Description of matters discussed, and final decisions made:

Ben Franklin Lease Consideration

Director Sullivan provided an update on his lease negotiations with the Property owner. Sullivan said this particular property owner is very difficult to move on issues. Sullivan said he got him to move on the fit up allowance and the sublease. Sullivan said he could not get him to move on the option to purchase or the right of first refusal. Sullivan said despite his best efforts, these two items are totally off the table. Sullivan said the owner wants a clean cut after ten years if it simply

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is not working at with the tenant, even if the tenant is a government entity. Owner said that if things are going well with the tenant, he always seeks to renew the lease. Sullivan explained the issue with the sublease is that the Owner does not want the City to sublease to any entity that would be in conflict with other lessors in his portfolio.

Sullivan said if this building was in any other location in the City, he'd be a no. However, given the location, the need for parking, and the need to protect the City's investment in the downtown, he is asking the Council to approve entering into this lease.

Callaghan asked Sullivan to discuss how this lease will protect the investment in downtown.

Sullivan then explained all of the past, current, and future projects which will be detrimentally affected by the lack of parking in this location.

Councilor Sullivan asked the useful life of a new parking lot. Sullivan said it would not be much beyond ten years. Councilor Fitzpatrick said we are victims of our own success and that we must protect that investment in the downtown; he said we have to have parking downtown. Fitzpatrick said he supports the lease even without new terms on the sublease. Councilor Walker said he agreed with Fitzpatrick and said the downtown would be in peril without this lease. Walker said he supports the lease. Walker said if we do not act, this property will sit and rot.

Councilor Fontneau said it's a bad deal and a bad investment. Fontneau said we should shop around the \$3 million instead. Fontneau said after 2 years on the Parking Committee that the City does not have a parking problems. Fontneau said if we do have a parking problem then it was caused by poor planning by the City Council.

Councilor Herman said he has a problem with the price of the lease. Herman wishes the City had the means to force the property owner to do something with the Property.

Creteau asked Scala's opinion on the parking situation in downtown. Scala said the studies say we do not have a supply issue, but we have a management issue that would require the City to

monetize its parking spaces. Scala said the City is preparing a plan to monetize the parking through a combination of permitted parking just outside of downtown and metered parking in the heart of downtown. Scala, who lives downtown, said he knows that during high volume times for downtown businesses that prime parking is occupied by residential tenants.

Karolian asked if the City would add additional parking enforcement. Scala said yes.

Councilor Sullivan said he thinks he is in support of the lease, but needs a little more nudging. Councilor Sullivan asked if there would be any City use for the building. Director Sullivan said not right now because the City would be seeking economic, not government, activity on the property. Director Sullivan said that he believes that this property owner does not care and he will leave it empty for 20-30 more years. Director Sullivan said in his position on the Board of Rochester Downtown that the majority of the owners feel the City and the City Council are more concerned with the Ridge than downtown. Director Sullivan said parking or no parking, this is an opportunity for the City to do something with this vacant building that sits at the gateway to downtown. Director Sullivan said the questionnaire put out by the Parking Review Committee found most people are not willing to walk more 400 feet from parking to destination.

Councilor Fitzpatrick said what he's learned from parking experts is that the issue isn't whether you have ample parking, but are you perceived to have ample parking. He said the recommendation was always to overbuild by 30% so the perception is that the area has ample parking.

City Manager Ambrose said as for the use of the building, the staff would be looking to the Council to decide what the highest and best use is.

Scala said the average downtown commercial rent is between \$10-12 per square foot and this deal is \$14 per square foot. Councilor Sullivan said he does want to see a use at the building so the taxpayers don't see the City paying for an empty building. Director Sullivan said that the burden

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to find a sublessee will fall on the Economic Development Department, but that is what it is there

for.

Fontneau said he just can't get over the cost; its not that he doesn't support downtown. Callaghan

said he felt similarly, but he has become convinced that we need this parking as a bridge to the

permanent solution for parking once the downtown is fully built out. Callaghan said the optimist

in him says that creating this extra parking with make our businesses stronger and will attract

more excellent restaurants to our downtown.

de Geofroy said that we should look at this as a "loss leader" to get people in the door that will

lead to bolstering our downtown which leads to long term results. He said that this is the #1

eyesore in downtown. He said if the City does not renew the lease in ten years and someone else

comes in to lease it, that is huge win for the downtown. The City will show that it is worth

investing in the downtown.

Councilor Hamann said he wants to see the language included in the lease about the owner not

unreasonably withholding approval for a sublease.
