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#### 62.20 The Passing of Items to or from the Occupant of a Motor Vehicle on a Roadway.

- (a) <u>Definitions</u>. For the purpose of this Section, the following definitions apply:
- (1) **Pass/Passing**. Distributing any item to, receiving any item from, or exchanging any item with the occupant of a motor vehicle that is located in the roadway.
- (2) **Roadway**. All public roads open to motorized vehicles within the City. This definition excludes private roads and private property as well as areas in which parking is permitted in the City.
  - (3) **Item**. Any physical object.
- (b) <u>Prohibitions on Roadways</u>. It shall be unlawful to violate any of the prohibitions set forth below in the City.
- (1) No person shall knowingly distribute any item to, receive any item from, or exchange any item with the occupant of any motor vehicle when the vehicle is located in the roadway.
- (2) This Section shall not apply to the distribution, receipt or exchange of any item with the occupant of a motor vehicle on private property or in a permitted parking area.
- (3) This Section shall not apply to any law enforcement officer acting in the scope of his official duty.
- (4) This Section shall not apply to the distribution, receipt or exchange of any item with the occupant of a motor vehicle located in the roadway in order to assist the occupant after a motor vehicle accident, with a disabled motor vehicle or where the occupant is experiencing a medical emergency.
- (c) <u>Penalty</u>. A person found in violation of this Section shall be fined as follows:
  - (1) 1st Offense: Not less than \$500.00.
  - (2) 2nd Offense: Not less than \$750.00.
  - (3) 3rd and subsequent Offenses: Not less than \$1,000.00.
- (d) <u>Severability</u>. If any provision of this section is declared invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions shall be severable and shall continue in full force and effect.




#### **Vital Statistics**

**2015-11** Application by Omer Croteau for a *Variance* to allow conversion of a single family to a four unit apartment building with less square footage of minimum lot area than what is required. This request is according to the City's Zoning Ordinance, Article 42 Section 19 Dimensional Regulations, Table 19 B.

**Location:** 9 Central Ave. Map 120 Lot 373, Downtown Commercial Zone

**2015-17** Application by OCW Retail - Rochester, c/o The Wilder Companies, on behalf of IHOP for a <u>Variance</u> to allow accent up lighting for the IHOP building in the Highway Commercial Zone. This request is according to the City's Zoning Ordinance, Article 42, Section 28(d) (1) (a).

Location: 160 Washington St. Map 130 Lot 38, Highway Commercial Zone

This Variance was <u>Approved</u> as presented, for the following reasons: The variance will not be contrary to the public interest because: It will not increase congestion in the streets. The spirit of the ordinance is observed because: It will not negatively impact health and the general welfare. If granted, the benefit to this individual applicant outweighs any harm to the community as a whole. The value of surrounding properties will not be diminished because: The hours of operation are such that impacts from increased levels of noise, light, activity or traffic are not problematic.

**2015-16** Application by Brenda Rainville for a *Variance* to allow a boarding house in the Residential One Zone. This request is according to the City's Zoning Ordinance, Article 42, Section 18, Dimensional Regulations, Table 18 A. **Location**: 52 Walnut St. Map 122 Lot 74, Residential One Zone. The Variance was *Denied* for the following reasons: The variance will be contrary to the public interest because: It will change the character of the district. It does not consider this district's suitability for this particular use. It will diminish the value of buildings. The spirit of the ordinance is not observed because: It will change the character of the district. It does not consider this district's suitability for this particular use. Substantial justice is done because: If denied, the benefit to the Community as a whole outweighs any disadvantage or harm to this individual applicant. A fair and substantial relationship does not exist between the general public purposes of the ordinance provision and the specific application of that provision to the property because: of the Residential One Zone.

# CODE VIOLATION TYPE & OCCURRENCES Month of: June 2015

### **Code Compliance Deficiencies**

There are up to four steps of actions being used to deal with complaints/ violations: The first being verbal contact. The next method is a written notice of violation. This consists of a notice that is mailed first class as well as certified mail giving the property owner or violator a detailed description of the deficiencies and a date to make the appropriate corrections. The requested date depends on the time that is considered reasonable for the requested action that needs corrected, for instance, a minor repair to a fence may warrant a couple of days, while replacing an entire fence may require a few weeks. If there has been no contact made by the recipient of the notice, a follow up inspection is then made. If the violation(s) still exist, a second notice of violation is mailed with a new correction date on it. This process is then followed through again with a final notice. If the violation has still not been corrected after these notices, the paper work is turned over to Attorney Grossman for legal/court action to be taken. If the violation was a time sensitive issue, such as trash piling up, we would skip the second notice and go straight to a final notice to help expedite the process.

#### Community & Economic Development Management Report - July 2015

#### **Economic Development Specialist**

#### Community Development

The Farmer's Market initiative is moving forward with name, "Rochester Farmer's Co-op", working on finalizing the dates and times. The project will go to City Council for approval on August 3<sup>rd</sup>. The Recreation Department approved the use of the Common's as the venue for this community building attraction.

#### **Business Retention**

Our office assisted HM Machine currently of Great Falls Avenue with putting the lots 34 and 35 under agreement on Airport Ave in the Granite State Business Park. Those are the last two lots available for sale. City Council approved the purchase and sales at the July meeting and closing should happen within 90 days. HM Machine hired contractors and engineers to start designing their new building with hopes to be in late spring of 2016. HM machine is responsible for the machining of components for turbochargers, firearms, and performance suspensions, as well as parts for aerospace, renewable energy, industrial air, and power generation.



Our office facilitated the July Seacoast Manufacturer's Exchange, a forum for manufacturers, from smaller practitioners to companies with an international footprint, to exchange ideas, network, and strengthen the region's manufacturing sector. There were new local manufacturers attend their first meeting. Great Bay Community College, Advanced Technology & Academic Center, hosted the event. The discussion focused on workforce development, how to prepare our students on the hard & soft

skills training, and also to inform the public on the great possibilities of careers in this field. The next quarterly meeting will be in October.

The Exchange events are underwritten by businesses who serve manufacturer's needs, this event sponsor was Cogent Solutions, an organization offering facilitation and team building, CEO Jeanette MacDonald presented.


#### **Business Attraction**

The suburban city of Rochester, New Hampshire is modernizing its centuries-old manufacturing tradition by shifting to space age production, focusing on leading edge sectors such as composite materials, medical devices, and aerospace equipment. The Granite State Business Park is home to a state-of-the-art aerospace composites facility more than eight acres in size and utilizing not just the latest in manufacturing technology, but actually creating specific new technology to make composite engine components for the next-generation LEAP engine. The engine components, as well as this 343,000-square-foot facility, are the result of a unique partnership between Albany Engineered Composites, a division of U.S. Albany International Corp., and Safran Engineered Composites, a division of the French firm Safran, a global leader in jet engines and aerospace components.

Satisfying the need for a large number of skilled and semi-skilled employees to be ready at the opening of the facility was one of the greatest challenges of the location process. In response to those needs, Great Bay Community College Advanced Technology & Academic (ATAC) opened in March 2012 which offers a focus on technical composites manufacturing and academic courses for job seekers and business owners throughout the region. Recognized in 2014 as Project of the Year by the Northeast Economic Developer's Association, "We are proud and grateful for this award, which represents the culmination of a lot of hard work by people at both the state and local level," said Great Bay Community College President Will Arvelo.






In 2015, the center expanded the Advanced Technology & Academic Center (ATAC). It is currently teaching the sixth cohort of students enrolled in the Advanced Composites Manufacturing Certificate program, graduating students every four months. According to Mattson, out of the 20 students who graduate, all are currently employed. The program is growing from 60 graduates the first year to more than 200 graduates this year.

Earlier this year, Albany International CEO, Joe Morone, praised the City of Rochester, and the collaboration of Great Bay Community College Advanced Technology and Academic Center as Albany and Safran prepare to kick their manufacturing production into high gear, the center, and the educated workforce "is critical to our success."



# City of Rochester

ochester is bridging an industrial past
with a high-tech future.

"A lot of people say they are prepared
for the future, but what they are really
prepared for is for things to go back to
the way they used to be," says Economic Development
Manager Karen Pollard, CEcD, EDP. "People have
to let the past go because the future is going to be
completely different."

The real question for today is, "If you are going to own a business in the next 10 years, what would you need to do right now?"

Rochester is working hard on getting that answer right. The city of 30,000 was inspired to forge a new path after its major employer, Cabletron, announced in 2002 that it was leaving town. With no formal economic development program, strategy, or staff, the community scrambled to find a way to overcome the loss.

The city hired Pollard to head up the efforts and developed a bold, award-winning economic development

program to secure Rochester's place in the 21st century. Every building that the computer equipment manufacturer occupied has already been sold and reoccupied, with most facilities enjoying 100 percent occupancy rates. An innovative occupancy plan helped ensure that the space remained in full use. Most buildings were repackaged as multi-tenant sites and a wide variety of businesses were welcomed in, from schools to recreational facilities.

For example, the forzner Cabletron service center, which once housed approximately 1,200 Cabletron employees, is now the site of Granite State College, the Strafford County YMCA, and office space for several companies in the computer sector. Another former Cabletron building is now home to a retail outlet store, a national distribution center, a manufacturing business and an Irving Oil office.

Creative use of space has led not only to "interesting juxtapositions" of different types of companies, but also a "certain energy," says Pollard. The city has also been emphasizing the development of new industrial parks to ensure that incoming businesses have the facilities that they need.

The city's eight industrial parks offer a mix of historic mill buildings and brand new spaces.

In keeping with the city's futuristic vision, a stateof-the-art 343,000-square-foot eight-acre aerospace composites facility will be used to create engine components in the LEAP engine, a disruptive, next generation product. The project is the result of a unique partnership between Albany Engineered Composites (AEC), a division of U.S. Albany International Corporation, and Safran Engineered Composites, an international leader in jet engine and aerospace components.

Great Bay Community College recently opened an award-witning Advanced Technology & Academic Center (ATAC) to focus on technical composites manufacturing and academic courses for job seekers and business owners throughout the region. The center's Advanced Manufacturing courses fulfill training needs for area manufacturers.

The ATAC is funded by a \$19.97 million grant from the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment & Training Administration.

"The community college received a grant to create this center for composite materials because one didn't exist anywhere else in the Northeastern. United States," Pollard says. "We wanted to create this because medical device and aerospace manufacturing both require composite materials to be used in their equipment."

The ATAC also houses one of the state's eight WorkReadyNH sites, where job seekers receive free training in job-related "soft skills" and a National Career Readiness Certificate to help them land a job.

Rochester's economic development plan also includes more traditional sectors, including retail, healthcare, back office, hospitality, and warehouse/distribution. The community is already a regional hub for healthcare, a number of new retail stores have recently moved to town, and a major new shopping center, with a movie theater and other entertainment venues, is under construction.

A recent \$3.89 million infrastructure project, partially funded by a federal Public Works Program EDA Grant, will expand the city's water and sewer system, making Rochester even more attractive to incoming industrial businesses, and nearly \$5 million in the commercial development district will support 2 million square feet of additional development projects.

Three NH Economic Revitalization Zones offer corporate tax credits to qualifying businesses, while two Tax Increment Financing Districts (a third is in progress) will expand industrial and commercial zones. A Special Downtown Business District enjoys an expedited approval process to encourage adaptive reuse, and the city also has two



City Hall was founded in 1905 and houses the Historic Rochester Opera House which has the only remaining adjustable floor known in the United States.

HUB Zones through SBA and is a New Market Tax Credits eligible community. A revolving loan fund from the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program has created more than 300 jobs over the last decade.

Rocherter's location is also a selling point. The city enjoys excellent air, rail, water, and highway transport, including easy access to Interestate 95, the Pease International Tradeport, Boston's Logan Airport, Manchester-Boston Regional Airport, the Portland International Jetport and the Port of Portsmouth. Rochester is also located near New Hampshire's popular Lakes Region, White Mountains, and the beach, providing a wealth of recreational opportunities, from downhill sking, hiking, and mountain biking to sea keysking, swimming, surfing, and seiling.

However, residents do not need to leave town for recreation and entertainment. In addition to the newly restored Rochester Opera House, there are ball fields, hiking and walking paths, rivers, ponds, and 18-hole golf course. There is also the annual Blues & BBQ Festival in the summer and concert series at the Rochester Commons, a July Fourth celebration with activities and, an old-fashioned agricultural fall fair and annual Christmas parade.

In addition, a variety of reasonably priced housing options ensure that residents can find a home that fits their needs.

Wherever residents live, they enjoy the city's classic New England charm. Rochester is spread across miles of rolling hills dotted with quaint red barns, and white picket fences reminiscent of a Norman Rockwell painting. New developments enjoy highway proximity and cluster around the historic Downtown. Fortunately, the city is well prepared to transition its industrial past into a high tech future, while still retaining this oidfashioned New England charm.

#### Continuing Projects

- Hanson Pines Pavilion: Construction of the pavilion has begun and is expected to be completed by the end of the month. The Community Development Coordinator will be conducting on-site interviews to ensure Davis-Bacon Act compliance.
- Public Library HVAC System: This project was rebid, as the Department of Public Works decided the received bids were inadequate. The project is now estimated to be completed in August 2015.
- O Public Service Agencies and Facilities Projects: The Community Development Coordinator has obtained signed contracts with all FY 2015-2016 CDBG grant subrecipients. The Community Development Coordinator has completed environmental reviews for the public service agency projects, all economic development activities, the Community Action Partnership for Strafford County weatherization program, the Rochester Child Care Center fire safety upgrades project, and the Head Start security upgrades project. Environmental reviews are still in progress for the Rochester Public Library accessible doors project, Spaulding High School elevator project, Homeless Center for Strafford County, the accessibility microgrants program, and the bicycle racks project.

## Future Projects

O Accessibility Microgrants Application: The Rochester Housing Authority has submitted a grant application for accessibility micogrants program funding. The RHA has requested \$44,500.00 in funding to install handicap-accessible ramps to individual housing units and to install handicap-accessible showers in units occupied by persons with disabilities. The grant application is attached to this report for the Committee's review and approval.

#### CDBG Program

O HUD Site Visit Follow-Up: On April 30<sup>th</sup> and May 1<sup>st</sup>, representatives from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) visited the City of Rochester's Community Development office to conduct a scheduled review of the City's CDBG program. Overall, HUD determined that the City is in compliance with HUD regulations and that the City's CDBG program is serving the intended beneficiaries of CDBG funding. There were four findings of program deficiencies, however, which have been related to the City via draft report. The Community Development Coordinator has completed work on the required corrective action for

- Finding #4. Updates on progress on the corrective action taken on these findings, and HUD's acceptance of the City's corrective action, will continue to be provided to the Community Development Committee.
- o Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing Rule: The finalized Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing Rule has been released by HUD. For CPD formula grantees, the rule replaces the existing Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice (AI) with a new Assessment of Fair Housing (AFH). The key differences are that HUD is providing data and a template for conducting a fair housing analysis, grantees will incorporate fair housing planning into the consolidated plan, and HUD will review assessments up front as part of the planning process. The rule will be implemented on a rolling basis. The due date for the first AFH is 270 days prior to the program year that begins on or after January 1, 2017 (or January 1, 2018, depending on grantee type) for which a jurisdiction submits a new consolidated plan. HUD will also provide grantees at least 9 months from the publication of a final AFH Template applicable to the grantee type before the AFH is due. More information on the rule and its implementation is available at https://www.hudexchange.info/programs/affh/.
- Grant-Based Accounting for Formula Grantees: HUD has updated the Integrated Disbursement and Information System (IDIS) to phase out the first-in-first-out (FIFO) accounting methodology. These changes mean that formula grant funds will be committed and disbursed in IDIS on a grant-specific basis, instead of using the FIFO (oldest money disbursed first) method that has been used previously. Funds from pre-2015 formula grants will continue to be committed and disbursed in IDIS using the FIFO method. The Community Development Coordinator has discussed these changes with the Business Office to ensure City compliance with this change. More information on the accounting change is available at

#### Other Items

- Bridging the Gaps: The Community Development Coordinator met with Bridging the Gaps board members and staff to discuss the grant's Business Official position. Currently, the Community Development Coordinator occupies the Business Official position. It has been decided to maintain this arrangement for the time being.
- Teen Center Grants: The Community Development Coordinator has researched possible grant opportunities and presented this research to the ad hoc teen center committee comprised of relevant City staff. A meeting will be scheduled for the fall to discuss possible grant opportunities in further detail.

#### PROPOSED PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

We at Revolution Taproom & Grill are invested in changing the look and atmosphere of downtown Rochester and to bettering perceptions of the City in general. We believe we have made great strides toward helping Rochester's downtown become the thriving, charming and safe New England city center we all want it to be. By improving the exterior appearance of 61 N Main Street, making extensive improvements to the interior, and bringing a top notch, casual and fun dining experience to town, we have created a little bit of Portsmouth in Rochester. And why not? The Seacoast is moving this way. We would like to help the City of Rochester develop a thriving dining and shopping district in its downtown.

Outdoor dining areas are a great attraction capable of drawing people to an area .... especially in an area where the summer season is as short as it is in New Hampshire! Portsmouth, Manchester, Concord, Nashua, Kittery ... all of these cities have thriving restaurant districts with popular outdoor dining areas, be they sidewalk dining, courtyard areas, or decks. We would like to see that type of thriving restaurant district in downtown Rochester, and outdoor dining is a great way to help make that happen. People driving through town are interested and want to stop when they see people outdoors enjoying a meal, drink and conversation. It boosts the economy of the whole downtown area, as those customers are likely to then walk through town and shop before or after a meal. It is a family friendly atmosphere, appealing to the cross section of the demographic you want to see downtown: families, young people, college students, professionals, middle aged and older couples, and everyone that wants to enjoy a safe and inviting outdoor dining experience.

To that end, we are hereby requesting the (exclusive) use of the outdoor area abutting our restaurant for outdoor dining. The space known as Factory Court is a natural extension of our dining area, as it is adjacent to our building, and we have 2 doors that open out onto that area. We have had numerous inquiries from customers as to whether we would be serving outside, suggestions that we do so, and tremendously positive feedback about making Factory Court an outdoor dining space. It would be a wonderful addition to our operation and a wonderful addition to downtown Rochester. Factory Court in its current iteration it not well utilized and for such a great space, could be a tremendous attraction to the downtown if we were allowed to create a beautiful outdoor space for casual dining and entertainment.







### MONTHLY REPORT JULY 2015

On behalf of the Fire Department, I am pleased to provide you with the following report. It serves as a summary of the activities, projects and programs underway within the department.

### **DEPARTMENT INFORMATION:**

During the month of July the Department responded to 223 calls for service. Call volume is up from June with 27 more calls or an increase of 14%. The runs this July as compared to July of 2014 shows an increase from 211 last year to 223 this year, or a 7% increase.

For July 2015 there were 2 vehicle fires, and 2 brush fires. In addition there were as many as 117 incidents involving either medical or motor vehicle accidents as well. Overall, the department continues to increase in call volume city wide.

### **ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF:**

I attended a board meeting for the Health and Safety Council of Stafford County which was held at the Frisbie Hospital Conference Center.

Staff met with John Storer the new Director of City Services to discuss projects to be completed at Station 1 and Station 2.

I attended a lunch meeting with the Fire Chiefs from Somersworth, Dover and Durham.

Staff met with two fire apparatus companies to discuss the specifications for the new fire tank truck.

Deputy Chief Tim Wilder and myself met with Suzanne Boutin the Principle at St. Elizabeth Seton to do an introduction, tour the school and review the sprinkler system project.

I met with Ron Lachapelle to discuss his position as Fire Department Chaplin.

### FIRE PREVENTION:

Our prevention bureau welcomed its newest member, Deputy Chief Tim Wilder. Tim has hit the ground running since he started on July 20<sup>th</sup>. He comes to us with experience after working in Durham, Somersworth and Concord previously. This is a very busy season for fire prevention with multiple construction projects trying to finish before the winter, many new events happening at the fairgrounds, and the always consistent life safety inspections of buildings and businesses already in use. Deputy Chief Wilder and Captain McCullough are working hard to maintain and build community and business relations while maintaining consistency and compassion through all levels of life safety enforcement.

### **DUTY SHIFT:**

There were 16 training sessions for full-time firefighters for the month. July is a vacation month for the call members.

### **EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT:**

Deputy Chief Wilder and myself participated in a Security Inspection at the Gonic School with NH Emergency Management. These inspections are currently being done by NH Emergency Management at all schools.

City staff attended a Continuity of Operations Planning meeting with Hubbard Consulting to continue working on this new plan for the City.

I met with Catlin from the Fosters to discuss the Rochester Emergency Management Team and how we prepare for emergencies within the City.

#### MONTHLY REPORT July 2015

There were a total of 24,300 items circulated with 24,028 people visiting the library in the month of July. Two hundred sixty-seven patrons used the library's Internet computers for 1,366 hours. Visitors to the library's web site numbered 9,437. Current number of patron registrations is 35,230. Interlibrary loan activity included 64 materials borrowed from other libraries and 315 loaned to other libraries.

The month of July is full of fun Summer Reading Program activities. The Children's Room transformed into a backyard wonderland full of interesting creatures related to the "Don't Bug Me....I'm Reading!" theme for this year's Summer Reading Program. There are Butterflies, Grasshoppers, Giant Ants and an Ant Hill to climb in for kids.

Over 451 children signed up for this year's Summer Reading Program. Three entertaining Story Times were made available for children age 2-5 with a total of fifty-three children in attendance. Two hundred-fifteen children participated in three craft programs available for those 2 and older including a "Spoon Ant" with plastic spoons and pipe cleaners, "Jeweled Spider Web" with sparkly beads and "Fingerprint Bug Pictures".

Tuesday, July 14<sup>th</sup> the Toe Jam Puppet Band provided a fun, energetic performance featuring songs and stories about creatures found in your own backyard, garden and sometimes house. One hundred thirty-seven children and adults gathered on the lawn behind the library to listen to the Toe Jam Band sing about ants in their pants and flies on their ties...they love bugs, but they're not sure why....they just do!

Wednesday, July 29<sup>th</sup> the Children's Room welcomed Wildlife Encounters. One hundred forty-three children and adults enjoyed meeting a variety of "Bugs and the Creatures that Eat Them" during this entertaining and educational program.

In addition to the print versions of available books, 285 of our Library patrons downloaded 1,356 e-books to media devices through the library's web site this month. The RPL website also enabled 23 patrons access to Mango Languages.

RE: Monthly Report – July 2015

**OPERATIONS**: Three of the six wards met this period. Discussions included the comp stat numbers, heroin, panhandling and road improvements. There were also concerns raised about people swimming in the Hanson Pines pools after hours as well as drinking in Parson Main Park downtown. Suggestions to address panhandling included signage to discourage people from giving money and using undercover officers in areas known for panhandling.

There were 31 cases sent up from patrol to the investigations bureau for review and or investigation. Currently there are 44 cases assigned for investigation. Detectives were called out for a suspicious death case. They also assisted patrol with the report of a strong armed robbery. One arrest was made during a compliance check on a sex offender. There were no violations found during compliance checks of two pawn shops this period. We made two arrests from significant investigations including the fatal hit and run on Route 11 and a home invasion on Manatee Drive. We logged 334 pieces of evidence and returned 160 pieces to owners. There were 13 cases presented to the Grand Jury and all returned true bills.

**BRIDGING THE GAPS:** Molly Martuscello, our coalition coordinator, as well as members of Youth to Youth; from the Middle School and High School attended the Dover Youth to Youth Summer Advocacy Training Program held July 6 – 10. Molly met with multiple coalition members this period to discuss the important roles they will play as members. Molly attended the Strafford County Prevention, Treatment and Recovery Roundtable on July 17. Local updates and a discussion of a new treatment center were given during this meeting.

**COMMUNICATIONS:** As reported last month two specialists were released to solo dispatching. The center still has two vacancies. A written exam is scheduled in August for hiring eligibility. We passed the federal NCIC audit on July 16, 2015. Two minor issues needed correction. We do not anticipate any future issues in those areas.

**COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT OFFICER:** Officer Hayes has been working with various city Departments on compliance issues at campgrounds and residences. We were able to identify nine of the ten suspects in various crimes posted on our face book page this period. This continues to be a very valuable tool.

**COMPSTAT:** We continue to have excellent results in the overall reduction of property crime. All categories were down over 40% from this same period last year and overall down 30% year to date compared to last year. Case closure rates are up 37%. Traffic enforcement had 13 DWI arrests this period, two resulting from traffic accidents.

**DIVERSION:** Nicole presented to the Sullivan County Chief's Association on diversion issues in the state. She continues to work on the Governor's Commission for at risk youth with monthly meetings. The Commission will make recommendations to the Governor's office moving forward. Nicole has been working with the recreation department on a summer teen program for ages 14-17 connecting with at-risk youth. Thus far the program has been very successful. They will hold a wrap up meeting at the end of the season to evaluate the programs strengths for potentially continuing the program next year.

**K9:** There were two tracks and three drug searches in Rochester. The team attended two community policing events; a meet and greet demo at the New England Drag Way, and also a presentation at Camp Carefree in New Durham. Keith and Daisy were nominated as one of the top dog teams in the region in a contest by the Boston Red Sox. While they didn't win the top spot, the recognition is still significant.

**PROSECUTION:** The new prosecutor Andrea Mitrushi began her duties at the beginning of the month. She had a short orientation and has started taking over all the cases. Lt. Gould continues to assist with arraignments while Andrea gets up to speed.

**SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS:** Officer Andrew Jackson has been selected as the SRO for the high school to replace Officer Murphy who returned to a regular patrol shift. He has been meeting with Lt. Gould and will be ready to go as school starts for the year. He will also be taking over as advisor of the Explorer Post.

**ADMINISTRATIVE:** We still have not made a final determination on awarding the clothing bid. It looks at this point that we will be splitting it among four suppliers. In the interim we continue to purchase from current vendors.

The vehicle that Housing purchased for Housing duties is in and is awaiting equipment installation.

Most training this period focused on the final phase of having officers licensed through the State to dispense NARCAN in an overdose situation. The MOU has been signed between the City Manager and the CEO of Frisbie Hospital to move this matter forward.

Officers Garstin and Williams-Hurley were released to solo patrol. Officer Schacht continues in field training. Officer Arrajj is set to graduate from the Academy on August 21st.

The results of our survey to measure the community's perceptions of the Department and crime in the City in general have been tabulated. We conducted the same survey in 2013 and saw an increased participation with the 2015 survey. On average our overall performance in 2015 on a scale of one (poor) to five (very good) was rated 4.32%. In the 2013 survey the average was 3.93. The entire survey comparison has been appended to this report.

#### **EMD USE:**

There was one Taser display, and no Taser deploys this period.

#### FORFEITURE FUND SPENDING:

There was no forfeiture spending this period.

#### 2013-2015 Community Survey Comparison Report



From mid-April through mid-May, Rochester Police Department conducted a survey of the community's perceptions of both the police department and crime in the city in general. The majority of responses to the survey were gathered through SurveyMonkey, the link to which was posted to the department's Facebook and website, emailed out to individuals, and also mentioned in an article published in Foster's. 478 responses were obtained online, and in addition to that cold calls were made via phone to 100 citizens who had recent contact with the police department. Thirty-six responses were obtained this way, giving a total of 514 individual responses.

A survey of the same material was also conducted by Rochester Police Department in 2013, which received 178 responses. This report will analyze the results of the most recent survey, compare to the results of the previous survey from 2013, and then examine how the department is moving to address the concerns of the community.


#### **2015** Community Survey

The first question asked citizens to rank the Rochester Police Department's overall performance from one (poor) to five (very good). Overall, most responses to this question were a four or five, with an average of 4.32.




Rochester Police Department Performance 2015

The next question in the survey was about the department's image within the community, and again asked those responding to rank RPD from a one (poor) to a five (very good) on overall image. Again, most of the responses were a four or five, with an overall average of 4.19.




Rochester Police Department Image 2015

Question three asked citizens to select which of the following they would like to see Rochester PD focus on more: drug enforcement, neighborhood patrols, education, traffic enforcement, downtown foot patrols, or criminal investigations. The clear top response to this was drug enforcement, followed by neighborhood patrols, and downtown foot patrols.




The final question allowed citizens to write in a response for what they believed to be the biggest law enforcement issue in the city of Rochester currently. Drugs topped this question by a wide margin, with almost ten times as many citizens citing drugs as a concern than the next most popular answer. The second and third most common responses were understaffing/need for more officers, and property crimes such as vandalism and burglary.



Current top law enforcement issue in Rochester, 2015.


The same chart, with the drug responses removed for increased visibility:



#### **2013 Community Survey Comparison**

The 2013 survey utilized the same four questions, and was conducted online via Facebook and the department website as well as through limited cold-calling and ward meetings. Although the 2013 survey was available for two months – twice as long as the 2015 survey – it obtained only 178 respondents.


For the first question, on the department's performance, the average rating in 2013 was 3.93 compared to 4.32 in 2015. Overall, respondents were more likely to rate Rochester Police Department's performance as a 5 (very good) in 2015, and less likely to rate it a 1 (poor), 2, or 4. The increase in the percentage of "5" responses from 34% to 43% is primarily responsible for the increase in the average score.




Rochester Police Department Performance 2013

On the second question, regarding the department's image within the community, the average rating in 2013 was 3.93 compared to 4.19 in 2015. Overall, respondents were more likely to rate Rochester Police Department's performance as a 3 or 4 in 2015, and less likely to rate it a 1 (poor) or 2. The changes here are not as pronounced as that of the first question.







Rochester Police Department Image 2013

Question three asked what Rochester citizens would like to see more focus on from the department. In 2013, the top responses were neighborhood patrols, drug enforcement, and downtown foot patrols. In 2015, the top response was now drug enforcement, followed by neighborhood patrols and downtown foot patrols.




Areas of focus for 2013




Areas of focus for 2015

The final question allowed for write-in responses to the question "What is the number one law enforcement issue in Rochester?", and comparison of the two years is challenging due both to freedom of citizens to write in whatever the wished and to the fact that the responses to the surveys were compiled by different analysts. However, some elements are comparable. Drugs were the top concern on both surveys, but the margin of response with that has grown by about 30%. From 2013 to 2015, one can also observe a decrease in concern about robberies, alcohol and DUI, and minor criminal matters, while there has been an increase in concerns related to the department's relationship with the community, panhandling, and the downtown area. Department understaffing was a major concern in both years.

#### **Department Response to Community Concerns**

Beginning in July 2014 and continuing in the months since, Rochester Police Department has made several changes to policies and enforcement philosophy which have had a positive impact on crime in the area so far. These changes have been responsive to concerns

from the citizens from the 2013 survey, ward meetings, and other community contacts such as Facebook and events.

First, positions were rearranged and new officers were hired and sent to the police academy for training, putting the department at full staffing for the first time in many years. The last of the new hires is not yet on patrol; however statistics for the department such as proactive time have already shown marked improvement. In May 2014, proactive calls made up 29% of the department's overall workload year to date. As of the end of May 2015, proactive calls were 40% of the department workload year to date, despite a significant increase in the number of calls.

Next, the department made changes to the overall patrol philosophy as a direct response to growing concern about drugs, and especially heroin, in the city. Under the new philosophy, the drug problem and the issue of property crime especially are related, and therefore if drug enforcement increases, other types of crime will decrease as well. To facilitate this, officers engage in targeted traffic patrols of streets and neighborhoods known for drug activity. This change was implemented on July 1, 2014, and the yearend report for 2014 saw a 5% decrease in property crime. In 2015, Rochester has seen a 29% decrease in property crime year to date, alongside a 138% increase in drug possession arrests.

The third issue that the department addressed was citizen requests for foot patrols. One of the most common requests from the public in Rochester is a greater police presence outside of patrols cars, both in neighborhoods and the downtown area. As a result of the improvements in staffing, the department has been able to increase patrols in town both on foot and on bicycles as the weather has warmed, balancing these requests while still maintaining traffic enforcement in the designated drug enforcement areas. This initiative is still in its early stages, but will hopefully

alleviate citizen's concerns and help the department to build closer bonds in the community and improve its image.






# **Manpower Hours June 2015**




**Manpower Hours June 2014**

## ROCHESTER DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS MONTHLY REPORT FOR JULY 2015

#### HIGHWAY, FLEET MAINTENANCE AND UTILITIES

The Highway Division responded to 63 service calls which included calls for potholes, brush overgrowth at intersections, dead animals and traffic signal repairs. Staff continues to work on roadside mowing and the painting of stop bars, crosswalks, arrows and parking spots. The dirt roads were graveled and graded, and the street sweeping has been continuing when the equipment is up and running. The sweeper was down for repair for about ½ of the month of July. A replacement sweeper was included in the 2016 Budget. Pavement was removed and patched in some of the troubled areas along Wakefield Street, Tebbetts Road, Strawberry Hill and Charles Street. Shim paving and patching was completed on Haven Hill and Sullivan Farm Road. Drainage repairs were completed at 101 Wakefield St and on Salmon Falls Road. Staff assisted the Economic Development Department with site preparation for the new sign at the Granite State Business Park. The mechanics began vehicle inspections this month and there have been numerous repairs resulting from these inspections.

The Utilities Division responded to 52 service calls and performed several water and sewer line installation inspections. The routine maintenance included the inspection and cleaning of sewer lines, drain lines and catch basins all over the city. A hydrant at the Wastewater Treatment Plant was replaced, and sewer manholes have been repaired, covers raised and paved at numerous location. Staff replaced the water service from the main to the curb stop at 16 Forest Park Drive. Staff has been alternating the duty of weed whacking and painting City fire hydrants.

#### **BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS**

Staff responded to 38 calls for service. These included lighting requests, plumbing and elevator issues and calls for basic supplies and the moving of furniture and storage boxes. The Community Center, the Library and the North Main Street parking lots were cleaned and the islands were mulched. New flooring was installed at the entrance to the Revenue Office. The grounds staff has fertilized a few of our high visibility areas and has been keeping up with their weekly mowing schedules. The custodians stripped and waxed the first floor of City Hall. The Grounds staff also assisted the Economic Development Department to complete the site preparation for the new Granite State Business Park Sign.

#### WATER TREATMENT PLANT

Treated water volume for the month of July 2015 was approximately 50.8 million gallons from the surface water treatment plant and 15.7 million gallons from groundwater. All water quality testing and monitoring was completed in accordance with NHDES requirements. We are pleased to report that the City of Rochester again met and exceeded all State and Federal standards for drinking water. Quarter III IOC/VOC/nitrates and Stage 2 disinfection byproducts are scheduled for sampling in the month of August. Watershed inspections were conducted on Berry Pond, Whaleback ponds, and Berry Dam. Additional monitoring included strata profiling of pH, dissolved oxygen, and conductivity in the reservoir. The Berry River diversion structure cover was rebuilt and replaced in-house. Equipment and grounds maintenance was performed at the plant, well, and tanks/stations. Maintenance at the well included blower screen and filter replacement and placing the bulk

chlorine delivery tank online. Maintenance at the WTF included rebuilding the raw water vacuum prime system wearable components and process air compressor repairs.

The water storage tank maintenance has been rescheduled to begin the third week of August. Investigative borings were conducted on the East End Dam and toe drain.

Filter upgrade work to date includes additional SCADA programming; installation and use of new bulk and day tanks for sodium hypochlorite; installation and leak testing of new sodium hydroxide tanks; new doorways; and the replacement of exhaust and ventilation fans. We participated in a two day electrical load shedding event as a potential cost-saving measure and to test the backup power generation at the plant, well, and Richardson BPS.

#### WASTEWATER TREATMENT FACILITY

Wastewater staff continues to work with the coalition of communities on related wastewater and Great Bay Estuary issues. The quarterly status report was submitted to the EPA. Our division met with representatives from EPA to review the wetlands pilot study. Staff attended the City Managers meeting in Dover to discuss coalition activities. We did a final walkthrough of the new Route 125 pump station with NH DES. We began surveying for a new force main and siphon in support of the River St. pump station upgrade. Staff cleaned the chemical storage tank and the post aeration basin. Staff performed preventative and corrective maintenance on equipment, machinery and instrumentation. All required testing for the EPA and State was completed and submitted. The average effluent flow for the month = 2.636 Million Gallons per Day (MGD). Percent of design flow = 52.4%. Percent of design flow for 2015 = 61.4%. Precipitation = 2.54".

#### **ENGINEERING**

- Chesley Hill Road Reconstruction: Base pavement completed. Final pavement is scheduled to be completed in mid-August 2015.
- **Granite Ridge Public Outlay**: Construction will continue through 2015. Final pavement will likely not be installed until after the winter season.
- Water Storage Tank Rehabilitation: Construction has begun. Construction will continue through late summer/early fall 2015.
- Surface Water Treatment Plant Upgrades: Construction continues and is scheduled to be completed in fall 2015.
- Rte. 125 Pump Station: Construction is complete.
- Catherine St./Sheridan Ave./Knight St. Area Improvements: Construction continues. Final completion in spring/early summer 2016.
- Rochester Reservoir West End Spillway Modifications: Project was advertised for public bids. Wetlands permit application is being processed. Construction in 2015.
- Salmon Falls Road/Milton Road Water and Sewer (EDA Project): Waiting on easement resolution. Will be submitted for EDA review for approval to go out for bids.
- **Howard Brook Culverts Replacement**: Finalizing design. Anticipate construction start in 2015.
- Franklin St./Western Ave. Area Improvements: Finalizing design and permitting. Anticipate construction start in fall 2015. Project scope now includes rebuilding the roadway and utilities in portions of Franklin St. and Western Ave. and constructing the new Western Ave. sewer pump station. Rebuilding the roadway and utilities in 1<sup>st</sup>-5<sup>th</sup> Streets and Adams Avenue will be proposed for construction in a future project.

- Salmon Falls Rd. HSIP Curve Softening Project: Working with property owners to obtain necessary temporary and permanent construction easements. Construction of this project is unlikely to occur prior to 2016. The future of this project is uncertain due to challenges with obtaining easements and availability of federal funding.
- Strafford Square Roundabout: Federal funding for construction not available until Federal Fiscal Year 2016 (Oct 2015). Design is underway. Construction funds were approved in the FY16 budget. The City has received all utility company fees associated with placing above-ground utilities underground; total costs are under earlier estimates. Archaeological and historical preservation work must be completed prior to demolition of the building at 2-4 Walnut St.
- Wakefield Street Reconstruction: 30% design documents completed. Final Design and Construction funds were approved in the FY16 budget.
- Colonial Pines Sewer Extension: Design continues on the first phase of this multi-phase sewer extension program. Construction funds are proposed in the CIP budget over the next few years for future phases.
- **Wastewater Interceptor Upgrades:** Evaluation and preliminary design are being finalized. A preliminary design report is anticipated in August.
- Lowell Street Culvert: Infrastructure improvements to drainage and to the culvert are in the design and permitting phase. Construction to begin late summer/early fall 2015.
- **Dewey Street Pedestrian Bridge:** Bridge inspection, rating, and evaluation has commenced.
- NPDES Permit Wastewater & MS4 Permit Stormwater: Earlier this year, Rochester agreed to certain conditions with USEPA in exchange for additional time before a new NPDES permit is issued for its Wastewater Treatment Facility. The terms of the conditions include such activities as sampling, conducting studies, and development of plans related to nutrient reduction. The City also awaits issuance of a new MS4 permit for stormwater.


