


## September 2016 Monthly Report

For the month of September Code Compliance dealt with 36 properties that had compliance or zoning issues for a total of 112 different types of violations. All of property owners in these cases received a Courtesy Notice asking for them to bring their property into compliance. , 9 of them have been closed and have come into compliance, 6 have been escalated and resulted in formal violations and 21 are still pending at the time of this report. We removed over 150 political signs and 50 snipe signs that were located in the right of way.


## **Different Violations**




## **Orgin of Violation**




## **Vital Statistics**





# Economic & Community Development Management Report

The City of Rochester is one of the fastest-growing cities in the Seacoast region. As a growing retail and entertainment destination, our dynamic and expanding business climate is attributed to the proud industrial history of the area, a renewed downtown district and the expanding aerospace and advanced composites manufacturing sectors.

EDC of the Month: Take small bites for strategic success – How Rochester has created wealth in the last decade.

September 2016 was a busy month for travel. The Northeast Economic Developer's Association (NEDA) held their annual conference in New Haven, CT and Manager Pollard and Specialist Marsh both attended this educational event.

The theme was Transportation at the Crossroads, and many of the sessions included transportation information including sessions on recreational trails, municipal airports, commuting and transit-centric developments. Later in September the International Economic Development Council (IEDC) held their annual conference in Cleveland and Manager Pollard attended. The IEDC has a global focus and hosted sessions on foreign direct investment, reshoring manufacturing jobs, working with colleges and universities, the skills gap in workforce and other development topics. Ms. Pollard also participated in the Education and Certification Committee meeting and the women's mentoring program as a mentor of young women new to economic development.

The International Council of Shopping Centers (ICSC) hosted a New Hampshire event in September, attended by Manager Pollard and Specialist Marsh. Josh Levy of Waterstone was one of the presenters, and he discussed both the Portsmouth Green project and the Rochester Ridge project. The Ridge hosted their official Grand Opening and Ribbon Cutting, announcing additional new tenants including Super Cuts, the Paper Store, a nail salon, Starbucks and the Mikado, a sushi, hibachi steakhouse and pan-Asian cuisine restaurant opening in 2017.

The Rochester Opera House held an Open House at their new North Main Street Studio, formerly Carney Medical Supply. The Opera House will be holding a variety of fundraisers for the project.

Wayfinding had an initial meeting with City staff and Main Street Executive Director Mike Provost. Manager Pollard will research and draft some RFP language to be reviewed by those at the initial meeting with an expectation of putting that out and choosing a contractor during the 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter (Oct. - Dec. 2016).

Highway Attraction Signs were discussed with two representatives from NHDOT and City Staff, along with Representative Bowdoin who is taking a close interest in this topic. Manager Pollard is drafting a paper with recommendations at how the city could take the leading role in getting the Attraction Signs installed and recoup its investment over time. This will be brought back to the City Manager in Oct.

Farmers Market: This month the Farmers Market donated \$25 dollar vouchers to each Stafford County Veteran that showed up to the Market. The first week we saw 71 Veterans and the last week we saw a total of 170 Veterans at our booth as the word spread. The money was raised through the Patrons of Benedict Grill and approximately \$10,000 was donated to Veterans which proved to be a great event for the Farmers market during the slower September month.

Our office has been busy booking appointments with small businesses that are looking for assistance in opening their enterprise in Rochester. One of those businesses made the paper for their advancement in the last year with their startup company. Three local downtown businesses have announced their expansions. Moe's Italian Subs is rehabbing a new location two doors down that will allow them to have seating. Colleq-tiques moved to the old Art Stream building which will allow him more space to display, add a lego room for kids and game room in the lower level. Magrilla's has also applied for a permit to expand their seating in the next door space on Hanson Street.

Executive Secretary Aubin is now on maternity leave but in her place is Interim Executive Secretary Judith Schlenker who is busy starting up and working on our annual competition, **Start Up 2016**, which will be held this year on November 2, 2016.



## **Community Development Coordinator Report**

- Prepared and submitted by the Community Development Coordinator
   October 2016
  - Continuing Projects
- <u>Economic Development Small Business Development Program:</u> As this FY 2015-2016 activity failed to serve the minimum required percentage of low-to-

moderate income residents, reimbursement for activity expenses is required. The Community Development Coordinator has coordinated with the Economic Development Office and Business Office to arrange for the reimbursement of the funds, to be taken from the Economic Development Office's consultation budget.

## • CDBG Program

- Hope on Haven Hill: The Community Development Coordinator has spent significant time guiding Hope on Haven Hill through procurement and processing requirements. This has involved a special permission from the City Manager to use price quotes instead of a sealed bid procedure for selecting subcontractors. The Community Development Coordinator has also performed Davis-Bacon site interviews for the first subcontractor and researched additional funding opportunities for the project.
- CASA of New Hampshire: The Community Development Coordinator has worked with CASA of New Hampshire staff to implement appropriate data collection and reporting procedures in order to collect the quarterly data required to be submitted to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).
- O Davis-Bacon Semi-Annual Report: The Davis-Bacon semi-annual report, for the period of April 2016 to September 2016, has been submitted to HUD. During this reporting period, the City of Rochester collected and disbursed \$169.04 in wage restitution due to an error in a contractor's wage calculations.
- Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER): Under the new grant-based accounting rules (which have replaced the former "first in, first out" grant accounting rules), there are now two tests to determine if a CDBG grantee is under the 20% planning/administrative cap. While HUD was reviewing the City's FY 2015-2016 CAPER, HUD found that, due to voucher revisions that drew from an incorrect fiscal year, the City was over the 20% cap based on the second of the two accounting tests. The Community Development Coordinator worked with the Business Office and the City's HUD representative to correct this issue, and the City should now be under the 20% cap under both accounting tests. The FY 15-16 CAPER should be approved shortly.
- <u>FY 2017-2018 Annual Action Plan:</u> The Community Development Coordinator has solicited public input into the upcoming Annual Action Plan at the Ward 6 meeting in September. The Community Development Coordinator will attend the Ward 4 meeting in

October and further ward meetings in January to solicit further public input. The Community Development Coordinator has also started consulting with non-profit and government agencies to gather data and feedback needed to draft the FY 17-18 Annual Action Plan.

## • Other Activities

- <u>City Hall Annex:</u> The Community Development Coordinator has set up a webpage for the City Hall Annex restoration project, which is a required public education component of the received Certified Local Government grant. The page includes information on the history of the building, building plans, historical photographs, and photographs of the project in-process.
- <u>Bridging the Gaps:</u> The Community Development Coordinator has met with the Bridging the Gaps coalition coordinator to discuss expired funds and the upcoming FY 17-18 carryover request. The Community Development Coordinator has also reviewed and revised the draft Memorandum of Understanding between Bridging the Gaps and the Rochester School Department.
- Economic Development Administration (EDA) Grant: The Community Development Coordinator completed the three-year report to EDA, and the report has been submitted to the City's grant officials.
- Willow Brook Watershed 319 Grant: The City of Rochester has requested an extension in the timeline to perform the work under this grant. The Community Development Coordinator processed the grant amendment paperwork required to grant this extension. The extended timeline for the project runs through December 31, 2017.
- OCOPS Hiring Program Grant: The City of Rochester has been awarded the COPS Hiring Program Grant that it applied for in June 2016. The City of Rochester is currently working with federal grant officials to revise the grant award to reflect actual hiring costs, as the grant application included estimated figures. The federal grant award will be approximately \$125,000.00
- <u>River Walk Project:</u> The Community Development Coordinator has met with Planner Michelle Mears to discuss funding strategies and CDBG eligibility for the downtown river walk project.

## MONTHLY REPORT SEPTEMBER 2016

On behalf of the Fire Department, I am pleased to provide you with the following report. It serves as a summary of the activities, projects and programs underway within the department.

## DEPARTMENT INFORMATION:

During the month of September the Department responded to 221 calls for service. This represents a 4.7% increase over last September with only 211 runs. Of the calls in September, there were 3 cooking fires, 3 brush fires, and 3 other fires not classified.

Crews also responded to an additional 34 calls for vehicle accidents, and 69 medical calls. 12 of those medical calls were overdoses. September so far accounts for 10% of this year's fire department response to overdoses. We also responded to 3 calls for mutual aid assistance. The remaining calls included everything from alarm activations, good intent calls, and public service calls, as well as a multitude of various other type calls.

### ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF:

I met with Dover and Somersworth Fire Chiefs to discuss sharing Administrative Services.

I attended the first Chamber of Commerce Holiday Tree Lighting and Christmas Parade meeting.

Staff attended the Ridge grand opening.

I attended the ribbon cutting for the new office of Better Homes and Gardens.

I met with John Kennedy who is the Associate Housing Manager for Rochester Housing Authority.

The Police Chief and myself conducted Dispatch Interviews.

## FIRE PREVENTION:

This month was especially busy as we played host to the Rochester Fair and the thousands of visitors that came to our great city. We had firefighters working details at the fairgrounds during busy hours tending to medical aids and fire watch over the Expo Building and Grandstands. There were no major events to speak of and the fair seemingly went off without a hitch this year. We also welcomed the grand opening of The Ridge Marketplace which has and will continue to keep fire prevention busy for the upcoming year. With Clark Brook Development, 66 Rochester Hill Road and many other projects continuing to come out of the ground around the city the fire prevention bureau with have its work cut out for the upcoming winter.

### **DUTY SHIFT:**

The training division is currently in a state of transition. I am settling in to my new position as the training officer, while continuing to perform some duties of the prevention officer until that assignment is filled.

In November, I presented to all career and call force members an overview of the future training program, along with my personal goals. I developed and initiated a monthly training packet as a pilot and went to work delivering the lessons and ensuring compliance. I also conducted my first Call Force training and meeting, with excellent attendance.

It's been very busy here at the station. I worked with the Fire Marshal on preplanning fire prevention week, worked on rebuilding the new firefighter orientation program, planned and developed November's training, began looking at a longer range training plan, assisted with administrative duties and managed a complete clean out and remodel of the library. Once complete, this space will provide an alternate meeting space, firefighter work station, and a resource center, adjacent to my future office space.

## **EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT:**

Staff hosted a regional Emergency Management Directors meeting at Station 1

MONTHLY REPORT September 2016

There were a total of 18,675 items circulated with 12,509 people visiting the library in the month of September. Two hundred forty-two patrons used the library's Internet computers for 1,352 hours. Visitors to the library's web site numbered 9,058. Current number of patron registrations is 36,638. Interlibrary loan activity included 76 materials borrowed from other libraries and 287 loaned to other libraries.

The Rochester Public Library and Jetpack Comics were proud to present a Downtown Rochester "PokeWalk". Fifty people gathered outside the Library's ground floor entrance and made their way through the Downtown Loop, all while using their mobile device GPS capabilities to locate, capture, battle and train virtual creatures called Pokémon that appear on the screen as if they are in the same real world location as the person. There was a raffle, trivia, and prizes along the way, ending at Jetpack Comics where those interested in a Pokeleague could stay and join in the fun.

Young Adult Services Librarian Donna Hynes attributes much of the success of The Teen Summer Reading Program to the many prizes offered to participants. This is made possible from generous donations from the Club Victoire, Boston Red Sox, Canobie Lake Park, Charlie's Pizza, Fisher Cats, Friendly's, Portland Sea Dogs, Jetpack Comics, Hilltop Fun Center, Papa Gino's, Rochester Fair, Golick's Dairy Bar, Lone Oak Ice Cream, Wal-Mart, Water Country, and York's Wild Kingdom. The Boston Bruins sponsored NH Libraries for the first time this year offering one Young Adult Grand Prize of two tickets to a Bruins home game along with a Zamboni Ride. In the drawing of all the YA entries in the state Rochester Public Library's patron, Makailah Ringstaff, was the lucky Grand Prize winner of this exciting prize.

On September 28<sup>th</sup>, UNH Cooperative Extension Master Gardener, Roz Mason presented "Composting 101" the what, why, and how of composting in the home garden. Composting creates a more resilient closed-loop system within your own backyard and is an easy way to give back nutrients to a garden that would have otherwise been lost.

In addition to the print versions of available books, 238 of our library patrons downloaded 1,231 e-books to media devices through the library's web site this month. The RPL website also enabled 76 patrons access to Mango Languages and 419 songs were downloaded from Freegal Music.

# PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT MONTHLY REPORT FOR SEPTEMBER 2016

The Planning Board and Conservation Commission held their regular meetings in September. The Historic District Commission (HDC) and the Arts & Culture Commission did not have a meeting in September. The Planning Board also held a workshop meeting in September and held a site visit for a subdivision off Route 108 and Quail Drive. At the Planning Board's workshop they discussed a site plan application from Wissler Properties, LLC (VW Dealership), the Entertainment Overlay District, and the status of Surety/Performance Guaranties as well as the release of some of them. The discussions/agendas from the regular meetings of the Planning Board and Conservation Commission are summarized below.

The Planning Staff attended various meetings throughout the month of September including the Strafford Metropolitan Planning Organization's Technical Advisory Committee, TRG meetings, two (2) Special Downtown meetings, Granite Ridge ribbon cutting, Rotary, Rochester First Impression Framing meeting, Coast's annual meeting, meeting with consultants, developers, citizens, and other City staff. Both Seth and Michelle attended the Northern New England Chapter of the American Planning Association/New Hampshire Planners Association annual meeting held in Portsmouth. I attended the Northeastern Economic Developers Association annual conference in Hartford Connecticut. We also received two new applications to the Planning Board for their October meeting and began review of those applications and preparing them for hearings by the Board. We continue to be very busy in the Planning & Development Department and the department staff continues to do a great job staying on top of things.

## APPLICATIONS REVIEWED BY THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

1. Discussion: a) The president and executive director of Moose Mountains Regional Greenway (MMRG) explained that they are a regional land trust that primarily has held and focused their efforts on land just north of Rochester (holds lands) but are considering expanding their region to include Rochester and other towns. The Conservation Commission encouraged MMRG to include Rochester in their focus area. MMRG said they are currently working on creating a "Strategic Action Plan" and will be asking that all focus areas participate in the visioning sessions so that MMRG knows what the conservation desires (farming, open space, trails, connectivity, etc...) are of each municipality.

MMRG invited the Commission and the City to a regional meeting on December 3<sup>rd</sup>, 8:30am-12:00pm at the Wakefield Opera House, 2 High St, Sanbornville, NH.

- 2. Dredge and Fill Application/Wetland Permit Application: NH DES Permit by Notification for: 1 Pickering Rd, Map-Lot 142-2 (New England Fire Cause & Origin, Inc) to repair a collapsed granite retaining wall along the Cocheco River. The Commission had no concerns with this application, but noted that this area of work is next to a dam that NH DES has been planning on removing.
- 3. Correspondence: (emailed/sent prior to meeting): Staff informed the Commission of two training sessions: 1) "Plan Reading and Analysis" on November 3<sup>rd</sup> in Greenland, NH; and, 2) NH Assoc. of Conservation Commissions Annual Meeting & Conference on November 12<sup>th</sup> in Pembroke, NH.
- **4. Reports:** a) TRG update Staff encouraged the Commission to withhold from making decisions on TRG applications/Conservation Overlay District conditional use permits until the applicant has supplied them with all of the required documentation; and b) Planning Board update A site walk may be warranted for the subdivision design review proposal for Chesley Hill Rd.

- 5. Old Business: The Commission reviewed General Ordinance Chapter 11.21, Finance-Conservation Fund. They discussed making revisions to the language so that a higher percentage of Current Use Penalty fees would go into the Current Use Fund, not the general fund.
- **6. New Business:** Currently the Conservation Commission is limited to 7 full time members and 1 alternate. The Commission made a motion to request that City Council allow for 2 alternates.

#### 7. Other Business:

- a) A monitoring report for Hope Farm must be done annually, the members would like to conduct this review/report themselves, but may ask that a consultant help show them how to conduct a proper report.
- b) Staff explained the status of the ALE Grant for Ten Rod Farm and the difficulties that have arisen between the property owner and the City.
- c) The Commission asked about the status of the Granite Ridge proposal for Phase 2. Staff said the matter is still being reviewed by NH DES and EPA.
- d) The Commission discussed a potential change of use on the corner of Bridge St and North Main St. The change would be from a professional office to a used car dealership. The Commission voted that they would oppose this proposal due to the environmental sensitiveness of the lot (it abuts the Cocheco River)
- **8.** Non-Public Session pursuant to RSA 91-A:3 II(d): Discussion of acquisition of real property and/or recent site walks and LACE sheets.

RE: Monthly Report – September 2016

**OPERATIONS**: All six of the wards met this period. There was discussion about ongoing road projects, bicycle laws, the hands free law, police activity, the recovery center, and a brief presentation on the LEAD program. There was additional discussion on thefts in one of the mobile home parks, a discussion about heroin, the new officers graduating from the academy and a presentation by the motor vehicle officer. Celeste Plaia, the Government Channel Coordinator attended to capture some video for our recruitment video.

The investigations bureau had 45 cases sent from patrol for review or investigation. There are currently 92 cases assigned. There were 24 cases presented to the Grand Jury and all returned true bills. We logged in 361 pieces of evidence and returned 126 pieces. Detectives completed 35 registrations for sex offenders. Det. Bourque through his training with ICAC was able to recover about 90% of the data from a crashed hard drive at Child Advocacy Center. There were four detective call outs this period, two deaths, a search warrant and an assault. There were three polygraphs and two background investigations completed.

**BRIDGING THE GAPS:** Coordinator Molly Martuscello met with the Middle and High School student assistance programmers and talked about collaboration on prevention efforts in the schools. The coalition held a ½ day summit with key advisory board and community members to work on identifying factors in the community that are contributing to youth substance use rates and to work on solution building as well as comprehensive planning for the year.

**COMMUNICATIONS:** We have begun a process to replace a dispatcher who has tendered her resignation.

**COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT OFFICER**: In addition to several monthly meetings, Off. Miehle is working with Rochester Main Street on events they have planned in the community. He presented to a parents group at Frisbie Hospital on child seat use and installation. He has been asked to present to future groups in this area.

**COMP STAT:** Self initiated activities remain high. Proactive policing dipped some during the month of August, which is typical as it is one of our busiest months during the year. There were a number of burglaries this period; however, good suspects have been identified for the majority of them. We received some confessions and arrests were made.

**DIVERSION:** Teen night will resume in October. Teen Drug court has 7 returning jurors and 2 new jurors. They will have an expanded role this year with the School Board adopting the life of an athlete program. Nicole had four new referrals to diversion. She has six open cases. There was one referral for the life of an athlete program.

As Chair of the NH Juvenile Court Diversion network Nicole has been heavily involved in the planning process for state funds to be provided to diversion programs for prevention and intervention on substance abuse issues. We will be eligible to receive some of these funds.

**HOUSING:** There were 27 police related calls for service this period. Background checks were completed on applicants. A lengthy narcotics investigation was concluded at Cold Spring Manor with the assistance of the Strafford County Drug Task force. A large amount of heroin was seized following a search warrant of the premises.

**K9:** There were two tracks and one drug search in town. The K9 Unit also attended a fundraiser for the Working Dog Foundation at the Rochester Opera House; he attended the grand opening of the Ridge Marketplace, and spent some time walking through the fairgrounds while the fair was in town. Off. MacKenzie did a presentation for the Tri State Property Managers Association, as well as one to the teachers at Spaulding High School.

**PROSECUTION:** In adult court this period there were 183 new cases with 267 charges. Of those there were 83 guilty pleas, 31 not guilty pleas and 50 failed to appear. Of the cases that went before the court there were 10 administrative guilty findings, 25 charges nol prossed as part of plea agreements, 12 cases dismissed by the court and 52 cases were continued.

In juvenile prosecution Lt. Gould had 12 arraignments, 6 review hearings, 2 violation hearings and 5 trials scheduled; four were resolved by plea. There were 17 new petitions forwarded by patrol.

Lt. Gould met with the administrative team at the middle school about a new protocol on when the school resource officers should be utilized. She also discussed what the district would like to see when the School Resource Officer position changes officers in November.

**RENTAL PROPERTY OWNERS ASSOCIATION:** Lt. Bossi attended the recent meeting. He discussed theft from motor vehicles and encouraged property owners to remind tenants to remove valuables from vehicles, and to also lock vehicles. Lt. Bossi also provided information about common fraud scams and ways to prevent being victimized.

**VETERANS COUNCIL:** The flag retirement ceremony was successful. There is a planned "fall fling" at Riverside Rest Home, a veteran's luncheon on October 20<sup>th</sup> and planning is underway for the Veteran's Day ceremonies on November 11 and Pearl Harbor Day on December 7, 2016.

**ADMINISTRATIVE:** We will be seeking final approval from Council to accept Highway Safety Grant money for DWI, Speed and Pedestrian Bicycle patrols. We will also present for final approval of JAG grant money that is slated to purchase Patrol PC computers for the fleet.

The County received \$83,000 in a grant to combat the opioid crisis. The funds will be available by December and we will seek approval from the Council to accept a portion of that money. We met with the County Drug Task Force and the DEA to formulate a strategy moving forward.

As part of the statewide initiative in combating illicit drugs, we sent six officers through search and seizure mobile enforcement training. This training is a prerequisite to participate.

We hosted a 2-day training course titled Crime Scene Boot Camp. We put five officers through the course.

Officer Gagnon and Officer Alexander have been moved to field training. Officer Brave is continuing his studies for taking required course exams from the Academy.

Off. Balint attended a 3-day training course with the Pennsylvania State Police titled Traffic Accident Reconstruction.

We have completed the hiring process for our newest officer to fill an existing vacancy. The Police Commission also interviewed a certified officer. A conditional offer was given and a background is underway. We are working on a promotional process that will open up when Sgt. Deluca retires. We have given a conditional offer to an experienced dispatcher to fill an anticipated vacancy. Her background is underway.

**FORFEITURE SPENDING:** There was no forfeiture spending this period.

**EMD USE:** There was one Taser display and one Taser deploy this period.





# 2016 CFS Trends


# **2015 CFS Trends**




# Calls for Service 2015 v 2016



# **Accidents by Ward**








# **Manpower Hours September 2016**




# **Manpower Hours September 2015**

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## ROCHESTER DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS MONTHLY REPORT FOR SEPTEMBER 2016

#### HIGHWAY, FLEET MAINTENANCE AND UTILITIES

Highway Division responded to 40 service calls which were either completed or scheduled for repair. Service calls for the month included tree limbs, potholes, and sign repair. Staff repaired several storm drain grates, continued street sweeping and line painting, and graded dirt roads thought out the city. Road side mowing with flail mower and brush trimming is in progress throughout the City. Sections of Charles Street were ground out and repaved. Staff assisted the engineering firm with work on Wakefield Street for test pits and inspection of manholes. 300 feet of drain pipe and two catch basin structures were installed. Two sections of 15"drain line were repaired on Lowell St. along with the head wall and reinforcement of the slope at the Lowell Street culvert. A full shim and a 1 inch overlay were completed on Margaret St. A 12" culvert on Roberts Rd. and Sheepboro Rd were completed. The Mechanics completed general vehicle maintenance and finished the state inspection on the entire fleet. The Utilities Division responded to 23 service requests including, discolored water, sewer backups, and water pressure concerns. The staff completed routine cleaning on sewer siphons, sewer lines, catch basins and drains. They also cleared culverts that were full of debris. Numerous water and sewer connection inspections were performed and manholes were repaired. Staff trimmed and cleared brush along the sludge line that runs from the WTP to the WWTP. This clearing is necessary to facilitate the engineering evaluation. Numerous Dig Safe requests came in for contractors that are trying to button up water, sewer, gas and paving projects before the change in weather. Staff changed out the gate valve that enters the city hall parking lot, and a number of curb boxes that needed attention. A culvert pipe was replaced on the cross country sewer line behind Airport Drive.

#### **BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS**

Buildings and Grounds completed 45 work orders in the month of September. These included general repairs of electrical, carpentry, equipment repairs and plumbing related issues to City Buildings. The boiler installation at the Ice Arena was completed and the project to replace the boiler at the Central Fire Department has begun. The Library Roofing project was awarded to Score Construction and is set to begin soon. The Community Center Structure Sealing and Washing Project is in progress and the Community Center Security Camera Upgrades Project and HVAC Project has been awarded and will begin soon. The grounds staff continued with their routine mowing schedule in September and is in the process of switching over to fall maintenance including cleaning out and pruning back flower beds and leaf clean up. Irrigation has been shut off and meters removed to the City irrigated properties and adopt-a-spots for the year. Removal of the hanging flower pots is complete and the Halloween decorations have been put in place. Filter replacements in all of the HVAC units throughout the City buildings are completed along with the inspection and maintenance of all emergency lighting. The semi-annual generator inspections have also been completed.

#### WATER TREATMENT PLANT

Treated water volume for the month of September 2016 was approximately 65.7 million gallons from the surface water treatment plant. The groundwater plant remains offline due to low river level conditions. All water quality testing and monitoring was completed in accordance with NHDES requirements. Initial disinfection byproduct results for TTHMs taken this quarter were

at levels that would result in exceedences at two sample sites. Staff worked with Wright Pierce engineering to quickly begin investigative treatment tests and soft flushing of the distribution system. Subsequent testing at those sites showed acceptable levels of TTHMs. Seacoast NH is currently in an extreme drought condition; the City has enacted mandatory water restrictions to protect our resources. We have measured approximately 3.2" of rainfall at the reservoir this month. Raw water capacity remains at an estimated 80% of storage as a result of intense harvesting from the watershed and curtailed usage. Repairs to the Tufts Pond intake valve and support decking are complete. Equipment and grounds maintenance was performed at the plant, well, and tanks/stations. Stations were winterized and seasonally overhauled. Maintenance at the WTF included replacement of drive fittings on the sand filter, initial startup of the heating system, calibration of the TOC analyzer, and generator semi-annual maintenance is completed at all locations. Staff constructed a temporary powdered activated carbon injection system to pilot its effect on TOC/DOC removal and floc ballasting. Initial planning for SCADA/PLC, laboratory, and pump station CIP projects has begun. NHDES will be conducting a routine sanitary survey of the water system on October 4<sup>th</sup>. The department would like to thank Lead Operator Tim Green for his years of exceptional service to the department and to our customers. Tim has accepted employment at a neighboring water system. He will be greatly missed. Congratulations and best wishes, Tim!

#### WASTEWATER TREATMENT FACILITY

The vacant Wastewater Treatment Operator position has been advertized for over a month now and have received a total of 4 applicants. We will continue to reach out to professional sites and advertise in local newspapers in a hope to spark an interest. This is not uncommon in the wastewater and water world – it is becoming harder and harder to fill these positions. Staff continues to work with the coalition of communities on related wastewater and Great Bay Estuary issues. We have been working with industries on various issues. The Western Ave. pump station upgrade is moving forward. The wet well and slab has been poured and site work is ongoing. We have started the aeration basin diffuser replacement project. City staff has gone above and beyond during this labor intensive project. Brown and Caldwell Engineering has collected river (fresh and tidal) samples and sent out for testing. Staff attended the meeting with EPA to go over treatment facility progress/projects and to discuss pending NPDES permit issuance. Students from Spaulding High School came in for a tour. Both pumps at the Ray Dr. pump station were rebuilt. The level control transducer at Sawyer Ave. pump station was rebuilt. Staff performed preventative and corrective maintenance on equipment, machinery and instrumentation. All required testing for EPA and the State has been completed and submitted. Average effluent flow for the month = 2.156 Million Gallons per Day (MGD). Percent of design flow = 42.8%. Percent of design flow for 2016 = 61.7%. Precipitation for the month = 3.1". Precipitation for 2016 = 25.31".

#### **ENGINEERING**

- **Granite Ridge Public Outlay**: With the final paving having been placed in September 2016, construction is now substantially complete.
- Milton Road/Flat Rock Bridge Road Intersection Improvements: Construction is complete.
- Columbus Avenue Parking Lot Expansion: Construction is complete.
- **Surface Water Treatment Plant Upgrades**: Construction is substantially complete. Final items to be completed over the next couple of months.

- Salmon Falls Road/Milton Road Water and Sewer (EDA Project): Construction of sewer and water infrastructure on Salmon Falls Road continues to proceed. Project completion is scheduled for summer of 2017.
- Franklin St./Western Ave. Area Improvements: Construction continues on Franklin Street and the new sewer pump station at the corner of Western Avenue and First Street.
- Rochester Reservoir East End Dam Modifications: Bids were received and the construction contract was awarded in September 2016. Construction is scheduled to be completed by the end of December 2016.
- Colonial Pines Sewer Extension: The first phase of this multi-phase sewer extension program was advertised for bids in August 2016. Bids are anticipated to be received in October 2016. Construction funds are proposed in the CIP budget over the next few years for future phases.
- Salmon Falls Rd. HSIP Curve Softening Project: NHDOT has approved this project to be advertised for bids. Federal funding is now available for this project. This project will be advertised for bids in October 2016; construction of this project is anticipated in 2017.
- **Lowell Street Culvert:** City crews recently completed improvements to the riprap slope on the southeastern side of the culvert. The roadway in the area is scheduled to be repaved in October 2016, which will include some guardrail replacement in the area of the culvert. Further improvements to the culvert are being contemplated for construction in 2017.
- Columbus Avenue (Rte. 125) Pedestrian Bridge: The new pedestrian bridge was opened in February 2016. Temporary sidewalk approaches to the bridge are planned to be replaced with more permanent sidewalk and railings; design to be completed in 2016 and construction to follow in 2017.
- **Dewey Street Pedestrian Bridge:** Bridge inspection, rating, and evaluation has been completed. Design of a replacement bridge structure continues.
- **Strafford Square Roundabout**: Design continues. Bidding of the roundabout construction contract is now anticipated for late 2017, with a spring 2018 construction start date. Prior to that contract, a utility infrastructure contract is anticipated to be bid by the end of 2016 for construction in 2017. Approval for demolition of the building at 2-4 Walnut Street has been received.
- **Howard Brook Culverts Replacement**: Finalizing design, permitting, and easement negotiations. Construction is now anticipated in 2017.
- Woodman St./Myrtle St. Area Improvements: 50% design plans have been submitted to the City for review. Project scope includes: Woodman St., Myrtle St., Davyanne Locke Ln., Ela Ct., Beaudoin Ave., Liberty St., Academy St., and portions of Charles St. and Congress St.
- Wakefield Street Reconstruction: Design continues to progress.
- Wastewater Interceptor Upgrades: A Basis of Design Report has been received from the design consultant. This report summarizes alternatives and recommends a sewer collection system master plan before proceeding with final design.
- NPDES Permit Wastewater & MS4 Permit Stormwater: City staff met with USEPA Region 1 Administrator and other USEPA & NHDES staff in September 2016 to discuss permit issues. Based on that discussion, the issuance of the draft NPDES permit for the Wastewater Treatment Facility is not imminent within the next few weeks; however issuance of the draft permit is anticipated from USEPA prior to the end of 2016. As far as the MS4 permit for stormwater, the City continues to await issuance of a new permit. USEPA is

currently reviewing comments submitted on their draft MS4 permit language; issuance of the MS4 permit is anticipated prior to the end of 2016.
