbers for the facility response coordinator, cleanup contractors, and all appropriate federal, state, and local agencies who must be contacted in case of a release to the environment.
 - C. List of all regulated substances in use and locations of use and storage.
 - D. Description of containment and/or diversionary structures or equipment to prevent regulated substances from infiltrating into the ground.
 - E. List of positions within the facility that require training to respond to spills of regulated substances.
 - F. Prevention protocols that are to be followed after an event that causes large releases of any regulated substance.
 - 2. Any use that will render impervious more than 20 percent of any lot or 5,000 square feet of land disturbance, whichever is greater, provided that an adequate stormwater management plan has been submitted. This plan shall be prepared in accordance with Chapter 50: Stormwater Management and Erosion Control.
 - 3. Projects that will excavate more than a total of 5,000 cubic yards of bedrock through rock blasting activities within a two year period or are within a radial distance of 1,000 feet from a municipal production well provided that an adequate groundwater monitoring plan has been submitted. This plan must address:
 - A. Identification of potential sensitive receptors and evaluation hydrogeological background information.
 - B. Identification of monitoring well locations and install monitoring wells, where appropriate.

⁹ According to the Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration's <u>Emergency Response Guidebook</u>, large spills are defined as containers that are greater than 55 US gallons (208 liters) for liquids and greater than 660 pounds (300 kilograms) for solids with regard to initial isolation and protection action distances. This is a standard that is used by the bulk of the voluntary first responder organizations

- C. Collection of background water quality samples to identify, or rule out, preexisting groundwater contamination issues and to establish background chemistry levels and performance criteria for groundwater quality.
- D. Collection of periodic groundwater samples, including but not limited to nitrite/nitrates, as well as standard analysis for inorganic chemical, volatile organic chemical, and synthetic organic chemical contaminates as designated in Env-Dw 703 through Env-Dw 705, and ambient groundwater quality standards as designated in Env-Or 603, from the groundwater monitoring points during blasting, as well as collect water level data, when pertinent.
- E. Collection of post-blast groundwater samples (conducting multiple rounds of sampling may be prudent, and/or sampling could be ongoing for extended periods if contamination is detected as a result of the blasting).
- F. The Planning Board may, at its discretion, require a performance guarantee or bond in an amount conditions satisfactory to the Board, to be posted to ensure completion of construction of any facilities required for compliance with the Performance Standards.
- j. <u>Existing Nonconforming Uses</u>. Existing nonconforming structures and uses are exempt from this zoning ordinance under RSA 674:19. Any existing nonconforming structures and uses must be in compliance with Chapter 42.30 of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Rochester, New Hampshire.
- k. <u>Exemptions</u>. The following uses are exempt from the specified provisions of this ordinance as long as they are in compliance with all applicable local, state, and federal requirements:
 - 1. Any private residence, excluding home occupations, is exempt from all Performance Measures.
 - 2. Any business or facility where regulated substances are stored in regulated containers with a capacity of five or less gallons or where hazardous substances are stored in containers with a capacity of less than the reportable quantity is exempt from Performance Standard 3.
 - 3. Storage of heating fuels for on-site use or fuels for emergency electric generation, provided that storage tanks are indoors on a concrete floor or have corrosion control, leak detection, and secondary containment in place, is exempt from Performance Standard 3.
 - 4. Storage of motor fuel in tanks attached to vehicles and fitted with permanent fuel lines to enable the fuel to be used by that vehicle is exempt from Performance Standard 3.
 - 5. Storage and use of office supplies is exempt from Performance Standard 3.
 - 6. Temporary storage of construction materials on a site where they are to be used is exempt from Performance Standard C if incorporated within the site development project within six months of their deposit on the site.

- 7. The sale, transportation, and use of pesticides as defined in RSA 430:29 XXVI are exempt from all provisions of this ordinance.
- 8. Any non-reoccurring household hazardous waste collection projects regulated under NH Code of Administrative Rules Env-Wm 401.03(b)(1) and 501.01(b) are exempt from Performance Standard 3.
- 9. Underground storage tank systems and aboveground storage tank systems that are in compliance with applicable state rules are exempt from inspections under this ordinance (see provision m).
- l. <u>Relationship between State and Local Requirements</u>. Where both the State and the municipality have existing requirements, the more stringent shall govern.

m. Maintenance and Inspection.

- 1. For uses requiring planning board approval for any reason, a narrative description of maintenance requirements for structures required to comply with Performance Standards shall be recorded so as to run with the land on which such structures are located, at the Registry of Deeds for Strafford County. The description so prepared shall comply with the requirements of RSA 478:4-a.
- 2. Inspections shall be required to verify compliance with Performance Standards. Such inspections shall be performed by City staff at reasonable times with prior notice to the landowner.
- 3. All properties in the Aquifer Protection Overlay District known to City staff as using or storing regulated substances in regulated containers with a capacity greater than five gallons or hazardous substances with a capacity greater than the reportable quantity, except for facilities where all regulated substances storage is exempt from this ordinance (see provision k), shall be subject to inspections.
- 4. If applicable, a fee schedule shall be established by the City Council as provided for in RSA 41-9:A. The Rochester City Council shall require the fee be billed at an hourly rate as determined by the City of Rochester Public Works Department for compliance inspections. The fee shall be paid by the property owner.
- 5. City staff shall develop reporting and tracking criteria for properties in the Aquifer Protection Overlay District that are subject to compliance inspections. Property owners shall submit reports to the City on a biennial (every other year) basis.
- n. <u>Enforcement Procedures and Penalties</u>. Any violation of the requirements of this ordinance shall be subject to the enforcement procedures and penalties detailed in RSA 676 or RSA 485-C.
- o. <u>Saving Clause</u>. If any provision of this ordinance is found to be unenforceable, such provision shall be considered separable and shall not be construed to invalidate the remainder of the ordinance.

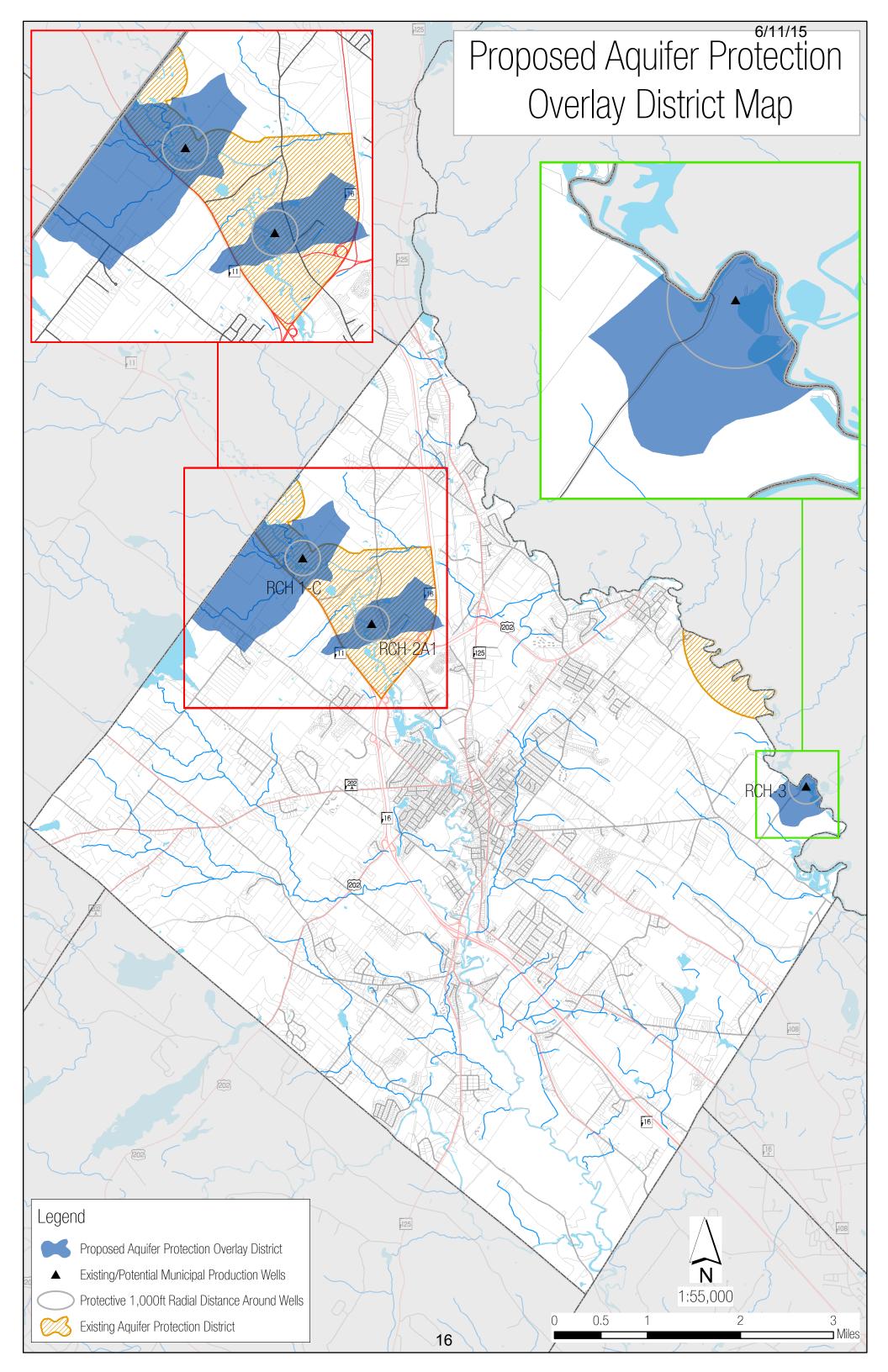
- p. <u>Repeal</u>. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this chapter are to the extent of the conflict, hereby repealed.
- q. <u>Effective Date</u>. This ordinance shall be effective upon adoption by the Rochester City Council.

On November 18, 2014, the Rochester City Council endorsed making revisions to the 28 year old Aquifer Protection Ordinance. From that time until now, several City departments and volunteers, and Stafford Regional Planning Commission have worked together to craft a revised ordinance.

The benefits to updating this current ordinanc include protecting public health and avoiding additional costs associated with water treatment. Additionally, adopting this ordinance will ensure that local groundwater management control remains local (NH RSA 485-C enables the State to create groundwater rules protect if local entities have not).

Several meetings were held with Planning Board and the Codes & Ordinances Committe to garner their input. The documents being presented to City Council tonight are the culmination of the afoermentioned efforts.

Emery & Garrett Groundwater Investigations, LLC (EGGI) has reviewed the proposed Rochester Aquifer Protection Ordinance that was recently prepared by the Stafford Regional Planning Commission (SRPC). EGGI provided comments to the SRPC on February 27, 2015 relative to the draft ordinance as it related to defining the following:

- 1. Seasonal high water table.
- 2. Stratified drift Aquifer.
- 3. Aquifer Protection District.
- 4. The Stormwater Management Plan.
- 5. Allowable rock blasting within the Aguifer Protection Area.

EGGI believes that the City of Rochester has significant and valuable groundwater resources available for long-term use by the community. Being proactive in groundwater resource protection is needed to assure that these valuable water resource assets remain available and viable for future generations.

Since the availability of groundwater resources is dependent upon site-specific geologic conditions and because growth continues to occur, future land use decisions can interfere with future groundwater supply availability. For example, if growth causes dense residential or commercial development on land where the best groundwater resources exist, those groundwater resources could be lost forever. We cannot change the geology or groundwater favorability of one site to another however, the City of Rochester can impact where residential, commercial, and other land use activities will take place in the future through appropriate planning.

EGGI believes the proposed ordinance will be an important tool for the City to use to protect of its invaluable groundwater resources. We hope you find this information responsive to your needs. Please do not hesitate to contact us if you have any questions.

SUBJECT: Answers to questions City Council had regarding the proposed Aquifer Protection

Ordinance

At the 6/2/15 City Council meeting, the Council asked that number 4 under the "Maintenance and Inspection" section [42.10 (m)]the Aquifer Protection Ordinance be explained be clarified.

Specifically, the Council asked staff to:

1) Clarify/explain why "If applicable" was chosen.

Answer: These words were chosen because the Planning Board wanted the ordinance to allow for collection inspection fees, if the City (City Council) so chose, both now and in the future, without the need for additional ordinance amendments.

And

2) Draft a fee schedule /hourly rate for inspections:

Answer: Staff chose the words, "Inspections shall be billed at an hourly rate as determined by the City of Rochester Public Works Department", because this exact language is already found in the Site Plan Regulations.

Planning Board agreed that inspections should be treated as they are now relative to private development inspections. Currently the rate is \$75/ hour with a minimum charge of \$75.

As support for why the above language was chosen, please refer to the below (existing sections of the Site Plan / Subdivision Regulations and Zoning Ordinance):

Site Plan Regulations.

Article II, Section 4(C) Inspection Of Improvements

All required site improvements shall be subject to inspection by, and approval of, the Commissioner of Public Works, the Chief of the Fire Department, the Building Inspector, the Chief of Police, and such other federal, state, or local officials, as may have jurisdiction who shall be notified by the

owner or applicant at least 72 hours prior to the start of construction. Inspections will be conducted by said officials or their designee following request by the developer. No underground installation shall be covered until inspection by the appropriate officials. Any improvements covered without inspection will be considered unacceptable.

Article I, Section 8 - INSPECTION FEE

Inspections shall be billed at an hourly rate as determined by the City of Rochester Public Works Department. [12]

Zoning Ordinance (Aquifer Protection Overlay is part of this ordinance)

42.3 Administration

- 4. Fees. Application fees and other pertinent fees may be established under this chapter. Fees shall be established specifically as part of this ordinance or separately by the Rochester City Council.
- 6. Entering Property.
 - A. The Zoning Administrator and the Zoning Enforcement Officer (if different from the Zoning Administrator) and their staff shall have the authority to make any onsite inspections which might be necessary to carry out their duties in the administration and enforcement of this chapter.
 - B. Furthermore, every applicant for a permit or approval under this chapter or under the Site Plan Regulations or the Subdivision Regulations, by virtue of submitting the application, shall be deemed to have consented to any inspection(s) of the subject property that may be reasonably necessary for the City's officials, employees, board members, or other agents to make informed decisions relative to the application and to determine compliance after approval with the subject permit or approval.
 - C. Refusal by an applicant to consent to such inspection may be grounds for denial of any permit or approval where such inspection is reasonably necessary to make any determinations relevant to the application.
 - D. It is understood that any City officials must use all due care and consideration when entering property under this chapter.

AMENDMENTS TO CHAPTER 42 OF THE GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER REGARDING SIGNAGE

THE CITY OF ROCHESTER ORDAINS:

That subsections 42.29 and 42.8 (j) (4) of Chapter 42 of the General Ordinances of the City of Rochester regarding Signage and currently before the Rochester City Council, be amended as follows:

That subsection 42.29, presently before the Rochester City Council, be amended by deleting subsection 42.29 in its entirety, and by substituting in its stead, the following provisions, to be known as subsection 42.29 of the General Ordinances of the City of Rochester, and that subsection 42.8 (j) (4) be amended by striking all exceptions to subsection 42.29 contained therein, to wit:

42.29 **Signage**

- a. <u>General</u>. All signs shall comply with the regulations for the erection and construction of signs contained in the Building Code of the City of Rochester and other applicable city regulations, except as shall be under the jurisdiction of New Hampshire RSA 236:69-89. Signs shall be permitted in accordance with the following regulations.
- b. **Purpose and Intent.** The purpose of this ordinance is to create a legal framework to regulate the type, number, location, size, and illumination of signs on private property in order to maintain and enhance the character of the city's commercial district and residential neighborhood and to protect the public from hazardous and distracting displays.
- c. <u>Nonconforming signs</u>. A sign which was lawfully established prior to the adoption of this article but which does not meet the requirements of this article is considered a nonconforming sign. Non conforming signs and sign structures may remain or must be removed as follows:
 - 1. Applicable provisions of the nonconforming section of this Zoning Ordinance shall apply unless superseded herein.
 - 2. No changes in the sign or sign structure are permitted except for basic maintenance and repairs necessary to keep the sign in good working order or other changes which bring the sign into compliance. No nonconforming sign shall be reconstructed, modified, or relocated except for changes to the sign face itself within the same size and shape to accommodate a change copy. A nonconforming sign which is damaged beyond repair due to a cause beyond the control of the owner may be replaced within one year of when damage occurs.
 - 3. Nonconforming sign may not be altered in any way.
 - 4. Existing temporary signs which are not in compliance with this article are not considered to be "grandfathered" under this ordinance. If any notification of noncompliance is given from Director Building Zoning Licensing Services or designee, these signs or conditions must be brought into compliance within 60 days from that notification.
- d. **Permits Required.** All signs, regardless of size, shall require the issuance of a zoning permit before

- e. <u>Application Process</u>. Application for a sign permit shall be to the Building, Zoning, and Licensing Services Department. The application should contain the following:
 - 1. Name, signature, address and telephone number of the applicant.
 - 2. Owner's authorization for the application if not the applicant.
 - 3. Location of the building, structure or lot to which the sign will be located.
 - 4. The district the sign will be located.
 - 5. Historic District. Signs in the Historic District, except for portable easel, placard, and sandwich board signs, are subject to review by the Historic District Commission (see Article XIV <u>Historic Overlay District</u>).
- f. Construction Documents. Before any permit is granted for the erection of a sign or sign structure requiring such permit, construction documents shall be filed with the Building, Zoning, and Licensing Services Department official showing the dimensions, materials and required details of construction, including loads, stresses, anchorage and any other pertinent data. The permit application shall be accompanied by the written consent of the owner or lessee of the premises upon which the sign is to be erected and by engineering calculations signed and sealed by a registered design professional where required by the *International Building Code*.
- g. <u>Changes to signs</u>. No sign shall be structurally altered, enlarged or relocated except in conformity to the provisions herein, until a proper permit, if required, has been secured. The changing or maintenance of movable parts or components of an approved sign that is designed for such changes, or the changing of copy, business names, lettering, sign faces, colors, display and/or graphic matter, or the content of any sign shall not be deemed a structural alteration.
- h. **Permit Fees.** Permit fees to erect, alter or relocate a sign shall be in accordance with the fee schedule adopted within this jurisdiction.
- i. **Prohibited Signs.** The following devices and locations shall be specifically prohibited:
 - 1. Signs located in such a manner as to obstruct or otherwise interfere with an official traffic sign, signal or device, or obstruct or interfere with a driver's view of approaching, merging or intersecting traffic.
 - 2. Except as provided for elsewhere in this code, signs encroaching upon or overhanging public rights-of-way. No *sign* shall be attached to any utility pole, light standard, street tree or any other public facility located within the public right-of-way.
 - 3. Signs which blink, flash or are animated by lighting in any fashion that would cause such signs to have the appearance of traffic safety signs and lights, or to have the appearance of municipal vehicle warnings from a distance.
 - 4. Any *sign* attached to, or placed on, a vehicle or trailer parked on public or private property, except for signs meeting the following conditions:
 - a. The primary purpose of such a vehicle or trailer is not the display of signs.
 - b. The signs are magnetic, decals or painted upon an integral part of the vehicle or equipment as originally designed by the manufacturer, and do not break the silhouette of the vehicle.
 - c. The vehicle or trailer is in operating condition, currently registered and licensed to operate on public streets when applicable, and actively used or available for use in the daily function of the business to which such signs relate.
 - 5. Vehicles and trailers used primarily as static displays, advertising a product or service, nor utilized as storage, shelter or distribution points for commercial products or services for the general public.
 - 6. Snipe Signs
- j. **Exempt Signs**. The following signs shall be exempt from the provisions of this chapter:

- 1. Official notices authorized by a *court*, public body or public safety official. 6/11/15
- 2. Directional, warning or information signs authorized by federal, state or municipal governments.
- 3. Memorial plaques, building identification signs and building cornerstones when cut or carved into a masonry surface or when made of noncombustible material and made an integral part of the building or structure.
- 4. The flag of a government or noncommercial institution, such as a school.
- 5. Works of fine art displayed in conjunction with a commercial enterprise where the enterprise does not receive direct commercial gain.
- 6. Street address signs and combination nameplate and street address signs that contain no advertising copy and which do not exceed 6 square feet (0.56 m²) in area.
- 7. Signs required, or deemed necessary for the public welfare and safety, by a municipal, state, or federal agency such as traffic control and directional signs.
- 8. Interior signs
- k. **<u>Definitions</u>**. For the purpose set forth in this ordinance the following definitions apply:
 - 1. **Abandoned Sign:** A sign structure that has ceased to be used and the owner intend no longer to have used.
 - 2. **Animated Sign:** A sign employing actual motion or the illusion of motion. Animated signs, which are differentiated from changeable signs as defined and regulated by this code, include the following types:
 - a. Electrically activated: Animated signs producing the illusion of movement by means of electronic, electrical or electro-mechanical input and/or illumination capable of simulating movement through employment of the characteristics of one or both of the classifications noted below:
 - b. **Flashing:** Animated signs or animated portions of signs whose illumination is characterized by a repetitive cycle in which the period of illumination is either the same as or less than the period of non illumination. For the purposes of this ordinance, flashing will not be defined as occurring if the cyclical period between on-off phases of illumination exceeds 8 seconds.
 - c. Mechanically activated: Animated signs characterized by repetitive motion and/or rotation activated by a mechanical system powered by electric motors or other mechanically induced means.
 - 3. **Architectural Projection:** Any projection that is not intended for occupancy and that extends beyond the face of an exterior wall of a building, but that does not include signs as defined herein. See also "Awning;" "Backlit awning;" and "*Canopy*, Attached and Free-standing."
 - 4. **Awning:** An architectural projection or shelter projecting from and supported by the exterior wall of a building and composed of a covering of rigid or non rigid materials and/or fabric on a supporting framework that may be either permanent or retractable, including such structures that are internally illuminated by fluorescent or other light sources.
 - 5. **Awning Sign:** A sign displayed on or attached flat against the surface or surfaces of an awning. See also "Wall or fascia sign."
 - 6. **Backlit Awning** An awning with a translucent covering material and a source of illumination contained within its framework.
 - 7. **Banner:** A flexible substrate on which copy or graphics may be displayed.

- 8. **Banner Sign:** A sign utilizing a banner as its display surface.
- 9. Billboard: See "Off-premise sign" and "Outdoor advertising sign."
- 10. **Building**: A structure which has a roof supported by walls for shelter, support, or enclosure of persons, animals, or chattel.
- 11. **Canopy**: A multisided overhead structure or architectural projection supported by attachments to a building on one or more sides and either cantilevered from such building or also supported by columns at additional points. The surface(s) and/or soffit of an attached *canopy* may be illuminated by means of internal or external sources of light. See also "Marquee."
- 12. **Canopy** (**Free-Standing**): A multisided overhead structure supported by columns, but not enclosed by walls. The surface(s) and or soffit of a free-standing *canopy* may be illuminated by means of internal or external sources of light.
- 13. Canopy Sign: A sign affixed to the visible surface(s) of an attached or free-standing canopy.
- 14. **Changeable Sign:.** A sign with the capability of content change by means of manual or remote input, including signs which are:
 - a. **Electrically activated.** Changeable sign whose message copy or content can be changed by means of remote electrically energized on-off switching combinations of alphabetic or pictographic components arranged on a display surface. Illumination may be integral to the components, such as characterized by lamps or other light-emitting devices; or it may be from an external light source designed to reflect off the changeable component display. See also "Electronic message sign or center."
 - b. **Manually activated.** Changeable sign whose message copy or content can be changed manually.
- 15. Combination Sign: A sign that is supported partly by a pole and partly by a building structure.
- 16. **Copy:** Those letters, numerals, figures, symbols, logos and graphic elements comprising the content or message of a sign, excluding numerals identifying a street address only.
- 17. **Development of Complex Sign:** A free-standing sign identifying a multiple-occupancy development, such as a shopping center or planned *industrial* park, which is controlled by a single owner or landlord, approved in accordance with <u>Section 1009.2</u> of this chapter.
- 18. **Directional Sign:** Any sign that is designed and erected for the purpose of providing direction and/or orientation for pedestrian or vehicular traffic.
- 19. **Double-Faced Sign:** A sign with two faces, back to back.
- 20. Electric Sign: Any sign activated or illuminated by means of electrical energy.
- 21. **Electronic Message Sign or Center:** An electrically activated changeable sign whose variable message capability can be electronically programmed.
- 22. Exterior Sign: Any sign placed outside a building.
- 23. Flag: A sign, constructed of cloth and attached to a staff or pole.
- 24. **Flashing Sign:** See "Animated sign, electrically activated."

- 25. **Free-Standing Sign:** A sign principally supported by a structure affixed to the ground/ and 15 supported by a building, including signs supported by one or more columns, poles or braces placed in or upon the ground.
- 26. **Frontage (Building):** The length of an exterior building wall or structure of a single premise orientated to the public way or other properties that it faces.
- 27. **Frontage** (**Property**): The length of the property line(s) of any single premise along either a public way or other properties on which it borders.
- 28. **Illuminated Sign:** A sign characterized by the use of artificial light, either projecting through its surface(s) (internally illuminated); or reflecting off its surface(s) (externally illuminated).
- 29. **Interior Sign:** Any sign placed within a building, but not including "window signs" as defined by this ordinance. Interior signs, with the exception of window signs as defined, are not regulated by this chapter.
- 30. **Marquee Sign:** A permanent roof-like structure, including the structural support system, projecting beyond a building wall at the entrance to a building or extending along and projecting beyond building wall.
- 31. **Menu Board:** A free-standing sign orientated to the drive-through lane for a restaurant that advertises the menu items available from the drive-through window, and which has no more than 20 percent of the total area for such a sign utilized for business identification.
- 32. **Multiple-Faced Sign:** A sign containing three or more faces.
- 33. **Nonconforming Sign:** Any sign that existed lawfully prior to the adoption of the Sign Ordinance which now does not conform with the provisions of this ordinance.
- 34. **Off-Premise Sign Directional:** A sign on private property whose only purpose is to direct vehicular traffic for delivers and visitation and is not intended to be used as a form of advertisement.
- 35. **Off-Premise Sign:** A sign, which pertains to a business, industry, or other activity which is not located on the premise upon which the sign is located.
- 36. **On-Premise Sign:** A sign erected, maintained or used in the outdoor environment for the purpose of the display of messages appurtenant to the use of, products sold on, or the sale or lease of, the property on which it is displayed.
- 37. **Outdoor Advertising Sign:** A permanent sign erected, maintained or used in the outdoor environment for the purpose of the display of commercial or noncommercial messages not appurtenant to the use of, products sold on, or the sale or lease of, the property on which it is displayed.
- 38. **Permanent Sign:** A sign that is displayed for more than a total of ninety days in any one year.
- 39. Pole Sign: See "Free-standing sign."
- 40. **Political Sign:** A temporary sign intended to advance a political statement, cause or candidate for office. A legally permitted outdoor advertising sign shall not be considered to be a political sign.
- 41. **Portable Sign:** Any *sign* not permanently attached to the ground or to a building or building surface.

- 42. **Projecting Sign:** A *sign* other than a wall sign that is attached to or projects more that the support of a sign. For visual reference, see Section 1003.
- 43. **Premises Sign:** A lot or number of lots situated a building or group of buildings designed as a unit or on which a building or group of buildings are to be constructed housing multiple businesses.
- 44. **Real Estate Sign:** A temporary *sign* advertising the sale, lease or rental of the property or premises upon which it is located.
- 45. **Sandwich Board Sign:** A portable sign shaped like an A-frame with a sign pane on one or both sides.
- 46. **Sign:** Any device visible from a public place that displays either commercial or noncommercial messages by means of graphic presentation of alphabetic or pictorial symbols or representations. Noncommercial flags or any flags displayed from flagpoles or staffs will not be considered to be signs.
- 47. **Sign Area:** The area of the smallest geometric figure, or the sum of the combination of regular geometric figures, which comprise the sign face. The area of any double-sided or "V" shaped *sign* shall be the area of the largest single face only. The area of a sphere shall be computed as the area of a circle. The area of all other multiple-sided signs shall be computed as 50 percent of the sum of the area of all faces of the *sign*.
- 48. **Sign Face:** The surface upon, against or through which the *sign* copy is displayed or illustrated, not including structural supports, architectural features of a building or sign structure, nonstructural or decorative trim, or any areas that are separated from the background surface upon which the sign copy is displayed by a distinct delineation, such as a reveal or border..
- 49. **Sign Structure:** Any structure supporting a sign.
- 50. **Snipe Sign:** Any sign of any size, made of any material, including paper, cardboard, wood and metal, when such sign is tacked, nailed, posted, pasted, glued, or otherwise attached to trees, poles, fences or other objects, and the advertising matter appearing thereon is not applicable to the premises upon which said sign is located
- 51. **Special Event**: A temporary sign that is either on-site or off-site that provides identification or information pertaining to a special event or occurrence sponsored by a non-profit or civic organization.
- 52. **Temporary Sign:** A sign not constructed for or intended for permanent use. Temporary signs may not be displayed for more than a total of thirty (30) days in any one year.
- 53. **Wall Sign:** A *sign* that is attached to a vertical wall of building that projects not more than 18 inches from the building or structure wall.
- 54. **Window Sign:** A *sign* within one foot of a window message intended to be visible to and readable from the public way or from adjacent property.

1. **General Provisions**.

- 1. <u>Conformance to codes</u>. Any sign hereafter erected shall conform to the provisions of this ordinance or regulation within this jurisdictions.
- 2. <u>Signs in rights-of-way</u>. No sign other than an official traffic sign or similar sign shall be erected within 2 feet of the lines of any street, or within any public way, unless specifically authorized by other ordinances or regulations of this jurisdiction or by specific authorization of the City Council.
- 3. **Projections over public ways.** Signs projecting over public walkways shall be permitted to do so only subject to the projection and clearance limits either defined herein or, if not so defined, at a minimum height of 8 feet from *grade* level to the bottom of the sign. Signs, architectural projections or *sign* structures projecting over vehicular access areas must conform to the minimum height clearance limitations imposed by the jurisdiction for such structures.
- 4. <u>Traffic visibility.</u> No sign or sign structure shall be erected at the intersection of any street in such a manner as to obstruct free and clear vision, nor at any location where by its position, shape or color it may interfere with or obstruct the view of or be confused with any authorized traffic sign, signal or device.
- 5. Computation of frontage. If a premises contains walls facing more than one property line or encompasses property frontage bounded by more than one street or other property usages, the sign area(s) for each building wall or property frontage will be computed separately for each building wall or property line facing a different frontage. The sign area(s) thus calculated shall be permitted to then be applied to permitted signs placed on each separate wall or property line frontage.
- 6. Maintenance, repair and removal. Every sign permitted by this ordinance shall be kept in good condition and repair. When any sign becomes insecure, in danger of falling or is otherwise deemed unsafe by the code official, or if any sign shall be unlawfully installed, erected or maintained in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, the owner thereof or the person or firm using same shall, upon written notice by the Building, Zoning, Licensing, Services official forthwith in the case of immediate danger, and in any case within not more than 10 days, make such sign conform to the provisions of this ordinance, or shall remove it. If within 10 days the order is not complied with, the code official shall be permitted to remove or cause such sign to be removed at the expense of the owner and/or the user of the sign.
- 7. Master sign plan required. All landlord or single-owner controlled multiple-occupancy development complexes, such as shopping centers or planned *industrial* parks, shall submit to the Building Zoning and Licensing Services a master sign plan prior to issuance of new sign permits. The master sign plan shall establish standards and criteria for all signs in the complex that require permits, and shall address, at a minimum, the following:
 - a. Proposed sign locations.
 - b. Materials.
 - c. Type of illumination.
 - d. Design of free-standing sign structures.
 - e. Size.
 - f. Quantity.
 - g. Uniform standards for non business signage, including directional and informational signs.

8. Illumination.

- a. No internally illuminated sign shall be used within 100 feet of any residential zone.
- b. On externally illuminated signs, the light source shall be steady, stationary, shielded, downcast, and directed solely at the sign. The sign surface shall be non reflective.
- c. Illuminated signs shall send no glare onto the road or onto any neighboring residential

properties. 6/11/15

9. Removal of Portable and Other Movable and Temporary Signs.

a. The Zoning Administrator, or other city personnel designated by the City Manager, shall cause to be removed any sign placed on or over any public right-of-way or public property that is without a valid permit or is not in compliance with the terms of a valid permit, or where such a sign is exempt from permit requirements, the sign is not in compliance with the standards and provisions of this ordinance.

- b. Signs Related to An Adjacent Principal Use. Where a sign that is placed on or over any public right-of-way or public property in violation of this ordinance is related to a principal use of adjacent private property, the Zoning Administrator, or other city personnel designated by the City Manager, shall notify the owner of the principal use or the property that a violation exists and shall specify a time limit for removal of the sign. If the owner fails to comply with the order for removal, the Zoning Administrator, or other city personnel designated by the City Manager, shall remove the sign and the owner shall be liable for the cost of said removal and subsequent storage. If the owner does not redeem the sign within thirty (30) calendar days from the date that the sign is removed, the sign shall be deemed to be abandoned and may be disposed of by the City as abandoned property; and
- c. Other Signs. Where a sign that is placed on or over any public right-of-way or public property in violation of this ordinance is not erected in connection with elections or political campaigns, and is unrelated to a principal use of adjacent private property, the Zoning Administrator, or other city personnel designated by the City Manager, shall remove the sign and it shall be deemed to be abandoned and may be disposed of by the City as abandoned property."

m. Specific Sign Requirements.

1. **Animated Sign.** Animated signs, except as prohibited in <u>Section I3</u>, are permitted in Granite Ridge Development, commercial and *industrial* zones only. Changeable signs, manually activated, are permitted for nonresidential uses in all zones. Changeable signs, electrically activated, are permitted in all nonresidential zones.

2. Awning Sign.

- a. The copy area of awning signs shall not exceed an area equal to 25 percent of the background area of the awning or awning surface to which such a sign is affixed or applied, or the permitted area for wall or fascia signs, whichever is less.
- b. Neither the background color of an awning, nor any graphic treatment or embellishment thereto such as striping, patterns or valances, shall be included in the computation of sign copy area.

3. Canopy Signs.

- a. The permanently-affixed copy area of *canopy* or marquee signs shall not exceed an area equal to 25 percent of the face area of the *canopy*, marquee or architectural projection upon which such sign is affixed or applied.
- b. Graphic striping, patterns or color bands on the face of a building, *canopy*, marquee or architectural projection shall not be included in the computation of sign copy area.
- 4. **Directory Signs**. For businesses located on Secondary Streets within the Downtown Commercial District.
 - a. Not to exceed four (4) square feet in area.

- b. Permission must be obtained in writing from the property owner on whose premised 1h1/s15/n is to be placed.
- c. These signs shall not obscure any portion of road, intersection, or sidewalk.
- d. Not more than 25 percent of the area of any directional sign shall be permitted to be devoted to business identification or logo, which area shall not be assessed as identification sign area.

5. Directional Signs.

No more than two directional signs shall be permitted per street entrance to any lot. There shall be none in residential zones. For all other zones, the maximum area for any directional sign visible from adjacent property or rights-of-way shall be 10 square feet. Not more than 25 percent of the area of any directional sign shall be permitted to be devoted to business identification or logo, which area shall not be assessed as identification sign area.

- 6. **Development and Construction Signs**. Signs temporarily erected during construction to inform the public of the developer, contractors, architects, engineers, the nature of the project or anticipated completion dates, shall be permitted in all zoning districts, subject to the following limitations:
 - a. Such signs on a single residential lot, residential subdivision or multiple residential lots, and nonresidential uses shall be limited to one sign, not greater than 10 feet in height and 32 square feet in area.
 - b. Such signs for commercial or *industrial* projects shall be limited to one sign per street front.
 - c. Development and construction signs may not be displayed until after the issuance of construction permits by the building official, and must be removed not later than 24 hours following issuance of an occupancy permit for any or all portions of the project.
- 7. **Electronic Message Sign.** All permitted EMCs shall be equipped with a sensor or other device that automatically determines the ambient illumination and be programmed to automatically dim according to ambient light conditions at all times of the day or night. Electronic changing signs may be freestanding or building mounted, one or two-sided, may be a component of a larger sign or billboard, and shall conform to the following minimum requirements along with all other requirements for signage within this ordinance:
 - a. Electronic Message Center portion of the sign shall not make up more than 75% of the actual sign surface. In no case shall an electronic message center exceed 32 square feet.
 - b. Animation on Static EMCs shall be limited to the actual changing of the message. No flashing, blinking, or pulsating of lights shall be allowed. Electronic Message Centers must be equipped to freeze in one position or discontinue the display in the event that a malfunction occurs.
 - c. Minimum Display Time: All illumination elements on the face of Static electronic changing signs shall remain at a fixed level of illumination for a period of not less than 8 seconds.
 - d. Software for operating the EMC must be able to show current and factory brightness levels upon request. The owner/installer of Electronic Message Displays shall certify as part of the application that signs will not exceed the brightness levels specified in this section.
 - e. The brightness shall not exceed 0.3 footcandles at night.
 - f. Flashing or animated signs (including temporary interior window displays or banners) of red, amber, or green colored lights shall not be permitted.
- 8. **Flag**. Each store front may be allowed one (1) Open or welcome flag that is position at a height so as not to impede the flow of pedestrians.
- 9. Home Occupation-1 Sign. No signs are permitted_

- 10. **Home Occupation-2 Sign**. There may be only one sign for the business visible from the sign shall be non-illuminated and shall not exceed three (3) square feet.
- 11. **Home Occupation-3 Sign**. There may be only one sign for the business visible from the street. The sign shall be non-illuminated and shall not exceed four (4) square feet.
- 12. **Marquee Sign**. No marquee shall be erected unless designed by a registered structural engineer and approved by Director Building Zoning Licensing Services. It may extend over the sidewalk across the ROW to the curb line provided it has a minimum height above the sidewalk of ten feet above the curb level and does not exceed five feet in height.
- 13. **Off-Premise Sign**. Off premises signs are prohibited except for the following signs if permission is granted from the owner of the off premises location. A setback of at least 5 feet is required for these signs and they shall not be placed in the road right-of-way (i.e. they must be placed on private property).
 - a. One freestanding sign per business directing people to the site. The sign may not exceed 2 square feet per side or 4 feet in height. No illumination is allowed. It may include only the name and/or logo, with simple directions. The sign must be durable and constructed of solid, finished materials.
 - b. A real estate sign one per premise shall not exceed 6 square feet per side.
 - c. Yard sale signs (See section M 24)
 - d. A sign for an office park or industrial park may be erected at the entrance to the park on an out parcel or, with the approval of the City Council, within the road right-of-way.
 - e. A promotional banner for special event may be placed anywhere in the City, including across a public road, if approved by the City Manager.
 - f. Two seasonal agricultural directional signs not to exceed 4 square feet each are permitted when intended to direct patrons to a farm for the purpose of purchasing or picking seasonal agricultural produce or products during the season within which the produce is available for sale or harvest.
 - g. One portable sign on the sidewalk in front of businesses in the Downtown Commercial, Special Downtown, and Neighborhood Mixed Use lying in density rings.
 - h. Road Signs.
- 14. **Political Sign**. Political Advertising. The following provisions are in addition to the political advertising controls established under RSA 664:14, 664:17, and 664:2, as amended:
 - a. Political advertising shall be defined in RSA 664:2, as amended. No political advertising shall be placed or affixed upon any public property, including City rights of way. No political advertising shall be placed or affixed upon private property without the owner's consent.
 - b. Signature, Identification, Lack of Authorization shall be in accordance with RSA 664:14, as amended.
 - c. Political signs shall not be erected in the City Adopt-A-Spots or the Rochester Common.
 - d. Removal of signs shall be in accordance with RSA 664:17, as amended.

- e. The area and location of signs used in conjunction with uses allowed by the Boald/df1/15 Adjustment as special exceptions shall also be approved by the Planning Board and shall conform to the sign regulations for the district in which they are located. The area and location of such signs shall be in harmony with the character of the neighborhood in which they are located.
- f. No sign, except for political signs, shall be erected until a permit for same has been obtained from the Director of Building, Zoning, & Licensing Services.
- 15. **Portable Sign**. Portable signs shall be permitted only in the Downtown Commercial, Special Downtown Overlay, Neighborhood Mixed Use lying in Density Rings, subject to the following limitations:
 - a. No more than one such sign may be displayed on any property, and shall not exceed a height of 4 feet or an area of 8 square feet per side.
 - b. Any portable sign that is placed on sidewalk
 - i. Shall be situated directly in front of the business(es) which is being advertised.
 - ii. Shall not block passage along sidewalk including passage for handicapped persons and shall not present a safety hazard.
 - c. May be displayed during business hours only.
 - d. Appropriately placed to minimize appearance of clutter as determined by the Director of Building, Zoning, and Licensing Services.
 - e. Only one sign per individual business.
- 16. **Projecting Sign**. Signs are permitted in the following zones:
 - a. Multiple projecting signs shall be permitted on buildings having multiple occupants providing only than one projecting sign per occupant will be permitted.
 - b. Projecting signs shall:
 - 1. Not overhang any public property or public right of way.
 - 2. Be attached to the side of a building with a decorative support bracket engineered to and designed to withstand wind loads.
 - 3. Extend from the side of the building no more than eleven feet.
 - 4. Be part of the wall sign calculations which cumulative total include both projecting s and wall signs shall not exceed twenty percent of the wall area to which the sign is attached.
 - 5. Such signs shall maintain a clear vertical distance above any public sidewalk a minimum of 10 feet.
- 17. **Roadside Farm Stand Signs**. No more than 2 signs with a maximum combined total of 20 square feet is permitted.
- 18. **Real Estate Sign.** shall be permitted in all zoning districts, subject to the following limitations:
 - a. Real estate signs located on a single residential lot shall be limited to one sign, not greater than 8 square feet in area and 6 feet in height.
 - b. Real estate signs may not be illuminated in residential districts.
 - c. There may be no more than one sign per street frontage except on lots with more than 500 feet of street frontage a second sign may be placed.
 - d. Real estate signs shall be removed not later than 10 days after execution of a lease agreement

- 19. Sandwich Board Sign. See portable signs.
- 20. **Street Banners**. Temporary street banners used to inform the public about community events and activities may be placed within or above the road right of way or in other public locations if approved by the City Manager and signed off from all departments.
- 21. **Special promotion, event and grand opening signs**. Signs temporarily displayed to advertise special promotions, events and grand openings shall be permitted for nonresidential uses and for all commercial and *industrial* districts subject to the following limitations:
 - a. Such signs shall be limited to one sign per street front.
 - b. Such signs may be displayed for not more than 30 consecutive days in any 12-month period, and not more than 30 days in any calendar year. The signs shall be erected no more than 5 days prior to the event or grand opening, and shall be removed not more than 1 day after the event or grand opening.
 - c. The total area of all such signs shall not exceed 32 square feet.

22. Special event signs in public ways.

Signs advertising a special community event shall be allowed in or over public rights-of-way, subject to approval by City Manager as to the size, location and method of erection. The official may not approve any special event signage that would impair the safety and convenience of use of public rights-of-way, or obstruct traffic visibility.

- 23. **Window Sign**. Window signs shall be permitted for any nonresidential use in, all Downtown Commercial and *industrial* districts, subject to the following limitations:
 - a. The aggregate area of all such signs shall not exceed 25 % of the window area on which such signs are displayed within the Historic District.

24. Yard sale signs.

- a. Yard sale signs may not be placed prior to 3 days before the sale and must be removed within 24 hours after the sale. The date and time of the yard sale must be on the sign.
- b. They may not exceed 6 square feet and may not be illuminated.
- c. The signs may be placed off premises for noncommercial sales related to a single residential dwelling unit (or informal joint sales among neighbors) provided they are not placed on utility poles, are not a distraction to traffic, and comply with Requirements by Zoning District.
- n. **Requirements by Zoning District.** The following special requirements shall apply in each respective zoning district.

1. Residential Zoning Districts.

a. For permitted nonresidential uses one freestanding sign with a maximum area of 6 square feet per side plus one attached sign not to exceed 12 square feet is permitted. Height: Signs shall have a maximum height of six (6) ft.

- b. Internally illuminated signs (including neon signs and signage placed in **6**/4 are not permitted.
- c. No sign may be illuminated between the hours of 9:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. with the exception of signage: a) showing property addresses; b) for residential communities; and c) for businesses and organizations during any specific hours in that time period that the businesses are open.

- 2. Nonresidential Zoning Districts
 - a. **Baseline**. The following advertising signage is permitted for one nonresidential use occupying a single building in commercial and industrial zoning districts (except as otherwise indicated in this article). Additional allowances beyond these limitations or other restrictions for various situations are shown in the subsequent subsections
 - b. **Freestanding signs**. Only one free standing sign shall be permitted on a lot even if there is more than one building or use on that lot. No part of any free standing sign shall be located within 5 feet of any property line.

Note. All signs that are to be located in the historic district are also subject to the provisions of Article XIV – Historic Overlay District

- c. Wall Signs. No wall sign shall exceed ten percent (10 %) of the area of the building frontage as measure by the width of the wall containing the main public entrance by the height (measured from the floor level to the top of the first floor cornice area, or to one foot below secondary story window) to which it is attached. For buildings with multiple tenants having store fronts only, the façade rented by the tenant shall be considered as wall area for a sign.
 - i. A maximum of four (4) signs. Buildings located in the Granite Ridge Development District, between the service roads and Route 11, are allowed one additional wall mounted sign per tenant is permitted on the rear façade. The same size restrictions as applied to the front façade shall determine the size of sign.
- d. **Temporary signs**. One temporary sign is allowed at any one time, including portable and banner signs. For portable signs (where they are permitted; (see below) the maximum area is 8 square feet and the maximum height is 4 feet. Banner signs, not exceeding 60 square feet, are permitted for grand openings of new business only, and may be displayed for a maximum of 30 consecutive days. Permits are required for these signs with a fee of \$10.
- e. **Directory signs**. For each additional independent enterprise on a site beyond one, an additional 10 square feet may be added to one freestanding directory sign not to exceed 100 square feet. Property owners of separate adjoining lots may also elect to have one joint directory sign.
- f. Attached directory signs. One additional attached directory sign of the principal uses

within a multi-tenant building is permitted on the exterior wall at each entrance to the building. It shall not exceed 3 square feet plus 1 square foot for each independent enterprise.

- g. **Upper floor units**. Each upper floor occupant may use one attached sign placed at no higher than the second floor level not to exceed six square feet per side for each occupant plus window signs. Window signage shall not exceed 25% of the total window area.
- h. **Multiple Occupant Sites**. On multiple occupant sites up to 3 portable signs for independent enterprises may be placed at the same time.
- i. **Secondary Entrance**. By Conditional Use Permit issued by the Planning Board any site with at least 300 feet of linear lot frontage and with a second driveway entrance located at least 200 feet from the primary entrance may have a second freestanding sign at the second entrance not to exceed 16 square feet and 8 feet in height.
- j. **Corner or multiple frontage lots**. By Conditional Use Permit issued by the Planning Board any corner lot or a rear frontage lot (or double frontage) may have one additional freestanding sign with a maximum area of 24 square feet is allowed on the second frontage provided the property across the street on that second frontage is not zoned residential.

k. Specific Zoning Districts

Internally illuminated signs are permitted only in the Highway Commercial, Downtown Commercial, Granite Ridge Development, and Industrial Districts.

SUMMARY STATEMENT

Chapter 42.29 has been presented to the Planning Board (8/9/14 &9/17/14), Historic District Commission, Main Street Design Committee, Economic Development Committee, and Codes and Ordinances Committee (2/5/15). The sign ordinance is supported by the Planning Board and Codes and Ordinances Committee. Also an internal department review between Planning & Development; Building, Zoning, and Licensing, Services; Economic Development; and legal review by the City Attorney has been completed. City Staff and Legal Counsel suggest that City Council vote at the June 2, 2015meeting for the 1st reading and adopt the new sign ordinance on July 16, 2015 City Council Workshop Public Hearing.

42.29 Signage

- a. General. All signs shall comply with the regulations for the erection and construction of signs contained in the Building Code of the City of Rochester and other applicable city regulations, except as shall be under the jurisdiction of New Hampshire RSA 236:69-89. Signs shall be permitted in accordance with the following regulations.
- b. <u>Purpose and Intent</u>. The purpose of this ordinance is to create a legal framework to regulate the type, number, location, size, and illumination of signs on private property in order to maintain and enhance the character of the city's commercial district and residential neighborhood and to protect the public from hazardous and distracting displays.
- c. <u>Nonconforming signs</u>. A sign which was lawfully established prior to the adoption of this article but which does not meet the requirements of this article is considered a nonconforming sign. Non conforming signs and sign structures may remain or must be removed as follows:
 - Applicable provisions of the nonconforming section of this Zoning Ordinance shall apply unless superseded herein.
 - 2. No changes in the sign or sign structure are permitted except for basic maintenance and repairs necessary to keep the sign in good working order or other changes which bring the sign into compliance. Other than that, No nonconforming sign shall be reconstructed, modified, or relocated except for changes to the sign face itself within the same size and shape to accommodate a change copy. A nonconforming sign which is damaged beyond repair due to a cause beyond the control of the owner may be replaced within one year of when damage occurs.
 - No-Nonconforming sign may not be altered in any way, which makes the sign even more out of compliance with this ordinance, including but not limited to lighting an unlit sign.
 - 4. Existing temporary signs which are not in compliance with this article are not considered to be "grandfathered" under this ordinance. If any notification of noncompliance is given from Director Building Zoning Licensing Services or designee, these signs or conditions must be brought into compliance within 60 days from that notification.
- d. <u>Permits Required</u>. All signs, regardless of size, shall require the issuance of a zoning permit before public display unless otherwise specifically exempt by this Ordinance.
- e. <u>Application Process</u>. Application for a sign permit shall be to the Building, Zoning, and Licensing Services Department. The application should contain the following:
 - 1. Name, signature, address and telephone number of the applicant.
 - 2. Owner's authorization for the application if not the applicant.
 - 3. Location of the building, structure or lot to which the sign will be located.
 - 4. The district the sign will be located.
 - Historic District. Signs in the Historic District, except for portable easel, placard, and sandwich board signs, are subject to review by the Historic District Commission (see Article XIV – <u>Historic</u> Overlay District).
- f. Construction Documents. Before any permit is granted for the erection of a sign or sign structure requiring such permit, construction documents shall be filed with the Building, Zoning, and Licensing Services Department official showing the dimensions, materials and required details of construction, including loads, stresses, anchorage and any other pertinent data. The permit application shall be accompanied by the written consent of the owner or lessee of the premises upon which the sign is to be erected and by engineering calculations signed and sealed by a registered design professional where

required by the International Building Code.

- g. Changes to signs. No sign shall be structurally altered, enlarged or relocated except in conformity to the provisions herein, nor until a proper permit, if required, has been secured. The changing or maintenance of movable parts or components of an approved sign that is designed for such changes, or the changing of copy, business names, lettering, sign faces, colors, display and/or graphic matter, or the content of any sign shall not be deemed a structural alteration.
- h. <u>Permit Fees</u>. Permit fees to erect, alter or relocate a sign shall be in accordance with the fee schedule adopted within this jurisdiction.
- i. <u>Prohibited Signs.</u> The following devices and locations shall be specifically prohibited:
 - Signs located in such a manner as to obstruct or otherwise interfere with an official traffic sign, signal or device, or obstruct or interfere with a driver's view of approaching, merging or intersecting traffic.
 - 2. Except as provided for elsewhere in this code, signs encroaching upon or overhanging public rights-of-way. No *sign* shall be attached to any utility pole, light standard, street tree or any other public facility located within the public right-of-way.
 - 3. Signs which blink, flash or are animated by lighting in any fashion that would cause such signs to have the appearance of traffic safety signs and lights, or to have the appearance of municipal vehicle warnings from a distance.
 - 4. Any *sign* attached to, or placed on, a vehicle or trailer parked on public or private property, except for signs meeting the following conditions:
 - a. The primary purpose of such a vehicle or trailer is not the display of signs.
 - b. The signs are magnetic, decals or painted upon an integral part of the vehicle or equipment as originally designed by the manufacturer, and do not break the silhouette of the vehicle.
 - c. The vehicle or trailer is in operating condition, currently registered and licensed to operate on public streets when applicable, and actively used or available for use in the daily function of the business to which such signs relate.
 - Vehicles and trailers used primarily as static displays, advertising a product or service, nor utilized as storage, shelter or distribution points for commercial products or services for the general public.
 - 6. Snipe Signs
- j. Exempt Signs. The following signs shall be exempt from the provisions of this chapter:
 - 1. Official notices authorized by a court, public body or public safety official.
 - 2. Directional, warning or information signs authorized by federal, state or municipal governments.
 - Memorial plaques, building identification signs and building cornerstones when cut or carved into a masonry surface or when made of noncombustible material and made an integral part of the building or structure.
 - 4. The flag of a government or noncommercial institution, such as a school.
 - 5. Religious symbols and seasonal decorations within the appropriate public holiday season.
 - Works of fine art displayed in conjunction with a commercial enterprise where the enterprise does not receive direct commercial gain.
 - Street address signs and combination nameplate and street address signs that contain no advertising copy and which do not exceed 6 square feet (0.56 m²) in area.
 - 8. Political Signs.
 - 9. Holiday without advertisement.
 - 10. Signs required, or deemed necessary for the public welfare and safety, by a municipal, state, or federal agency such as traffic control and directional signs.
 - 11. Interior signs

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- k. <u>Definitions</u>. For the purpose set forth in this ordinance the following definitions apply:
 - Abandoned Sign: A sign structure that has ceased to be used and the owner intend no longer to have used.
 - Animated Sign: A sign employing actual motion or the illusion of motion. Animated signs, which are differentiated from changeable signs as defined and regulated by this code, include the following types:
 - a. Electrically activated: Animated signs producing the illusion of movement by means of electronic, electrical or electro-mechanical input and/or illumination capable of simulating movement through employment of the characteristics of one or both of the classifications noted below:
 - b. Flashing: Animated signs or animated portions of signs whose illumination is characterized by a repetitive cycle in which the period of illumination is either the same as or less than the period of non illumination. For the purposes of this ordinance, flashing will not be defined as occurring if the cyclical period between on-off phases of illumination exceeds 8 seconds.
 - Mechanically activated: Animated signs characterized by repetitive motion and/or rotation activated by a mechanical system powered by electric motors or other mechanically induced means.
 - 3. **Architectural Projection:** Any projection that is not intended for occupancy and that extends beyond the face of an exterior wall of a building, but that does not include signs as defined herein. See also "Awning;" "Backlit awning;" and "*Canopy*, Attached and Free-standing."
 - 4. Awning: An architectural projection or shelter projecting from and supported by the exterior wall of a building and composed of a covering of rigid or non rigid materials and/or fabric on a supporting framework that may be either permanent or retractable, including such structures that are internally illuminated by fluorescent or other light sources.
 - Awning Sign: A sign displayed on or attached flat against the surface or surfaces of an awning. See also "Wall or fascia sign."
 - 6. **Backlit Awning** An awning with a translucent covering material and a source of illumination contained within its framework.
 - 7. **Banner:** A flexible substrate on which copy or graphics may be displayed.
 - 8. Banner Sign: A sign utilizing a banner as its display surface.
 - 9. Billboard: See "Off-premise sign" and "Outdoor advertising sign."
 - Building: A structure which has a roof supported by walls for shelter, support, or enclosure of persons, animals, or chattel.
 - 11. **Canopy**: A multisided overhead structure or architectural projection supported by attachments to a building on one or more sides and either cantilevered from such building or also supported by columns at additional points. The surface(s) and/or soffit of an attached *canopy* may be illuminated by means of internal or external sources of light. See also "Marquee."

- 12. Canopy (Free-Standing): A multisided overhead structure supported by columns, but not enclosed by walls. The surface(s) and or soffit of a free-standing *canopy* may be illuminated by means of internal or external sources of light.
- 13. Canopy Sign: A sign affixed to the visible surface(s) of an attached or free-standing *canopy*.
- 14. Changeable Sign:. A sign with the capability of content change by means of manual or remote input, including signs which are:
 - a. Electrically activated. Changeable sign whose message copy or content can be changed by means of remote electrically energized on-off switching combinations of alphabetic or pictographic components arranged on a display surface. Illumination may be integral to the components, such as characterized by lamps or other light-emitting devices; or it may be from an external light source designed to reflect off the changeable component display. See also "Electronic message sign or center."
 - Manually activated. Changeable sign whose message copy or content can be changed manually.
- 15. Combination Sign: A sign that is supported partly by a pole and partly by a building structure.
- 16. Copy: Those letters, numerals, figures, symbols, logos and graphic elements comprising the content or message of a sign, excluding numerals identifying a street address only.
- 17. Development of Complex Sign: A free-standing sign identifying a multiple-occupancy development, such as a shopping center or planned *industrial* park, which is controlled by a single owner or landlord, approved in accordance with Section 1009.2 of this chapter.
- **18. Directional Sign:** Any sign that is designed and erected for the purpose of providing direction and/or orientation for pedestrian or vehicular traffic.
- 19. Double-Faced Sign: A sign with two faces, back to back.
- 20. Electric Sign: Any sign activated or illuminated by means of electrical energy.
- 21. Electronic Message Sign or Center: An electrically activated changeable sign whose variable message capability can be electronically programmed.
- 22. Exterior Sign: Any sign placed outside a building.
- 23. Flag: A sign, constructed of cloth and attached to a staff or pole.
- 24. Flashing Sign: See "Animated sign, electrically activated."
- 25. Free-Standing Sign: A sign principally supported by a structure affixed to the ground, and not supported by a building, including signs supported by one or more columns, poles or braces placed in or upon the ground.
- **26. Frontage (Building):** The length of an exterior building wall or structure of a single premise orientated to the public way or other properties that it faces.
- **27. Frontage (Property):** The length of the property line(s) of any single premise along either a public way or other properties on which it borders.
- **28. Illuminated Sign:** A sign characterized by the use of artificial light, either projecting through its surface(s) (internally illuminated); or reflecting off its surface(s) (externally illuminated).

- 29. Interior Sign: Any sign placed within a building, but not including "window signs" as defined by this ordinance. Interior signs, with the exception of window signs as defined, are not regulated by this chapter.
- **30. Marquee Sign:** A permanent roof-like structure, including the structural support system, projecting beyond a building wall at the entrance to a building or extending along and projecting beyond building wall.
- **31. Menu Board:** A free-standing sign orientated to the drive-through lane for a restaurant that advertises the menu items available from the drive-through window, and which has no more than 20 percent of the total area for such a sign utilized for business identification.
- 32. Multiple-Faced Sign: A sign containing three or more faces.
- 33. **Nonconforming Sign:** Any sign that existed lawfully prior to the adoption of the Sign Ordinance (DATE OF ADOPTION) which now does not conform with the provisions of this ordinance.
- 34. Off-Premise Sign Directional: A sign on private property whose only purpose is to direct vehicular traffic for delivers and visitation and is not intended to be used as a form of advertisement.
- 35. **Off-Premise Sign:** A sign, which pertains to a business, industry, or other activity which is not located on the premise upon which the sign is located.
- **36. On-Premise Sign:** A sign erected, maintained or used in the outdoor environment for the purpose of the display of messages appurtenant to the use of, products sold on, or the sale or lease of, the property on which it is displayed.
- 37. Outdoor Advertising Sign: A permanent sign erected, maintained or used in the outdoor environment for the purpose of the display of commercial or noncommercial messages not appurtenant to the use of, products sold on, or the sale or lease of, the property on which it is displayed.
- 38. Permanent Sign: A sign that is displayed for more than a total of ninety days in any one year.
- 39. Pole Sign: See "Free-standing sign."
- **40. Political Sign:** A temporary sign intended to advance a political statement, cause or candidate for office. A legally permitted outdoor advertising sign shall not be considered to be a political sign.
- **41. Portable Sign:** Any *sign* not permanently attached to the ground or to a building or building surface.
- **42. Projecting Sign:** A *sign* other than a wall sign that is attached to or projects more than 18 inches (457 mm) from a building face or wall or from a structure whose primary purpose is other than the support of a sign. For visual reference, see Section 1003.
- **43. Premises Sign:** A lot or number of lots situated a building or group of buildings designed as a unit or on which a building or group of buildings are to be constructed housing multiple businesses.
- **44. Real Estate Sign:** A temporary *sign* advertising the sale, lease or rental of the property or premises upon which it is located.
- 45. **Sandwich Board Sign:** A portable sign shaped like an A-frame with a sign pane on one or both sides.

- 46. Sign: Any device visible from a public place that displays either commercial or noncommercial messages by means of graphic presentation of alphabetic or pictorial symbols or representations. Noncommercial flags or any flags displayed from flagpoles or staffs will not be considered to be signs.
- **47. Sign Area:** The area of the smallest geometric figure, or the sum of the combination of regular geometric figures, which comprise the sign face. The area of any double-sided or "V" shaped *sign* shall be the area of the largest single face only. The area of a sphere shall be computed as the area of a circle. The area of all other multiple-sided signs shall be computed as 50 percent of the sum of the area of all faces of the *sign*.
- **48. Sign Face:** The surface upon, against or through which the *sign* copy is displayed or illustrated, not including structural supports, architectural features of a building or sign structure, nonstructural or decorative trim, or any areas that are separated from the background surface upon which the sign copy is displayed by a distinct delineation, such as a reveal or border..
- 49. **Sign Structure:** Any structure supporting a sign.
- 50. Snipe Sign: A temporary sign or poster affixed to a tree, fences, etc. Snipe sign. Any sign of any size, made of any material, including paper, cardboard, wood and metal, when such sign is tacked, nailed, posted, pasted, glued, or otherwise attached to trees, poles, fences or other objects, and the advertising matter appearing thereon is not applicable to the premises upon which said sign is located
 - 51. Special Event: A temporary sign that is either on-site or off-site that provides identification or information pertaining to a special event or occurrence sponsored by a non-profit or civic organization.
 - 50.52. **Temporary Sign:** A sign not constructed for or intended for permanent use. Temporary signs may not be displayed for more than a total of thirty (30) days in any one year.
 - 54.53. Wall Sign: A *sign* that is attached to a vertical wall of building that projects not more than 18 inches from the building or structure wall.
 - 52.54. **Window Sign:** A *sign* within one foot of a window message intended to be visible to and readable from the public way or from adjacent property.

l. General Provisions.

- Conformance to codes. Any sign hereafter erected shall conform to the provisions of this ordinance and the provisions of the *International Building Code* and of any other ordinance or regulation within this jurisdictions.
- Signs in rights-of-way. No sign other than an official traffic sign or similar sign shall be erected
 within 2 feet of the lines of any street, or within any public way, unless specifically authorized by
 other ordinances or regulations of this jurisdiction or by specific authorization of the-City Council
 code official
- 3. <u>Projections over public ways</u>. Signs projecting over public walkways shall be permitted to do so only subject to the projection and clearance limits either defined herein or, if not so defined, at a minimum height of 8 feet from *grade* level to the bottom of the sign. Signs, architectural projections or *sign* structures projecting over vehicular access areas must conform to the minimum height clearance limitations imposed by the jurisdiction for such structures.
- 4. <u>Traffic visibility.</u> No sign or sign structure shall be erected at the intersection of any street in such a manner as to obstruct free and clear vision, nor at any location where by its position, shape or color it may interfere with or obstruct the view of or be confused with any authorized traffic sign, signal or device.
- 5. Computation of frontage. If a premises contains walls facing more than one property line or encompasses property frontage bounded by more than one street or other property usages, the sign area(s) for each building wall or property frontage will be computed separately for each building wall or property line facing a different frontage. The sign area(s) thus calculated shall be permitted to then be applied to permitted signs placed on each separate wall or property line frontage.
- 6. Maintenance, repair and removal. Every sign permitted by this ordinance shall be kept in good condition and repair. When any sign becomes insecure, in danger of falling or is otherwise deemed unsafe by the code official, or if any sign shall be unlawfully installed, erected or maintained in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, the owner thereof or the person or firm using same shall, upon written notice by the Building, Zoning, Licensing, Services official forthwith in the case of immediate danger, and in any case within not more than 10 days, make such sign conform to the provisions of this ordinance, or shall remove it. If within 10 days the order is not complied with, the code official shall be permitted to remove or cause such sign to be removed at the expense of the owner and/or the user of the sign.
- 7. Master sign plan required. All landlord or single-owner controlled multiple-occupancy development complexes, such as shopping centers or planned *industrial* parks, shall submit to the Building Zoning and Licensing Services a master sign plan prior to issuance of new sign permits. The master sign plan shall establish standards and criteria for all signs in the complex that require permits, and shall address, at a minimum, the following:
 - a. Proposed sign locations.
 - b. Materials.
 - c. Type of illumination.
 - d. Design of free-standing sign structures.
 - e. Size.
 - f. Quantity.
 - g. Uniform standards for non business signage, including directional and informational signs.

8. Illumination

- a. No internally illuminated sign shall be used within 100 feet of any residential zone.
- b. On externally illuminated signs, the light source shall be steady, stationary, shielded, downcast, and directed solely at the sign. The sign surface shall be non reflective.

- Illuminated signs shall send no glare onto the road or onto any neighboring residential properties.
- 9. Removal of Portable and Other Movable and Temporary Signs.
 - a. The Zoning Administrator, or other city personnel designated by the City Manager, shall cause to be removed any sign placed on or over any public right-of-way or public property that is without a valid permit or is not in compliance with the terms of a valid permit, or where such a sign is exempt from permit requirements, the sign is not in compliance with the standards and provisions of this ordinance.
 - b. Signs Related to An Adjacent Principal Use. Where a sign that is placed on or over any public right-of-way or public property in violation of this ordinance is related to a principal use of adjacent private property, the Zoning Administrator, or other city personnel designated by the City Manager, shall notify the owner of the principal use or the property that a violation exists and shall specify a time limit for removal of the sign. If the owner fails to comply with the order for removal, the Zoning Administrator, or other city personnel designated by the City Manager, shall remove the sign and the owner shall be liable for the cost of said removal and subsequent storage. If the owner does not redeem the sign within thirty (30) calendar days from the date that the sign is removed, the sign shall be deemed to be abandoned and may be disposed of by the City as abandoned property; and
 - c. Other Signs. Where a sign that is placed on or over any public right-of-way or public property in violation of this ordinance is not erected in connection with elections or political campaigns, and is unrelated to a principal use of adjacent private property, the Zoning Administrator, or other city personnel designated by the City Manager, shall remove the sign and it shall be deemed to be abandoned and may be disposed of by the City as abandoned property."

m. Specific Sign Requirements.

 Animated Sign. Animated signs, except as prohibited in Section I3, are permitted in Granite Ridge Development, commercial and *industrial* zones only. Changeable signs, manually activated, are permitted for nonresidential uses in all zones. Changeable signs, electrically activated, are permitted in all nonresidential zones.

2. Awning Sign.

- a. The copy area of awning signs shall not exceed an area equal to 25 percent of the background area of the awning or awning surface to which such a sign is affixed or applied, or the permitted area for wall or fascia signs, whichever is less.
- Neither the background color of an awning, nor any graphic treatment or embellishment thereto such as striping, patterns or valances, shall be included in the computation of sign copy area.

3. Canopy Signs.

- a. The permanently-affixed copy area of *canopy* or marquee signs shall not exceed an area equal to 25 percent of the face area of the *canopy*, marquee or architectural projection upon which such sign is affixed or applied.
- b. Graphic striping, patterns or color bands on the face of a building, *canopy*, marquee or architectural projection shall not be included in the computation of sign copy area.
- Directory Signs. For businesses located on Secondary Streets within the Downtown Commercial District.

- a. Not to exceed four (4) square feet in area.
- Permission must be obtained in writing from the property owner on whose premise the sign is to be placed.
- c. These signs shall not obscure any portion of road, intersection, or sidewalk.
- d. Not more than 25 percent of the area of any directional sign shall be permitted to be devoted to business identification or logo, which area shall not be assessed as identification sign area.

Directional Signs.

No more than two directional signs shall be permitted per street entrance to any lot. There shall be none in residential zones. For all other zones, the maximum area for any directional sign visible from adjacent property or rights-of-way shall be 10 square feet. Not more than 25 percent of the area of any directional sign shall be permitted to be devoted to business identification or logo, which area shall not be assessed as identification sign area.

- 6. <u>Development and Construction Signs</u>. Signs temporarily erected during construction to inform the public of the developer, contractors, architects, engineers, the nature of the project or anticipated completion dates, shall be permitted in all zoning districts, subject to the following limitations:
 - a. Such signs on a single residential lot, residential subdivision or multiple residential lots, and nonresidential uses shall be limited to one sign, not greater than 10 feet in height and 32 square feet in area.
 - b. Such signs for commercial or *industrial* projects shall be limited to one sign per street front.
 - c. Development and construction signs may not be displayed until after the issuance of construction permits by the building official, and must be removed not later than 24 hours following issuance of an occupancy permit for any or all portions of the project.
- 7. Electronic Message Sign. All permitted EMCs shall be equipped with a sensor or other device that automatically determines the ambient illumination and be programmed to automatically dim according to ambient light conditions at all times of the day or night. Electronic changing signs may be freestanding or building mounted, one or two-sided, may be a component of a larger sign or billboard, and shall conform to the following minimum requirements along with all other requirements for signage within this ordinance:
 - a. Electronic Message Center portion of the sign shall not make up more than 75% of the actual sign surface. In no case shall an electronic message center exceed 32 square feet.
 - b. Animation on Static EMCs shall be limited to the actual changing of the message. No flashing, blinking, or pulsating of lights shall be allowed. Electronic Message Centers must be equipped to freeze in one position or discontinue the display in the event that a malfunction occurs.
 - c. Minimum Display Time: All illumination elements on the face of Static electronic changing signs shall remain at a fixed level of illumination for a period of not less than 8 seconds.
 - d. Software for operating the EMC must be able to show current and factory brightness levels upon request. The owner/installer of Electronic Message Displays shall certify as part of the application that signs will not exceed the brightness levels specified in this section.
 - e. The brightness shall not exceed 0.3 footcandles at night.
 - f. Flashing or animated signs (including temporary interior window displays or banners) of red, amber, or green colored lights shall not be permitted.
- 8. <u>Flag.</u> Each store front may be allowed one (1) Open or welcome flag that is position at a height so as not to impede the flow of pedestrians.

- 9. <u>Home Occupation-1</u> Sign. No signs are permitted
- 10. <u>Home Occupation-2 Sign</u>. There may be only one sign for the business visible from the street. The sign shall be non-illuminated and shall not exceed three (3) square feet.
- 11. <u>Home Occupation-3 Sign</u>. There may be only one sign for the business visible from the street. The sign shall be non-illuminated and shall not exceed four (4) square feet.
- 12. <u>Marquee Sign</u>. No marquee shall be erected unless designed by a registered structural engineer and approved by Director Building Zoning Licensing Services. It may extend over the sidewalk across the ROW to the curb line provided it has a minimum height above the sidewalk of ten feet above the curb level and does not exceed five feet in height.
- 13. Off-Premise Sign. Off premises signs are prohibited except for the following signs if permission is granted from the owner of the off premises location. A setback of at least 5 feet is required for these signs and they shall not be placed in the road right-of-way (i.e. they must be placed on private property).
 - a. One freestanding sign per <u>business</u> directing people to the site. The sign may not exceed 2 square feet per side or 4 feet in height. No illumination is allowed. It may include only the name and/or logo, with simple directions. The sign must be durable and constructed of solid, finished materials
 - b. A real estate sign one per premise shall not exceed 6 square feet per side.
 - c. Yard sale signs (See section M 24)
 - d. A sign for an office park or industrial park may be erected at the entrance to the park on an out parcel or, with the approval of the Planning Board, within the road right-of-way.
 - A promotional banner for special public or nonprofit institutional events may be placed
 anywhere in the City, including across a public road, if approved by the City Manager.
 - f. Two seasonal agricultural directional signs not to exceed 4 square feet each are permitted when intended to direct patrons to a farm for the purpose of purchasing or picking seasonal agricultural produce or products during the season within which the produce is available for sale or harvest.
 - g. One portable sign on the sidewalk in front of businesses in the Downtown Commercial, Special Downtown, -and Neighborhood Mixed Use lying in density rings.
 - h. Road Signs.
- 14. <u>Political Sign.</u> Political Advertising. The following provisions are in addition to the political advertising controls established under RSA 664:14, 664:17, and 664:2, as amended:
 - a. Political advertising shall be defined in RSA 664:2, as amended.
 - b. Political signs may not exceed 32 Square feet per side in area nor 8 feet in height.
- 15. No political advertising shall be placed or affixed upon any public property, including City rights of way. No political advertising shall be placed or affixed upon private property without the owner's consent.
 - e. Placement of advertising No political advertising shall be placed on or affixed to any public property including City rights of way or private property without the owner's consent. All-political advertising shall be removed by the candidate no later than the second Friday

following the election unless the election is a primary and the advertising concerns a candidate who is a winner in the primary. Signs shall not be placed on or affixed to utility poles or highway signs. Political advertising may be placed within City owned rights of way as long as the advertising does not obstruct the safe flow of traffic and the advertising is placed with the consent of the owner of land over which the right of way passes.

- स<u>.a.</u> Signature, Identification, Lack of Authorization shall be in accordance with RSA 664:14, as amended.
- e-b. Political signs shall not be erected in the City Adopt-A-Spots or the Rochester Common. There must be a 25 foot buffer from the garden bed edge.
- £c. Removal of signs shall be in accordance with RSA 664:17, as amended.
- g. City of Rochester Adopt A Spots are situated in the following locations:
 - Granite State Business Park
 - Christmas Tree Island Granite State Business Park
 - Strafford Square
 - Corner of Portland Street/Olsen Way
 - The Common
 - Duval Park
 - Merrill Park at City Hall & Front of City Hall
 - Tax Revenue Office
 - Library (Front Entrance)
 - Public Works Department
 - Stairs and Front RPD/Museum Way & City Hall Island
 - Rochester Fire Department Flagpoles
 - Rochester Community Center/Flagpole
 - Columbus Avenue Right of-Way between Hancock Street and South Main-Street
 - Gonic Center Square
 - General Wolfe Tavern Barrels
 - Welcome to Rochester/Route 125
 - Union/Wakefield Street
 - Ten Rod Road Industrial Park
 - Airport Welcome Sign
 - Route 125/Flagg Road
 - East Rochester Square
 - Elks Lodge
 - Woodman Square Park/Charles Street
 - Torr Park at Spaulding and Urn atWading Pool
- h-d. The area and location of signs used in conjunction with uses allowed by the Board of Adjustment as special exceptions shall also be approved by the Planning Board_and shall conform to the sign regulations for the district in which they are located. The area and location of such signs shall be in harmony with the character of the neighborhood in which they are located.
- i-e. No sign, except for political signs, shall be erected until a permit for same has been obtained from the Director of Building, Zoning, & Licensing Services.

- 15.16. Portable Sign. Portable signs shall be permitted only in the Downtown Commercial, Special Downtown Overlay, Neighborhood Mixed Use lying in Density Rings, subject to the following limitations:
 - a. No more than one such sign may be displayed on any property, and shall not exceed a height of 4 feet or an area of 8 square feet per side.
 - b. Any portable sign that is placed on sidewalk
 - i. Shall be situated directly in front of the business(es) which is being advertised.
 - Shall not block passage along sidewalk including passage for handicapped persons and shall not present a safety hazard.
 - c. May be displayed during business hours only.
 - d. Appropriately placed to minimize appearance of clutter as determined by the <u>Director of Building, Zoning, and Licensing Services</u>.
 - e. Only one sign per individual business.
- 16.17. <u>Projecting Sign.</u> Signs are permitted in the following zones:
 - Multiple projecting signs shall be permitted on buildings having multiple occupants providing only than one projecting sign per occupant will be permitted.
 - b. Projecting signs shall:
 - 1. Not overhang any public property or public right of way.
 - Be attached to the side of a building with a decorative support bracket engineered to and designed to withstand wind loads.
 - 3. Extend from the side of the building no more than eleven feet.
 - Be part of the wall sign calculations which cumulative total include both projecting s
 and wall signs shall not exceed twenty percent of the wall area to which the sign is
 attached.
 - Such signs shall maintain a clear vertical distance above any public sidewalk a minimum of 10 feet.
- 17.18. Roadside Farm Stand Signs. No more than 2 signs with a maximum combined total of 20 square feet is permitted.
- 48.19. Real Estate Sign shall be permitted in all zoning districts, subject to the following limitations:
 - a. Real estate signs located on a single residential lot shall be limited to one sign, not greater than 8 square feet in area and 6 feet in height.
 - b. Real estate signs may not be illuminated in residential districts.
 - c. There may be no more than one sign per street frontage except on lots with more than 500 feet of street frontage a second sign may be placed.
 - d. Real estate signs shall be removed not later than 10 days after execution of a lease agreement in the event of a lease, or the closing of the sale in the event of a purchase.
- 19.20. Sandwich Board Sign. See portable signs.
- 20.21. Street Banners. Temporary street banners used to inform the public about community events and activities may be placed within or above the road right of way or in other public locations if approved by the City Manager and signed off from all departments.
- 21.22. Special promotion, event and grand opening signs. Signs temporarily displayed to advertise

special promotions, events and grand openings shall be permitted for nonresidential uses and for all commercial and *industrial* districts subject to the following limitations:

- a. Such signs shall be limited to one sign per street front.
- b. Such signs may be displayed for not more than 30 consecutive days in any 12-month period, and not more than 30 days in any calendar year. The signs shall be erected no more than 5 days prior to the event or grand opening, and shall be removed not more than 1 day after the event or grand opening.
- c. The total area of all such signs shall not exceed 32 square feet.

22.23. Special event signs in public ways.

Signs advertising a special community event shall be allowed in or over public rights-of-way, subject to approval by City Council Building, Zoning, and Licensing, Services official as to the size, location and method of erection. The official may not approve any special event signage that would impair the safety and convenience of use of public rights-of-way, or obstruct traffic visibility.

- <u>23.24.</u> <u>Window Sign.</u> Window signs shall be permitted for any nonresidential use in, all Downtown Commercial and *industrial* districts, subject to the following limitations:
 - a. The aggregate area of all such signs shall not exceed 25 % of the window area on which such signs are displayed within the Historic District.

24.25. Yard sale signs.

- a. Yard sale signs may not be placed prior to 3 days before the sale and must be removed within 24 hours after the sale. The date and time of the yard sale must be on the sign.
- b. They may not exceed 6 square feet and may not be illuminated.
- c. The signs may be placed off premises for noncommercial sales related to a single residential dwelling unit (or informal joint sales among neighbors) provided they are not placed on utility poles, are not a distraction to traffic, and comply with Requirements by Zoning District.
- Requirements by Zoning District. The following special requirements shall apply in each respective zoning district.

Residential Zoning Districts.

- a. For permitted nonresidential uses one freestanding sign with a maximum area of 6 square feet per side plus one attached sign not to exceed 12 square feet is permitted. Height: Signs shall have a maximum height of six (6) ft.
- b. Internally illuminated signs (including neon signs and signage placed in a window) are not permitted.
- c. No sign may be illuminated between the hours of 9:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. with the exception of signage: a) showing property addresses; b) for residential communities; and c) for businesses and organizations during any specific hours in that time period that the businesses are open.

2. Nonresidential Zoning Districts

- a. <u>Baseline</u>. The following advertising signage is permitted for one nonresidential use occupying a single building in commercial and industrial zoning districts (except as otherwise indicated in this article). Additional allowances beyond these limitations or other restrictions for various situations are shown in the subsequent subsections
- b. <u>Freestanding signs</u>. Only one free standing sign shall be permitted on a lot even if there is more than one building or use on that lot. No part of any free standing sign shall be located within 5 feet of any property line.

Note. All signs that are to be located in the historic district are also subject to the provisions of Article XIV – Historic Overlay District

- a. Wall Signs. No wall sign shall exceed ten percent (10 %) of the area of the building frontage as measure by the width of the wall containing the main public entrance by the height (measured from the floor level to the top of the first floor cornice area, or to one foot below secondary story window) to which it is attached. For buildings with multiple tenants having store fronts only, the façade rented by the tenant shall be considered as wall area for a sign.
 i. A maximum of four (4) signs.
 - Buildings located in the Granite Ridge Development District, between the service
 roads and Route 11, are allowed one additional wall mounted sign per tenant is
 permitted on the rear façade. The same size restrictions as applied to the front façade
 shall determine the size of sign.

ii

- b. <u>Temporary signs</u>. One temporary sign is allowed at any one time, including portable and banner signs. For portable signs (where they are permitted; (see below) the maximum area is 8 square feet and the maximum height is 4 feet. Banner signs, not exceeding 60 square feet, are permitted for grand openings of new business only, and may be displayed for a maximum of 30 consecutive days. Permits are required for these signs with a fee of \$10.
- c. <u>Directory signs</u>. For each additional independent enterprise on a site beyond one, an additional 10 square feet may be added to one freestanding directory sign not to exceed 100 square feet. Property owners of separate adjoining lots may also elect to have one joint directory sign.
- d. <u>Attached directory signs</u>. One additional attached directory sign of the principal uses within a multi-tenant building is permitted on the exterior wall at each entrance to the building. It shall not exceed 3 square feet plus 1 square foot for each independent enterprise.

- e. <u>Upper floor units</u>. Each upper floor occupant may use one attached sign placed at no higher than the second floor level not to exceed six square feet per side for each occupant plus window signs. Window signage shall not exceed 25% of the total window area.
- f. On multiple occupant sites up to 3 portable signs for independent enterprises may be placed at the same time.
- g. Secondary Entrance. By Conditional Use Permit issued by the Planning Board any site with at least 300 feet of linear lot frontage and with a second driveway entrance located at least 200 feet from the primary entrance may have a second freestanding sign at the second entrance not to exceed 16 square feet and 8 feet in height.
- h. Corner or multiple frontage lots. By Conditional Use Permit issued by the Planning Board any corner lot or a rear frontage lot (or double frontage) may have one additional freestanding sign with a maximum area of 24 square feet is allowed on the second frontage provided the property across the street on that second frontage is not zoned residential.
- i. Specific Zoning Districts

Internally illuminated signs are permitted only in the Highway Commercial, Downtown Commercial, Granite Ridge Development, and Industrial Districts.

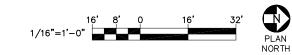
FIRST FLOOR PLAN

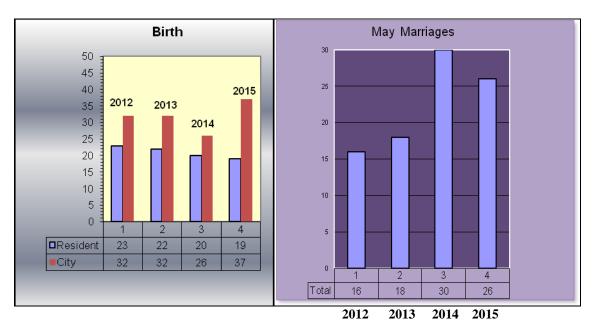

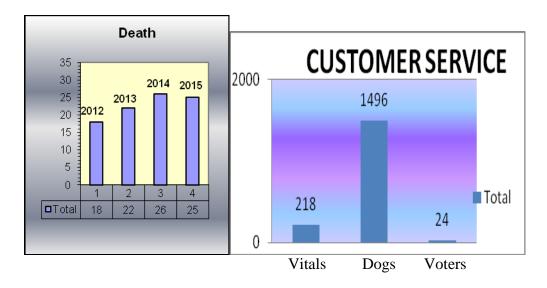

Code Compliance Deficiencies

There are up to four steps of actions being used to deal with complaints/ violations: The first being verbal contact. The next method is a written notice of violation. This consists of a notice that is mailed first class as well as certified mail giving the property owner or violator a detailed description of the deficiencies and a date to make the appropriate corrections. The requested date depends on the time that is considered reasonable for the requested action that needs corrected, for instance, a minor repair to a fence may warrant a couple of days, while replacing an entire fence may require a few weeks. If there has been no contact made by the recipient of the notice, a follow up inspection is then made. If the violation(s) still exist, a second notice of violation is mailed with a new correction date on it. This process is then followed through again with a final notice. If the violation has still not been corrected after these notices, the paper work is turned over to Attorney Grossman for legal/court action to be taken. If the violation was a time sensitive issue, such as trash piling up, we would skip the second notice and go straight to a final notice to help expedite the process.

Economic Development Specialist

Downtown Initiatives

A collaboration with community partners, Rochester Main Street, the Greater Rochester Chamber of Commerce, along with Community & Economic Development Office are working on a pub crawl with sponsor brewery, Sam Adams, for the promotion of Downtown Restaurants.

Workforce Development

Economic Development helped host the first annual Career Assistance Workshop with the Creteau Technical Center on the 28th. Featured was a panel of three local businesses presenting students a roadmap for employment skills and orientation to diverse workplaces, from manufacturing, construction, retail and hospitality. The students visited booths of twelve other local Rochester businesses and talked to them about jobs opportunities and internships. It was a successful event and there are plans to continue this interactive event in 2016.

Staff Development

Intensive business development training occurred this month on the following: CDGB and NH Housing, SBA & SCORE in Portsmouth and financing options.

Business Attraction

A meeting happened with a potential manufacturer interested in moving his business to Rochester. After touring the facilities and learning about his space and business requirements, there is a follow up meeting to discuss potential locations that would fit their needs in Rochester.

The team exhibited at a daylong Women Inspiring Women event In Bedford, which had over 100 businesses in attendance, in addition, speaker Senator Kelly Ayotte.

PR & Communication Strategy

Our office met with the Rochester Times to discuss a potential monthly column highlighting the manufacturers in Rochester. This would be a great opportunity to educate our community in what is made in Rochester as well as give a tutorial on manufacturing today and how it's changed from early manufacturing jobs.

We also provided Rochester Times requested Buxton analysis reports regarding their readers buying habits, consumer propensity & leakage report, as well as other demographic information to help with their business model/strategic planning.

Community Development Coordinator Report Prepared and submitted by the Community Development Coordinator May 2015

Continuing Projects

- Hanson Pines Pavilion: This project is proceeding, but the revised timeline will have the project be completed in July 2015.
- Public Library HVAC System: This project was rebid, as the Department of Public Works decided the received bids were inadequate. Due to the rebid, the project is now estimated to be completed in July 2015.

Future Projects

- O <u>Bicycle Racks Project:</u> There are pre-existing bicycle racks at the Rochester Commons and at City Hall. There are two locations for bicycle racks (Squamanagonic Disc Golf Course and Gonic Pool) that are not located in HUD low-moderate income census tracts. The Community Development Coordinator suggests relocating the two current bicycle racks to the disc golf course and pool. Then, CDBG funds can be used to install bicycle racks at the remaining locations, all of which are located in HUD low-mod census tracts.
- FY 2015-2016 Grant Recipients: Letters of award/no award have been sent to all FY 2015-2016 CDBG grant applicants. The letters inform those who are receiving grants that contracts will be sent out in June 2015 and that no funds are to be expended until July 2015.

HUD Site Visit and CDBG Program

On April 30th and May 1st, representatives from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) visited the City of Rochester's Community Development office to conduct a scheduled review of the City's CDBG program. Overall, HUD determined that the City is in compliance with HUD regulations and that the City's CDBG program is serving the intended beneficiaries of CDBG funding. There were a few minor areas of improvement noted during the visit, mostly regarding more formalized policies and documentation, and the Community Development Coordinator is following up on those recommendations.



The approved FY 2015-2020 Consolidated Action Plan and FY 2015-2016 Annual Action
 Plan were submitted to HUD for review and approval on May 14, 2015.

Other Items

- O Bridging the Gaps: The Community Development Coordinator has received the notice of release of remaining FY 2014 grant funds (\$91,080) from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). The City of Rochester is now officially fiscal agent for Bridging the Gaps. The Community Development Coordinator has prepared and submitted the official request for change in key personnel for SAMHSA to approve the hiring of a new coalition coordinator.
- JOB Loans Overview: As requested at the April 2015 Community Development
 Committee meeting, attached is a brief overview of the JOB Loans loan program and the loan application and acceptance process.
- HUD Lead Abatement Grant: Information on lead poisoning in the City of Rochester, including how data is collected and analyzed, is attached.
- <u>Fair Housing:</u> The Community Development Coordinator attended a fair housing accessibility training on May 5th provided by HUD and the New Hampshire Housing Finance Authority. Information and materials obtained at the training have been shared with the Planning Department and the Rochester Housing Authority.
- Section 3: The Community Development Coordinator attended a webinar on May 19th regarding proposed HUD rule changes governing the implementation of Section 3, which requires preferential hiring of low-income public housing residents on HUD-financed projects. The Community Development Coordinator has drafted comments on the proposed rule, which are currently in review, that discuss implementation burdens for smaller communities that receive relatively little HUD funding. Comments will be submitted by the deadline of May 26, 2015.
- Economic Development Training: The Community Development Coordinator and the Economic Development Specialist attended a CDBG Economic Development training on May 11th. This will assist in better understanding and coordination between Community Development and Economic Development. The training was recommended by HUD's Region 1 economic development specialist during the April 30th—May 1st HUD site visit.

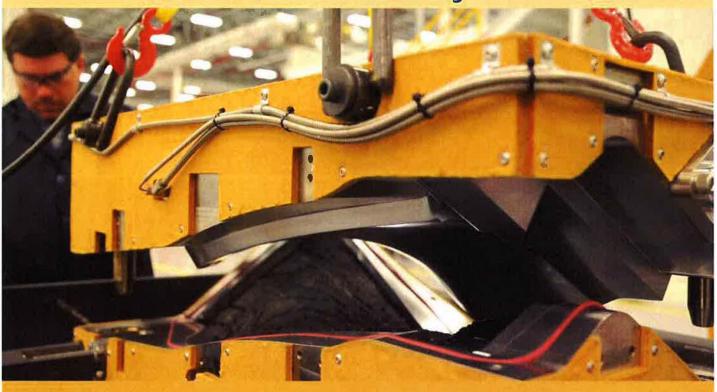

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Job Opportunity Benefit (JOB) Loan Program

OVERVIEW: The purpose of the JOB Loan Program is to increase job opportunities through the creation and/or retention of jobs for Rochester City residents. Eligible activities are limited to 1) land and building acquisition and expansion, 2) the purchase of machinery and equipment, and 3) working capital. Funding for this program is provided by a Community Development Block Grant. Eligible firms must be located, expanding, or relocating within the boundaries of the City of Rochester, including East Rochester and Gonic.

<u>ELIGIBILITY DETERINATION</u>: The City of Rochester may conduct a preliminary inquiry to determine eligibility. Upon a positive determination, applicant must complete a loan application to be submitted with additional required information and a NON-REFUNDABLE FEE of \$125.00. City staff will analyze the application for presentation to the Loan Review Committee for final action.

<u>PROGRAM ADMINISTRATION</u>: This program is administered by the City of Rochester through the Department of Economic Development. Staff interviews and screens applicants, prepares documentation for the Loan Review Committee, and provides administrative services such as credit verifications, collection, and analysis of financial statements.

LOAN PROCESSING AND APPROVAL: Once the department certifies that the proposal meets all HUD eligibility tests, the loan application will be presented to the Loan Review Committee. The Loan Review Committee will determine if the applicant has the ability to repay the requested loan, and if the project meets with the city's expectations for this particular loan program. The decision of the Loan Review Committee will be promptly communicated to the applicant in writing. If the loan request is approved, the applicant will be sent appropriate documentation including a commitment letter which must be signed and returned to the Department of Economic Development within ten (10) days. Upon receipt of the signed commitment letter, a closing date will be established.

LOAN REVIEW COMMITTEE: The Loan Review Committee shall meet upon the call of the Chairperson once a loan application has been recommended to them by the department staff. Committee membership shall be comprised of up to five (5) members: the City Manager, up to two (2) Rochester residents with banking or financial analysis expertise, and up to two members of the Rochester banking community.

<u>LOAN CLOSING</u>: Once the loan has been approved, all loan closing documentation is prepared by Department Economic Development staff and forwarded to the City Solicitor for review. Upon approval by the City Solicitor, the department staff will schedule a closing and disburse funds according to the provisions of the loan authorization. The borrower shall be responsible for any provision outlined in the loan documentation.

Items the Applicant needs to provide:

- Written evidence of private sector participation in the project (such as a bank commitment letter).
- Insurance on the property and/or items to be used as security. Proof of such insurance shall be provided at the time of the loan closing. The amount of insurance shall be at least equal to the principle amount of the loan from the City of Rochester, plus the amount of any loan having priority over the City's loan. The City of Rochester shall be named as loss payee of such insurance policy as its interests may appear.
- Key Man Life Insurance for each principal in the amount of the loan. Proof of such insurance shall be provided at the time of the loan closing.
- 3 years Income Tax Returns for each principal in the JOB Loan application.
- Personal Financial Statements for each principal applying for the JOB Loan
- A complete Business Plan
- A completed and signed Application with the accompanying fee (\$125)
- All other documentation required in the Application.

Statewide Blood Lead Surveillance

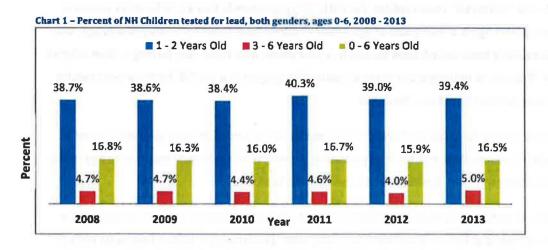
The HHLPPP maintains an extensive blood lead surveillance system for the purpose of monitoring trends in blood lead levels in adults and children throughout New Hampshire. The data helps identify populations at risk for EBLL, to determine whether screening guidelines are being followed in high-risk populations, and to ensure that appropriate environmental and medical follow-up is being provided to children with EBLL. Under Title X Public Health, RSA 130-A Lead Paint Poisoning Prevention and Control, all licensed laboratories, including those locations using automatic Lead Care II Analyzers are obligated to report blood lead data for all New Hampshire residents to the HHLPPP. An estimated 100 licensed laboratories that serve approximately 1,500 medical clinics, hospitals, and employer groups report blood lead data to the HHLPPP.

Blood Lead Testing Rates for Children

According to the 2010 U.S. Census, there are 84,767 children under the age of six residing in the State of New Hampshire. Of these children, 27,480 are one and two year olds, our most vulnerable age for lead poisoning. According to the *New*

61% of the children who were at highest risk of lead poisoning did not receive the recommended test for lead.

Hampshire Childhood Lead Poisoning Screening and Management Guidelines¹¹, HHLPPP estimates that 23,554 New Hampshire children ages 1 and 2 should have been tested for lead poisoning in 2013. Unfortunately, only 10,830 were tested, meaning 61% of the children who were at the highest risk of being exposed to lead did not receive the recommended test for lead. Chart 1 illustrates the historical overview of childhood lead testing for children 0-6 years of age in 2013.

According to the same 2010 U.S. Census, 44,293 children aged 3 through 6 years reside in New Hampshire. Of these children, a total of 2,198 were tested for EBLL in 2013. This represents 5% of the 3-6 year olds in the state. It is difficult to determine the exact number of children in this age range that should be tested for lead. Children that test negative for EBLL at age two and do not exhibit any risk factors (i.e. moving to new home, new child care, having a close relative in a pre-1978 home, or undergoing a current renovation project in a pre-78' home) do not require additional testing. The HHLPPP program does currently not have the surveillance capacity to determine the number of children 3 – 6 years old that require follow-up blood load testing.

Universal versus Target Communities

Several factors influence the rate of lead poisoning in a community. In accordance with recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, cities and towns with 27% or more pre-1950 housing stock are considered high risk communities. Some communities are determined to be at even higher risk for lead poisoning due to additional factors. These factors include the percentage of the population under the age of six; the percentage under the age of six living in poverty; the percentage of children under the age of six enrolled in Medicaid or other

federal assistance programs; and special populations living in the communities. Through a review of these factors for all 234 New Hampshire communities, the HHLPPP has designated each community as either a "Universal" or a "Target" community according to the Department of Health and Human Services, New Hampshire Childhood Lead Screening and Management Guidelines.

57% of New Hampshire's 234 communities require Universal screening of all children under six years of age

In the high-risk "Universal" communities, the HHLPPP recommends that all children be tested at one year of age and again at two years of age. Older children from three up to six years of age, who have not previously been tested, have moved to a new home, new child care, having a close relative in a pre-1978 home, or undergoing a current renovation project in a pre-78' home or who exhibit additional risk factors should also be tested

Those children under six living in "Target" communities are screened by their physician using a questionnaire to assess their risk for lead poisoning. A positive or uncertain response to any of the five questions prompts the physician to test the child for lead.

Additionally, all children enrolled in Medicaid or Head Start, regardless of town of residence, are required to be tested at both one and two years old; older children aged three to six years old not

previously tested should also be tested. It is recommended that children enrolled in WIC be tested for lead poisoning. The ACCLPP and HHLPPP also recommend that any refugee, immigrant, or internationally adopted child should be tested, and that neonates and infants born to mothers exposed to lead or with a high blood lead level during pregnancy or lactation should be tested (reference HHLPPP and ACCLPP)

In Universal or Target communities, testing a child for lead can be completed by a capillary finger stick or a venous blood draw. This testing can be done in a physician's office, laboratory, WIC clinic, healthcare center or a wellness fair. Any child having an EBLL that is 5 mcg/dl or higher from a capillary finger stick should have their EBLL confirmed with a venous draw blood test.

New Hampshire's Eight Highest Risk Communities

Through a review of surveillance data, the HHLPPP has identified eight communities where children are especially vulnerable to the dangers of lead poisoning. Risk factors reviewed are outlined in **Table 1** and include the percentage of homes built prior to 1978, percentage living in poverty, percentage of children under the age of six enrolled in Medicaid, percentage under six living in poverty, special populations living in the community and history of EBLL.

The communities identified at highest risk are Berlin, Claremont, Newport, Franklin, Laconia, Manchester, Nashua, and Rochester. The Cities of Manchester, Nashua, and Laconia are the home of special refugee populations in addition to other risk factors. Concord also has special populations, though does exhibit other risk factors making it a "highest risk" community. The City of Berlin has the largest percent of old homes with 91.7% of homes built prior to 1978. Franklin is especially

vulnerable with 19.7% of the population living in poverty and 26.7% of children under 6 years old living in poverty. Manchester follows closely with 28% of children under the age of 6 living in poverty. Laconia and Berlin have the largest percent, 85% and 81% respectively, of 0-5 year olds enrolled in Medicaid.

Cost of Preventive Testing

The HHLPPP recommends all children in high risk communities or with other risk factors be tested for blood lead before the age of six. Children receiving Medicaid or WIC benefits are required to have blood lead tests at one and two years of age. The cost of a single blood lead screening averages \$38 (in 2013 dollars), including the test and the venous blood draw. Applied to 24,000 children ages 1 and 2 that should be tested, the cost of preventive screening in New Hampshire was \$912,000. Blood lead tests are covered by Medicaid and most private health insurance.

Table 2 represents childhood blood lead testing data for children 0-71 months in age for New Hampshire's eight highest risk communities; Berlin, Franklin, Laconia, Newport, Claremont,

The cost of preventive lead testing of New Hampshire's 24,000 highest risk children ages 1 and 2 was \$912,000.

Rochester, Manchester, and Nashua. Over the past 3 years in the 12-23 month age group, New Hampshire as a whole screened 53.2% in 2011, 52.6% in 2012, and 53.2% in 2013. For 2013, the City of Berlin had the highest screening rate for this age group, followed by the Cities of Franklin and Manchester.

Over the past 3 years in the 25-35 month age group, the state as a whole screened 27.8% in 2011, 25.7% in 2012, and 26% in 2013. For 2013, the City of Berlin, again, had the highest screening rate for this age group, followed by the Cities of Manchester and Newport. Claremont and Laconia have the lowest screening rates for all ages. As a whole, these highest risk communities have had level screening rates over the last 3 years, not significantly increasing or decreasing. Using surveillance data the HHLPPP targets educational resources towards these communities in an effort to increase knowledge among parents, property owners, contractors and the medical community.

Please note in **Table 2**, that the 104% screening rate in Berlin for the 12-23 month old age group is based on the denominator of 75 children in that age group in Berlin based on the 2010 U.S. Census. A screen is defined as any test in the 2013 calendar year where the child has never had a confirmed elevation and only includes one test per child for time frame because child is only included in denominator (population) once. Please note that the numerator for the age-based screening rate is calculated based on the date of testing.

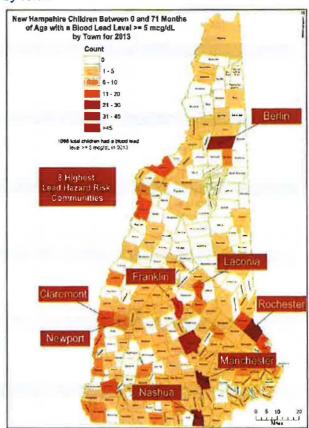

Educating Children with Elevated Blood Lead

Children with EBLL may be in need of special education because of their slower development, lower educational success, and related behavioral problems. Moreover, environmental lead exposure in children has been confirmed as a risk factor for attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD). When children have an EBLL of 2 mcg/dL or greater, the risk of ADHD is four times higher than that for children with EBLLs at or below 1mcg/dLv. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency estimates

that 20% of children with EBLLs greater than 10 mcg/dL should get special education; therefore, 15 of the 77 New Hampshire children with EBLLs at 10 mcg/dL or over should receive special education. Applied to the estimated New Hampshire average special education tuition cost per student for fiscal year 2013 which was \$13,587vi, it is projected that the total annual costs of lead related special education were roughly at \$209,000 annually for those children with EBLL greater than 10 mcg/dl. It does not take into account those children with EBLL >5 mcg/dl. This is consistent with the New Hampshire Division of Public Health Services Economic Burden of Environmentally Attributable Illness in Children in New Hampshire report^{vii} which projected the costs of lead-related special education at \$209,000 annually.

During the 2013 school year, 74,413 or 33% of all New Hampshire school age children (5 – 18 years of age) had EBLL >5mcg/dl at some point in their lives and are at risk for neurological impairment. This represents surveillance data from 1995 to 2013 collected by capillary or venous blood draw methods.

MONTHLY REPORT MAY 2015

On behalf of the Fire Department, I am pleased to provide you with the following report. It serves as a summary of the activities, projects and programs underway within the department.

DEPARTMENT INFORMATION:

During the month of May the Department responded to 261 calls for service. The month of May was very busy with brush fires as the area is drought stricken. There were 2 building fires, and 28 brush fires. In addition there were as many as 100 incidents involving either medical or motor vehicle accidents.

Call volume is up from April with 77 more runs this month, an increase of 42%

ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF:

Attended a lunch with the children at Chamberlain Street School.

Filmed a short video about the Fire Department as part of a City video project.

FIRE PREVENTION:

With spring winding down and summer now officially starting, please take a moment and review a few tips for a Fire Safe Summer.

1. Be sure to check your gas grill. It has been hibernating for the winter and bugs

may have found a new home. Check all connections and burners for these critters that may have made a nest. Use a soap and water solution to check for leaks on the fittings, especially between the tank and the grill.

- 2. Look at the dryer vent for buildup of lint. After a long winter, it may need some attention.
 - 3. Campfire? Be sure to get your Seasonal Permit from the Fire Department.

DUTY SHIFT:

There were 10 training sessions for all fulltime firefighters. Two shifts received specialized training in high lift low pressure air bags. All call force members received training in hose testing.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT:

Worked with Julia Chase from NH Emergency Management on a grant to put tablets in the fire vehicles to match what the Police are using.

MONTHLY REPORT May 2015

There were a total of 17,579 items circulated with 12,047 people visiting the library in the month of May. Two hundred fifty-eight patrons used the library's Internet computers for 1,255 hours. Visitors to the library's web site numbered 9,003. Current number of patron registrations is 34,932. Interlibrary loan activity included 70 materials borrowed from other libraries and 182 loaned to other libraries.

Children's Room Librarian, Marie Kelly and the rest of the talented Children's Room staff were busy preparing for the Children's Summer Reading Program. "Don't Bug Me....I'm Reading!" will be the theme this summer. A calendar of all summer events is available at the Children's Room desk and the library website.

Free Comic Book Day was celebrated throughout many shops and businesses in downtown Rochester on May 2nd. The Library was happy to participate again this year, allowing patrons to be treated to a free comic book when visiting the library. This was a fun family event located throughout downtown Rochester with special guests, graphic novel creators, costume characters, and of course free comic books.

The Library was pleased to exhibit the recent work of abstract artist, Daryl-Ann Hurst, of Rochester. Large and small pieces highlight her fearless use of color, many of which incorporate palette knife work and oil pastels. Hurst has also begun to introduce figurative elements in some pieces which she says emerge as a result of her subliminal right-brain expressive tendencies. This solo exhibit ran through the month of May.

In addition to the print versions of available books, 280 of our Library patrons downloaded 1,282 e-books to media devices through the library's web site this month. The RPL website also enabled 19 patrons access to Mango Languages.

PLANNING DEPARTMENT MONTHLY REPORT FOR MAY 2015

The Planning Board, Conservation Commission, Historic District Commission (HDC), and Arts & Culture Commission all met in the month of May. The Planning Board received and approve three requests for extensions, two modification applications, and a site plan/conditional use application and a summary of those are listed below. The Conservation Commission had a busy month of May with several items on their agenda. The HDC reviewed two applications for Certificates of Approval and both were approved. RE: Monthly Report – May 2015

OPERATIONS: Five of the six wards met this reporting period. Attendance was good for most meetings and very good for Ward 5 with more than 25 in attendance which included elected officials. Issues discussed overall included crime statistics, the heroin epidemic, police carrying Narcan, construction in the City and other city related issues, burglaries, thefts from motor vehicles and other property crimes, ward recruitment, consumption of alcohol on private property, the public safety committee, panhandling, face book, and the new hands free law that takes effect on July 1.

There were 35 cases sent up from patrol to the investigations bureau for review and or investigation. Currently there are 73 cases assigned for investigation. Detectives were called out for five cases, 3 untimely deaths, a stabbing and a fatal hit and run. Property crimes detectives have been conducting pawn shop compliance checks. There was good dialog with the stores that were checked and minor corrections made. There were some issues relative to corporate policies with one business that were addressed. We logged 701 pieces of evidence and returned 85 pieces to owners.

COMP STAT: Patrol continues to work on the strategy of heavy self-initiated activity. We have again logged over 1000 traffic stops and more than doubled the amount of arrests from traffic stops for this same period last year. Property crime numbers are down 30% year to date. Our case closure rate is up 11%. The only property crime up slightly for the year is burglary.

COMMUNICATIONS: There is still one vacancy in the Communications Center. We held oral boards for the vacancy and have issued conditional offers. Three specialists are still in various stages of training. We are on track for the NCIC audit to ensure we are CJIS compliant. We did have a State audit to prepare for the federal audit which we passed without any issues.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT OFFICER: This was formerly our POP report. Officer Hayes continues to work with our citizens through social media. It is overall a positive tool for the Department. The Wings and Wheels event is on track for Saturday, June 13, 2015. Officer Hayes attended several boards meetings, including Rotary, the Chamber, Monarch School and the Salvation Army Board. She also participated in the Lilac Mall Armed Forces Day. The recent Department survey has been completed. The results are being tabulated by the Crime Analyst.

K9: There were two tracks and three drug searches in Rochester. The team also participated in the Armed Forces Day at the Lilac Mall, a demonstration at the Rochester Child Care Center and an event at the William Allen School.

TAR: The TAR team responded to two call outs. One for a fatal hit and run involving a bicyclist and for a vehicle that crashed into a residence on Route 202 in East Rochester.

HONOR GUARD: The Honor Guard participated in flag detail for opening day at the Roger Allen Park, in the Police Memorial services in Concord, and a flag detail and firing squad for the Memorial Day parade.

DIVERSION: The final Teen Night for the school year was held with approximately 235 youth attending. This was another great year for this program with support from many areas of the community. Work has begun for the annual National Night Out, always held the first Tuesday in August. Nicole has been working with the State Fire Marshall's office and a state group on a statewide fire setters program for youth. She is also working with a Governor's commission for at-risk youth to develop services for juveniles from diversion to reentry.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS: The School year is winding down and both SRO's are busy with activity in their respective schools. Graduation for DARE is set for the end of the month. Approximately 300 youth with be presented with certificates. Two officers have applied for the upcoming opening for the high school SRO. Interviews are set for the middle of June.

ADMINISTRATIVE: Our recent projection continues to show we will have a surplus at the end of the fiscal year. The majority will be realized in salary and benefit lines.

The majority of the service and maintenance contracts have completed the bid process. The uniform and equipment bid has been delayed and is due to be opened June 4.

With the change forthcoming in our property liability insurance carrier, we lost a valuable training source called simunitions. This has been provided at no cost. The new carrier does not offer it. It brings officers through use of force decision making in a realistic but safe environment. We have three certified simunitions instructors, as well as some equipment and will be looking to purchase approximately \$5,000.00 in additional equipment to continue this valuable program on our own.

We recorded nearly 350 hours of training this period, most of it attributed to the advanced first aid that is required in order for us to administer the opiate inhibitor Naloxone.

Officers Garstin, Williams-Hurley and Schacht are in the field training program. Officer Arrajj began the Academy on May 4.

The policy review process continues to move forward. We will be bringing completed policies forward to the Commission as they are completed.

The new Bridging the Gaps Coordinator Molly Martuscello is slated to start at the end of the month. She comes with considerable experience and education having previously worked for the Dover Coalition for Youth and Dover Y2Y as a program specialist. She was a participant in the Dover Y2Y for 7 years.

EMD USE:

There was one Taser display and one Taser deploy this period.

FORFEITURE FUND SPENDING:

There was no forfeiture spending this period.

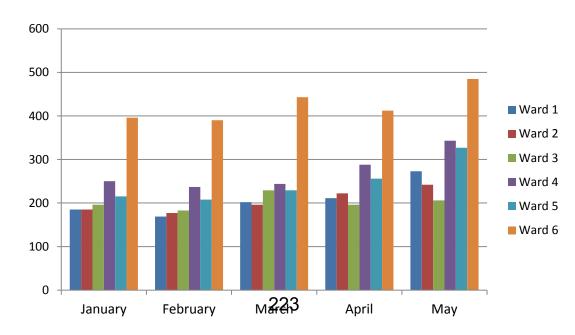

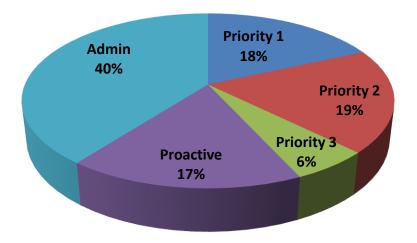

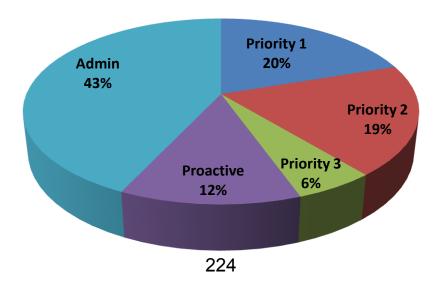
CFS by Ward



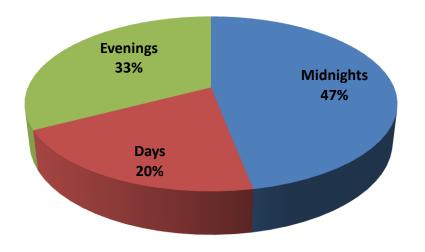
Manpower Hours May 2015



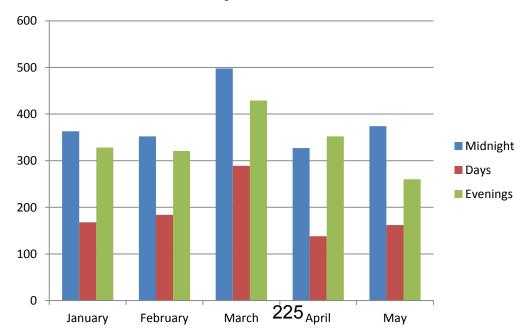
Manpower Hours May 2014

ROCHESTER DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS MONTHLY REPORT FOR May 2015

NOTE FROM THE INTERIM DIRECTOR

During the month of May, it was announced that two significant positions for the Department would be filled: John Storer accepted an offer of employment for the Director of City Services, and Kirk Beswick accepted an offer of employment for the Facilities Manager of the Buildings and Grounds Division. Both of these gentlemen are scheduled to begin with the City in June. Sam Currier was hired/promoted to an Operator position at the Water Treatment Plant, leaving behind a vacancy at the Wastewater Treatment Plant. Sam has filled a position that was vacated by Jeff Wiggin, who was hired as a part-time custodian in the Buildings and Grounds Division. Stephen Lenox was hired as a part-time grounds employee in the Buildings and Grounds Division.

HIGHWAY, FLEET MAINTENANCE & UTILITIES

Highway Division responded to 78 service calls which were either completed or scheduled for repair. Service calls for the month included sign repairs, traffic signal repair, dead animal removal, pot holes, drainage and installations of new signs. A 30" drain line on Ten Rod Rd was repaired as was 24" pipe and stone headwall on Rochester Neck Road. Staff is still painting crosswalks, stop lines and arrows though out the city. Repairs were made to storm drains located on Charles St. and Rochester Hill Road and on Milton Rd. Routine maintenance for the month involved pothole repairs, street sweeping, graveling and grading dirt roads and catch basin cleaning though out the city. Staff spent a several days at 13 Magic Avenue. The Fleet Maintenance division worked on converting the gravel spreader over from truck 54 to truck 19. The maintenance crew also repaired the hopper on the street sweeper. The Utilities Division performed typical maintenance on the water and sewer systems in the month of May. Staff has responded to the increase in Dig Safe due to the commencement of construction season. Norway Plains Road's dead end was closed off where 4x4 trucks had been driving out on city property. Staff has been blowing out water gates for access and continues with manhole inspections. With the warmer weather upon us we have been able to have 2 sewer cleaning groups out cleaning sewer manholes and sewer lines though out the City. Staff has assisted contractor as needed with work being completed on Chesley Hill Road. A collapsed sewer was repaired at 6 Church Street in Gonic and several sunk in manholes around the City have been repaired. Services that were repaired or replace are as follows: 122 Rochester Hill Road, 38 Patton Street, and 4 Weeping Willow.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

In addition to regular requests for maintenance, staff have been helping to replace broken sprinkler heads and install water meters to all the Adopt-a-Spot locations. The maintenance technicians painted Conf. Rm 1A at the Community center and Bourque's flooring replaced the carpet. All Adopt a Spot signs have been put out and all irrigation systems are up and running. Pools are being cleaned and filled water and will be balanced prior to opening day. The part-time grounds guys staff are getting into their reg. mowing schedules and all A/C units are in and working at City buildings. Staff has completed the spring clean up of the grounds at the Community Center. Seacoast Overhead Door replaced two of the springs on the garage door at central fire Station, and staff removed the top of the dog pen outside of the Police Station due to damaged caused from the falling snow this winter.

WATER TREATMENT FACILITY

Treated water volume for the month of May 2015 was approximately 59.2 million gallons from the surface water treatment plant and 8.4 million gallons from groundwater. TOC and coliform analyses were conducted this month, as well as distribution system field sampling. All water quality testing and monitoring was completed in accordance with NHDES requirements. We are pleased to report that the City of Rochester again met and exceeded all State and Federal standards for drinking water. The watershed inspections were conducted on the Berry Pond dam and Oxbow Pond outlet. Staff is profiling the reservoirs for source quality and storage management, which included locating a vintage outlet from Lower Whaleback Pond. Reservoir temperatures have increased 18F and the natural organic matter loading of Berry River reached 12 mg/L of TOC. Equipment and grounds maintenance was performed at the Water Treatment Facility, well, and tanks/stations. Maintenance at the well included wellhead inspection, blower intake cleaning, and chlorine tube replacement. Maintenance at the Water Treatment Facility included feed pump repairs; roof repairs and replacement skylights; pressure washing and sealing of the sand filter basin and effluent trough; and wire to water performance and efficiency testing of the raw water pumps.

NHDES conducted a dam inspection at the reservoir impoundment and spillway. Wright Pierce Engineers are proceeding on the west end spillway repairs, and hydrogeology at Round Pond Gina Drive pump station maintenance to date includes replacement of supply and discharge piping and installation of a new monitor heater. The cross connection surveys and inventory for high hazard devices has been completed. The filter upgrade work to date includes installation of the sand filter under drains, media, and traveling bridge. The media washing and disinfection is scheduled for June. The storage tank maintenance is scheduled to begin next month and to continue through September.

WASTEWATER TREATMENT FACILITY

Staff continues to work with the coalition of communities on related wastewater and Great Bay Estuary issues. Bids have be sent out for Instrumentation Maintenance and Calibration Services, Process Instrumentation and Control Services & Emergency Generator Repair and Maintenance Services. Staff completed training on new hoist truck operation and attended State sponsored training classes. We are working with industries on pretreatment related issues. Annual hoist inspections have been completed. Staff gave a tour to a UNH applied environmental technology class. Annual AFSCM Employee evaluations were completed in May. Staff attended NHDES meeting to review draft 2014 303(d) list. Cleaned final treatment processes for preparation to summer discharge limits. Unitil replaced the natural gas meter at Front Street pump station.. DPW staff hauled freeze/thawed alum sludge to Waste Management. The LCP #2 monitor was repaired and staff is soliciting quotes for guardrail repairs. The Solarbee tech's have been on site for semi-annual maintenance. The wetlands pilot study with Agua, Inc. has started for this summer's growing season. Our technicians have replaced level transducer at Kirsten Ave pump station. Staff is working with Little Miss Sophie's Restaurant on significant grease related issues. We are working with Evoqua to set up a pilot study for the CoMag system. Staff technicians have performed preventative and corrective maintenance on equipment, machinery and instrumentation. All required testing for the EPA and State has been completed and submitted. Average effluent flow for the month = 2.759 Million Gallons per Day (MGD).

Percent of Design flow = Percent of design flow = 54.9%. Percent of design flow for 2015 = 64.9%. Precipitation = 1.33".

ENGINEERING

- Chesley Hill Road Reconstruction: Construction continues. Construction is scheduled to be completed in July 2015.
- **Granite Ridge Public Outlay**: Construction has begun. Construction will continue through 2015.
- Water Storage Tank Rehabilitation: A pre-construction meeting is scheduled for June 2, 2015. Construction in 2015.
- Surface Water Treatment Plant Upgrades: Construction continues and is scheduled to be completed in late summer/fall 2015.
- **Rte. 125 Pump Station**: Construction continues; however, the contractual final completion date has passed. The contractor estimates final completion in July 2015.
- Catherine St./Sheridan Ave./Knight St. Area Improvements: Construction continues. Final completion in spring/early summer 2016.
- Rochester Reservoir West End Spillway Modifications: Design complete. Pursuing a wetlands permit. Construction in 2015.
- Salmon Falls Road/Milton Road Water and Sewer (EDA Project): 90% design documents have been completed. Anticipate construction start in summer 2015.
- **Howard Brook Culverts Replacement**: Finalizing design. Anticipate construction in 2015.
- Franklin St./Western Ave. Area Improvements: Finalizing design. Anticipate construction start in summer 2015. Western Ave. Sewer Pump Station replacement has been rolled into this project. Additional funding has been requested in the FY16 budget to complete the entire scope. If additional funding is not appropriated, this project will be split into two phases: the first phase being rebuild the roadway and utilities in Franklin St. and Western Ave. and build the new Western Ave sewer pump station, and the second phase being rebuild the roadway and utilities in 1st-5th Streets and Adams Avenue.
- Salmon Falls Rd. HSIP Curve Softening Project: Working with property owners to obtain necessary temporary and permanent construction easements. Construction of this project is unlikely to occur prior to 2016. The future of this project is uncertain due to challenges with obtaining easements and availability of federal funding.
- Strafford Square Roundabout: Federal funding for construction not available until Federal Fiscal Year 2016 (Oct 2015). Design is underway. Construction funds requested in the FY16 budget. Once all utility company fees associated with placing above-ground utilities underground have been received by the City, cost estimates may be revised. Archaeological and historical preservation work must be completed prior to demolition of the building at 2-4 Walnut St.
- **Wakefield Street Reconstruction**: 30% design documents completed. Final Design and Construction funding has been proposed in the FY16 budget.
- Colonial Pines Sewer Extension: 60% design documents completed. Construction funds proposed to be phased in over a few years in the CIP budget.
- Wastewater Interceptor Upgrades: Evaluation and preliminary design underway.
- NPDES Permit Wastewater & MS4 Permit Stormwater: Earlier this year, Rochester
 agreed to certain conditions with EPA in exchange for additional time before a new NPDES
 permit is issued. The terms of the conditions include such activities as sampling, conducting

studies, and development of plans related to nutrient reduction. The City also awaits issuance of a new MS4 permit.

Master Plan Goal: Increase Level of Staff Training and Development Recreation staff continues to embrace professional development opportunities which strengthen knowledge and best practices within the department. During the month of May, our Recreation Supervisor represented Rochester at the

New Hampshire Parks and Recreation Association (NHRPA) Summer Strategies and Risk Management Conference and our Assistant Director graduated from the State of New Hampshire's Certified Public Supervisor Program. Our Program Coordinator attended the Greater Rochester Chamber

of Commerce's Social Media Strategies workshop to assist with continued development to the department's

marketing plan. Training for part time staff continues to be fortified through individual program training and touch bases in which supervisors review department policies and program goals. For record keeping purposes, staff trainings are documented with a sign in sheet containing names of those who attended and topics covered. This process was a recommended best practice learned at one of the NHRPA workshops attended by recreation staff.

Master Plan Goal: Partnering With Other Providers

The recreation department continues to build relationships with several local organizations. The result of these growing relationships has been the ability to network and resource share. Most recently the recreation department has collaborated with the Rochester Housing Authority (RHA). Rochester Recreation Summer Camp will be RHA's official summer



program offering for their youth residents. The rec's partnership with the Rochester School District and the Rochester Police Department continue to flourish through projects like Teen Travel Camp. During May, Michele Halligan-Foley presented to recreation staff and

commission member Kevin Barry on the Safe School Healthy

Students grant. This presentation not only networked school staff with recreation employees, but also allowed

the recreation department an opportunity to learn about the school districts objectives and the integral role of recreation and community building.

Master Plan Goal: Arena Based Programming

May highlighted the Rochester Arena as a multipurpose facility. Two new non ice recreation programs wrapped up in May and received strong reviews; Youth Indoor Lacrosse and Golf. The Arena continues to be an important community resource, hosting for the fourth year in a row the Greater Rochester Chamber of Commerce Community Expo.
